'New' Faces Bolster Lineups For Manufacturers' Openings

The Manufacturers' Softball League will open the 1960 season on Tuesday when all eight clubs (two more than last year), get into action.

The 1959 pennant and play-off champions, Canadian Bridge-Truscon, will operate as Triangle Club this season but with much the same team that copped the pennant. Mel McCartney, who hurled a no-hit game during the season and won his last five straight playoff starts in '59, will headline the mound corps. Backing McCartney will be John Westlake, who twirled last year for Hampton Movers of the Inter-City loop. Siro Martinello will return as coach.

Amherstburg, which battled the Bridgemen in the finals, will also be back with the same personnel, led by Norm "Porky" Jones, another no-hit flinger, who sparked his mates to the final after a fourth-place finish. Coaching the club will be Austin "Toddy" Jones.

Hiram Walkers, coached by Bill Boyce and Roy Kett, boast a mound corps of Sam

Sisco, Jim Millman and Dick Ducharme. Players from Walkers Inter-City and Manufacturers' units of a year ago will round out the squad.

John Wyeths, the basement club in '59, should be strengthened by the addition of John Johnson, who fired a pair of no-hit games for pennant winning Hampton Movers in the Inter-City League last season. Also bolstering coach Gord Brown's crew will be the Magone brothers, Ernie and Wilf.

Duplicate, returning to the loop after a year's absence, will have "Benny" Glaude at the coaching reins with Joe Budinsky (Union Gas in '59) doing the hurling. Other new faces are Joe Ponie, Stan Pinkowski and Don Ethier, Inter-

City League batting king in '59.

Windsor Firemen, another new entry, round out the loop. Coach Sonny Wilds will have Jack Gregg and Paul Langlois on the rubber and Harry Soumis in the field.

This is the schedule for Tuesday's opening games:

John Wyeth vs Brunner Mond at Shore Acres Park; Duplicate vs Windsor Firemen at Stoddell Park No. 2; Triangle Club vs Local 240 at Wilson Park No. 1; and Hiram Walkers vs Windsor Police at Lanspeary Park. The Brunner Mond game will start at 6 p.m., all others at 5:45 p.m.

There will be the odd exception but for the most part, the league will play four games every Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Three Washed Out

Jones Hits, Pitches Mond's 9-2 Triumph

Only one decision was handed down as the Manufacturers' Softball League commenced its 1960 activity Tuesday night. Two other games were halted by rain while another didn't even get started.

Amherstburg Brunner Mond, behind the steady six-hit mound work by Norm "Porky" Jones, gained the lone decision and undisputed possession of first place by whipping John Wyeth, 9-2, at Shore Acres Park in a game halted by rain after five innings.

Two other games went farther before the elements stepped in, but in both of these engagements the score was deadlocked at 2-2. At Lanspeary Park, John's Auto Body and Hiram Walkers failed to reach a decision in seven innings. Likewise for Local 240 and Triangle Club at Wilson Park where their game was halted after six chapters.

The other affair between Duplate and Windsor Firemen slated for Stodgell Park was postponed because of wet grounds.

Brunner Mond took full advantage of wildness on the part of Wyeth hurler John Johnson to score an easy success. Johnson issued nine free tickets and thereby sealed his own fate. Jones struck out three and failed to walk any in claiming the victory.

Norm Jones also poked a two-run double among his three hits in four trips to lead both teams at the plate. Art Cooper had two singles for the losers while Ernie Magone slashed a bases-empty homer.

Walkers, who scored their two runs against John's Auto Body on an error, gave them back in the seventh when pitcher Sam Sisco threw wide to first on Joe Gibala's easy two-out roller to allow two runs to tally. It was a pitcher's duel, Sisco allowing two hits, Ron Hatch three.

In the top of the first inning with George Rocheleau of Auto Body at the plate, his bat slipped out of his hands and struck teammate Neil Matheson standing in the on-deck circle. Matheson was knocked unconscious and removed to hospital by ambulance for treatment.

