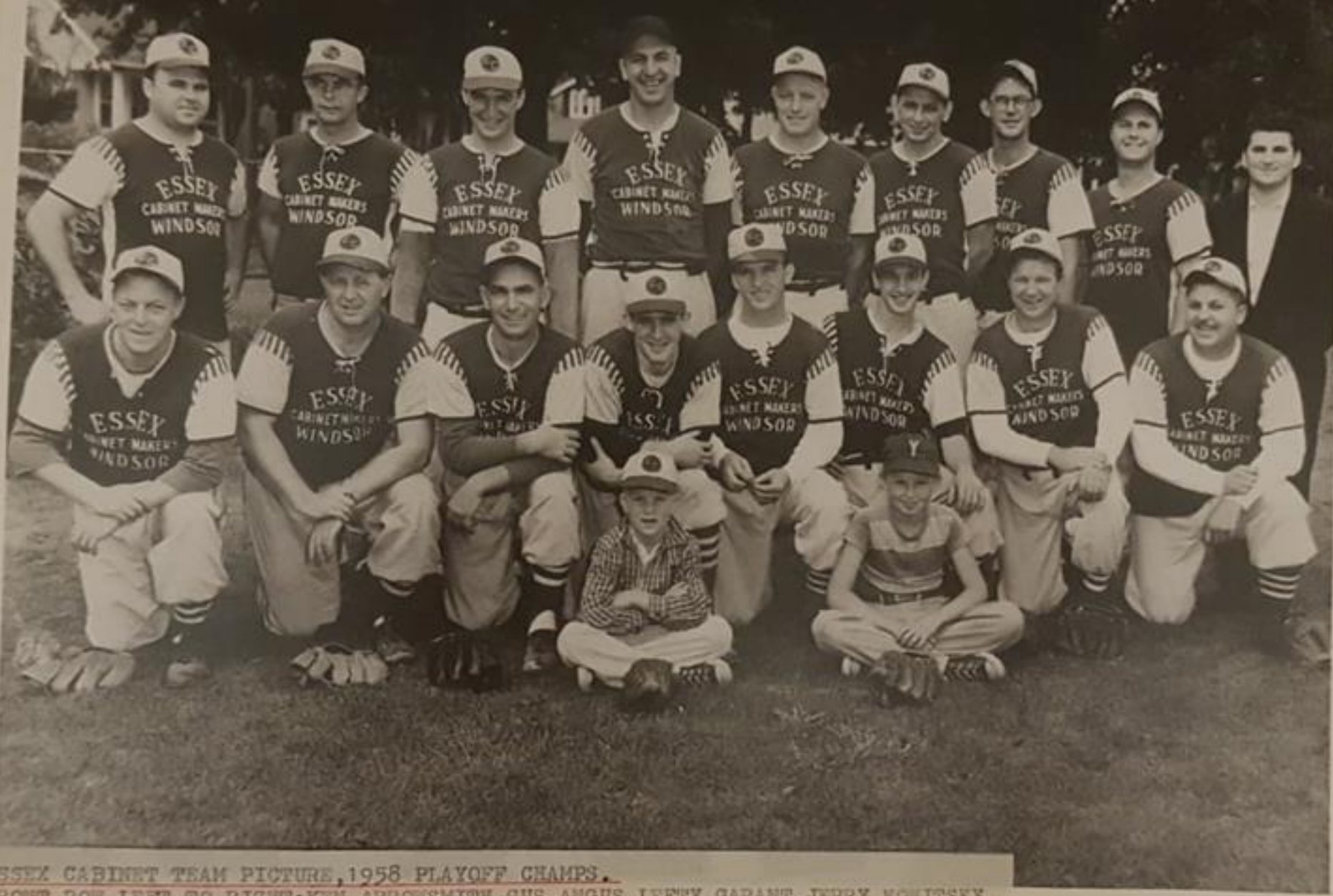

Manufacturers' Loop Opens

Police Nine Debuts With 5-1 Victory

Mic Macs Seek 4th Entry

The Mic Mac Baseball League is again planning to operate two leagues this summer and 15 teams will open workouts on city diamonds May 20.

In the Class "E" ranks, 12 clubs will see action, an increase of three over last season. Two entries have been received from Sandwich West and one

more from Riverside as new clubs for this term.

With three teams in the "D" Division, a fourth will be necessary to present a balanced schedule. Any sponsor or team manager interested in putting the fourth team on the field is requested to contact Lodge Nowitsky, CL 29703.