Trailing 2-0 after four innings, Local 240 scored singletons in the fifth and sixth to earn its tie with Triangle Club, the 1959 champions under the Canadian Bridge-Truscon banner.

Denny Morrison clubbed a solo homer in the fifth, then singled home the tying tally in the sixth. Ron Bell drove in both runs for Triangle club with a double and single.

The Union Gas-City Merchants combine looks good but it will be minus pitchers Mike Szeryk and Joe Budinsky who hurled the Gas gang into the league final last season. Young Gary Nolan and Garnet Woods will split the hurling duties this year for newly-appointed manager Lyle Symons.

Cal Pearson and John Moynahan will divide the hurling duties for the Aces, most of whom played last year with Erie House. George Turner will handle the managerial reins.

The six teams play a 20-game schedule, meeting each other four times. All games will be on Monday and Wednesday nights with rained-out contests likely fitted in on Fridays.

The three openers Wednesday night will see N-D starting its title defence against Union Gas at Stodgell Park No. 1, Walkers meeting Remington Park at Prince Road Park and Merchants tangling with Aces at Wilson Park. All games will start at 5:45.

Fastball Action

Bali-Hi to Debut At Wigle Saturday

High-calibre fastball at the international level returns to Windsor Saturday night.

Bali-Hi Motor Hotel, Windsor's entry in the newly-formed International Major Fastball League, will make its 1960 home debut at Wigle Park Saturday night at 8 p.m. with the highly-rated Detroit Club 500 providing the opposition.

Harold Morency's Bali-Hi aggregation will be seeking its second victory of the young campaign. Last Friday at Wyandotte, Mich., the Windsor nine split a double-header to kick off the season.

Morency has attempted to line up the 'cream of the crop' among Windsor softballers for his Bali-Hi crew and appears to have done a good job.

The pitching staff is headed by veteran Detroit Ted Czack, a star for the past three or four seasons, and young right-hander Bill Chudyk.

In addition, Morency still hopes to have Gord Haidy available. Haidy, sometimes known as "The King" of Windsor softball, is committed to pitch in Sudbury this year but may not stay there.

Handling this starry trio of righthanders will be catchers Willie Ulicny and Andy Hooren.

The Bali-Hi infield is just about as good as it can be. Big Joe Fairhurst, regarded by many as the city's top hitter, is the anchorman at first base. Gord Pienderleith is at third, Earl Smith at shortstop and Len Parent at second with Abie Scott backing them up.

Such top-rated "gardeners" as Ted Zalba, Nick Sajatovich, Mike Ferencik, John Marcinko and Al Zdonek will play the outfield.

In addition to Bali-Hi and

Club 500, the make-up of this new league includes Toledo All-Stars, Wyandotte Chemicals, Huron Van Lines of Ypsilanti, Farrall Trucking of Allen Park and Peter's Sausage of Detroit, the latter better-known in 1959 as the Burch Mfg. squad featuring hurler 'Bonnie' Jones.

In Club 500, Bali-Hi should find some stiff opposition in its opener. The all-Negro squad is a colorful, flashy crew and last year it merely represented Detroit in the World tournament in Florida.

Fans attending Saturday night's opener will be interested in a few rule differences between softball and fastball. Bali-Hi's other two hits were a second-inning single by Plenderleith and Mike Ferencik's two-out bingle in the ninth.

The Windsor club resumes action Wednesday when they travel to Wyandotte, Mich., for a doubleheader.

The fieldhouse, ultra-modern in every respect, offers the city's Recreation Department a dandy office for its playgrounds operations, much-needed storage space and a couple of team dressing rooms which promise to be utilized plenty in the years ahead.

Sports Chatter

HERE'S a few choice softball items on this hot summer day:

It is our humble opinion that the managers of five teams in the Inter-City Softball League were more concerned about their own personal gains than they were about the general welfare of their league when they allowed the Windsor Aces to quit their circuit last week.

An announcement from league president Merle Evon indicated that the Aces withdrew their entry from the league because they were not able to round up enough players to field a full team. But, isn't it true that the Aces would still be among the Inter-City League entries if the league members had allowed them to sign up a couple of "emergency replacements?"

The Aces, their ranks thinned by a rash of injuries and job commitments, sought permission from the league membership to sign up catcher Glen Watkins and utility infielder-outfielder Jerry Nowitsky. It would have been a minor concession to this last-place club (3-11 record) and would have allowed the Aces to finish out their schedule.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

WHILE it is obvious that neither Watkins nor Nowitsky can be classed as "ringers," the Aces' rival teams unanimously decided that these replacements should not be allowed at this late date. Possibly, they were afraid that the tail-end Aces would be transformed into snarling tigers overnight.

As a serious consequence, the Aces folded up their operation and the league membership was allowed to shrink to five clubs at this most important stage of the campaign. It is our thought that this was a very foolish and selfish move on the part of the surviving five teams, a move which has cost the league considerable balance and prestige this season and might hurt the circuit even more when the time rolls around to reorganize for the '61 campaign.

WE'VE been watching with interest to see if the Manufacturers' Softball League is going to take any disciplinary action against Duplate outfielder Al Zdonek who slugged a spectator at Town Park in Amherstburg a couple of weeks ago during the 3rd inning of a league contest between Duplate and Brunner Mond.

League officials have maintained a strange silence following this incident but reports which have reached this corner would seem to indicate that some sort of suspension (beyond the automatic one-game banishment) should be assessed against the guilty player.

An incident of this nature, particularly when it involves a notoriously hot-tempered performer like Zdonek, has done nothing to boost the standing and prestige of the Manufacturers' League. A spectator, whether he is guilty of heckling a certain player or not, should be protected against any physical abuse from the players. He goes to a game and maintains the right to cheer and jeer in any method he chooses. Players, thin-skinned or not, have no cause to quit the playing field and invade the spectator section to slug a loud-mouthed patron.

The Zdonek incident should not be brushed off too lightly by the Manufacturers' League executive. After all, it's the fans who "pay the shot" and keep the interest alive in any league.

ART RAY, district representative for the Ontario Amateur Softball Association, is very disappointed. The reason for his unhappy mood? Windsor will be represented in just one division when the 1960 O.A.S.A. playdowns get under way in the near future.

Bull-Hi Motor Hotel has passed up the O.A.S.A. Senior "A" playdowns this term. That leaves Hiram Walkers and Local 240 to fight it out with Amherstburg Brunner Mond for the right to represent this area in the O.A.S.A. Intermediate Industrial series. Anderson Tavern of the 'Burg will contest the O.A.S.A. Intermediate "B" laurels.

BALI-HI has decided against O.A.S.A. play in the Senior "A" division because of the vast amount of travelling which would be involved. The locals did not relish the thought of going to Hamilton, Ottawa or Sudbury in quest of the provincial title honors, although the possibility of a Sudbury-Windsor series, pitting ex-Windsorite Metro Saeryk against the locals, would be an appetizing enough dish.

In the meantime, Bali-Hi is having its share of trouble in its newest venture, the International Major Fastball League. Harold Morency's Balinese boys have won just four games while losing nine. They hold down sixth place in the seven-team circuit and the road seems to be getting rougher every time out.

When Morency entered Bali-Hi in this Michigan-Ohio fastball loop, he figured that his club would make a pretty respectable showing. After all, he had most of the top softball talent in the district at his disposal, including pitchers Gordon Haldy, Bill Chudyk and Ted Czeck. It was a "loaded" ball club which figured to be reckoned with.

BUT, the breaks haven't been going Bali-Hi's way and Morency has found out that his club is playing in some pretty fast company. Spectator interest has been "good" and the brand of ball played in this league is "appealing." So, regardless of what the balance of the schedule brings to Bali-Hi, the season hasn't been entirely "lost."

Incidentally, if you haven't watched this league in action yet, Bali-Hi will play its next home game this Wednesday night at Windsor Stadium against Allen Park. Game-time is set for 8 p.m.

SPEAKING of the stadium, the "jury" has returned a verdict of "okay" regarding the new floodlighted softball diamond there. While the floodlights themselves are not perfect, it is the consensus that the new stadium's softball facilities are "just what the doctor ordered."