Windsor Police, four-time champions of the now-defunct Civic Softball League, bowed in as a member of the Manufacturers' League Tuesday night by dumping Canadian Bridge, 5-1, at Shore Acres Park.

But, it took a grand-slam homerun by Police pitcher Gregg and a home run by Police pitcher Jack Gregg in the last half of the ninth inning to decide the issue in the hard-fought game.

Local 240, another new entry, nosed out Brunner Mond of Amherstburg, 4-3, at

Lanspeary Park while Hiram Walkers blanked John Wyeth, 7-0, at Wilson Park.

Gregg's circuit clout to deep right field broke up a red-hot 1-1 ball game in which each team collected just four hits. Canadian Bridge picked up its only run in the first inning and the Cops evened the score in the fifth without the benefit of a base-hit.

In the last half of the 9th, a single by Ron Thompson and two Bridge errors got leading pitcher Mel McCartney into serious trouble with nobody out. The Bridgemen managed to force out two Police runners at the plate but, with the bases jammed, Gregg poled out a towering blast to deep right field for a game-winning homerun.

Rightfielder Glen Stockwell poled a two-run triple in the last of the 5th to decide the Brunner Mond-Local 240 game in favor of the Union nine. Ed Derus, who struck out nine and walked four, was the winning pitcher although Brunner Mond outlit the winners by a scant 8-7 margin.

One of the hits off Derus was a bases-empty homerun by Tony Kittl in the 8th. Stockwell also collected a first-inning triple for Local 240 and emerged from the game with three RBI's to his credit. Gord Beetham, who toiled the first 4 and 2/3 innings for the Burg brigade, was the losing pitcher.

Centrefielder Ron Wilson smashed four singles in five trips to the plate and Dick

Ducharme teamed up with Jim Millman to pitch four-hit ball as Hiram Walkers white-washed John Wyeth. The Distillers jumped on loser Medo Martinello for three runs in the first inning and never looked back.

Ducharme and Bob Hunter collected two hits each as Walkers picked up 12 hits off Martinello. The longest hit off him was Ron Fathers' triple in the fourth.

Bali-Hi Motor Hotel lifted the lid on the 1959 Recreation Softball League season Wednesday night by trimming Embassy Hotel, 7-2, at Lanspeary Park.

Gord Haidy, with errorless support in the field and exhibiting near-perfect control, was the winning pitcher with a nifty four-hitter. He struck out seven.

Dick Hames, who toed the rubber for Bali-Hi last season, went the distance for Embassy and picked up the loss. Hames' teammates committed five misplays. Hames struck out five and walked none.

A lead-off triple by Hames, a single by John Marcinko, a

sacrifice by Ralph Patterson, a single by Ernie Magone and a long outfield fly by Willie Ulicny propelled Embassy Hotel into a 2-0 lead in the third inning.

Bali-Hi Wins

Chudyk's 2-Hitter Not Enough, 2-0

Although limited to just two single-base hits by Bill Chudyk, Bali-Hi Motor Hotel scored two unearned runs in the last half of the 4th inning to nose out Red Crest Stamps, 2-0, in their Recreation Softball League contest Friday evening at Lanspeary Park.

It was Bali-Hi's second victory in as many starts and Gord Haidy picked up his second pitching triumph in three nights.

Haidy, who struck out three, walked three and yielded five hits, was more than matched by Chudyk who was returning to the local softball scene for the first time since serving a two-year stint in the U.S. Army.

Chudyk struck out nine, walked one and gave up singles to Ted Zalba and Haidy in the 4th inning. Both runners went on to score. Chudyk retired the first 10 batters he faced in order and mowed down the final 11 Bali-Hi batters without any of them reaching first base.

However, in the fatal 4th with one out, Zalba connected for a line-drive single to centre and Haidy followed with a hard single to left. Zalba scored and Haidy raced all the way to third when Red Crest third baseman, Glen Skov, allowed "Lefty" Garant's throw from the outfield to get away from him and into the crowd. Haidy scored on a wild pitch seconds later.

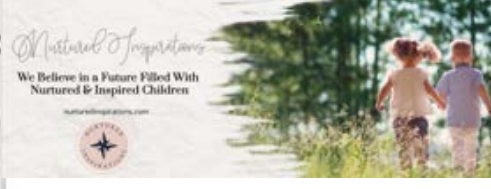