Since the first games were played at the stadium more than 10 days ago, attendance has been "excellent." The Manufacturers' League, which plans to offer doubleheaders there twice a week through the balance of the season, has been attracting its best crowds of the campaign. The Inter-City League, which made its debut at the stadium Monday night, attracted a bumper gathering.

Parks Commissioner Harry Brumpton and his staff deserve a big pat on the back for their untiring efforts on behalf of the district softballers at the stadium. The facilities have been long-awaited but we already know that the wait has not been in vain.

DICK HAMES, a Windsor boy who this year deserted the local scene looking for greener softball fields to conquer, apparently is doing very well for himself.

Hames, who pitched brilliantly for Bali-Hi and Embassy Hotel in recent seasons in the now defunct Rec League in Windsor, moved on to Providence, Rhode Island this summer and is enjoying a banner season on the mound for the Local 57 nine in that city.

JUST last week Hames turned in his tidiest effort of the season on behalf of Local 57, turning back the 1959 World softball champion Steelmasters from Aurora, Ill., 1-0 in an exhibition game.

Dick, the only son of Mrs. Ann Hames, 495 Randolph, has been pitching softball about nine or 10 years. He decided early to forego baseball and stick to softball. He's also a pretty good basketball player around the city in the wintertime but it's obvious from the Providence blurbs that softball pitching is his strong suit.

Sports Chatter.

HAVE Windsor's softball teams, players and supporters been doublecrossed by the politicians at City Hall? Is night-time softball at Windsor Stadium, thought to be flourishing in recent weeks, about to be abandoned because certain individuals at City Hall have forgotten all about a pact which was made with sports organizations in the city back on June 1?

Certainly, the fate of after-dark softball at the stadium is "up in the air" again as the result of a City Hall directive which was mailed to Merle Evon, president of the Manufacturers' Softball League and Inter-City Softball League, over the weekend.

This directive, appearing over the signature of Harry O. Brumpton, city Parks and Recreation commissioner, decreed:

"In the future, all doubleheader ball games which entail the use of the floodlights at Windsor Stadium will start not later than 6:30 p.m. If lighting is required after the hour of 9 p.m., an additional charge of \$10 per hour or any portion of an hour will be charged thereafter."

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

BRUPTON admits responsibility for this letter but indicates that "it was not my idea." The City's Recreation Committee, which established a scale of stadium rental rates for the 1960 calendar year back on June 1, denies any knowledge of the proposed "changes." The order, it seems, came from "higher up" ... which is very interesting.

Evon, representing the two top softball circuits in the city, has immediately reacted to the City Hall "memo" by declaring:

"We can't afford to play any more of our games at the stadium under those conditions. We'll simply quit the stadium for good and play the rest of our regularly-scheduled games and playoff games at other city diamonds where we can take up a silver collection. Let the stadium be a 'white elephant' if the people at City Hall want it that way."

WHAT'S behind this "new deal" which went into effect on Monday? Well, it would appear that City Hall is unhappy on two accounts.

First, it is felt that the doubleheader softball programs at the stadium, which have been starting at 7:30 p.m., have been running too late. Second, there is little doubt that the city is not satisfied with its share of the gate (20 percent of the gross gate). On a couple of instances, the city collected less than \$2 for its share of the gate, hardly enough to cover the hydro bill at the stadium. It is maintained that it costs a minimum of \$15 per night to operate the floodlights.

But, we feel that this is hardly reason enough for the moguls at City Hall to scrap the previously adopted scale of stadium rental rates. After all, it was unanimously agreed by the city's Recreation Committee on that June 1st evening (and passed by City Council five nights later) that the proposed scale of stadium rental rates should remain in effect until the end of 1960. At that time, it was further agreed, the rates would be subject to a thorough review by the Recreation Committee if the city felt that it was not getting its "fair share" of the proceeds from the stadium softball.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

ONLY three weeks have passed since the first after-dark games were played at the stadium. Already, it has been decided that the stadium rental rates should be adjusted. Such an adjustment (not approved by the Recreation Committee) went into effect yesterday.

Just for the record, the Manufacturers' League has played five doubleheaders and one tripleheader at the stadium while the Inter-City League has attempted one twin-bill. The best gate to date was \$49.25. After expenses—\$5 for a gatekeeper, \$8.85 (20%) to the Parks Board, \$7 for two scorekeepers and \$14 for four umpires, a net profit of \$15.40 was realized. This was hardly a money-making venture for the league involved when you stop to consider that the profits were evenly divided among the two home teams.

WE contacted Mayor Michael J. Patrick on the subject late Monday and "Mike" was sympathetic to the softballers' cause. He indicated that he would huddle with Brumpton in an effort to find a solution to the "awkward situation."

Evon, who readily admits that some of his doubleheaders have lasted far too late, has expressed a willingness to commence all future twin-bills by 6:30 p.m. He is hopeful that Brumpton will take it

upon himself to allow the second games of the twin-bills to continue until 10 or 10:30 p.m., at the latest, without an additional charge for the lights. Such a concession on Brumpton's part would seemingly clear away all existing obstacles to the resumption of night games at the stadium.

These double headers, incidentally, will only be required for a short time longer. Once the playoffs get under way next week, the doubleheaders will probably give way to one single game after dark, at least when the championship series are reached. Then, all problems will likely resolve themselves to everybody's satisfaction. The games will not last as long and there is certain to be more cash taken in at the gate—which means a larger 20% cut for the Parks Board.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

SO, let's resolve these difference, pronto. We know that the Manufacturers' League and Inter-City League officials are willing to "give a little" if the parties in the other camp do the same. There is no sound reason why the stadium softball promotion should suddenly terminate.

Joe Fan, the spectator-taxpayer who will graciously pick up the tab if the venture does lose money, has unanimously approved the project. He likes the idea of coming home from work, eating a leisurely supper, reading the paper and grabbing "20 winks" before heading out to the ball game.

EVERYBODY suffers, particularly in the fall of the year, when floodlight ball is not available and the crucial playoff games have to commence at 5—5:15 p.m.

The main objective of Brumpton and Evon should be to see that the stadium's softball activities do not crumble in the dust. Right now, it is a definite asset to the city's sports program. Long-awaited, it will "catch on" more and more next year and the year after.

The stadium is there, the floodlights are there and the surroundings are first class, particularly on a hot, humid summer night. They should be used to the fullest extent and Harry Brumpton, as Parks and Recreation commissioner, should make that possible. Surely, nobody's going to make a great deal of money out of it but that's not the object of amateur sports, is it?

Walkers Chuck Softball Play

After riding on a merry-go-round for almost 48 hours, Hiram Walkers withdrew its entry from the Ontario Amateur Softball Association Intermediate Industrial play-downs Wednesday.

Al Milne, public relations representative for the distillery, announced the team's withdrawal from the provincial playdowns after O.A.S.A. president W. C. Perkin of Simcoe had ordered Walkers to play a sudden-death game against the Sarnia Polymers at Tecumseh Park, Chatham, late this afternoon to complete their semi-final series.

Art Ray, district convener for the O.A.S.A., confirmed the fact that the Distillers were forfeiting today's proposed game to Sarnia with the comment: "It's my personal opinion that we're getting a dirty deal."

At the same time, Ray, who is second vice-president of the O.A.S.A. and chairman of the O.A.S.A.'s rules committee, strongly hinted that he will sever all relations with the softball organization at the close of the 1960 season as the result of its "mishandling" of the Walkers-Sarnia series.

Milne, after a series of conferences with team manager Billy Boyce, told the Star:

"Under the circumstances, we feel that it is best to withdraw our team from future O.A.S.A. competition. We can not go on with the O.A.S.A. ruling which forced us to play a sudden-death game with Sarnia. It was our understanding that this series was forfeited to us more than one week ago."

Walkers and Sarnia were originally scheduled to open a best-of-three semi-final series in the Intermediate Industrial playdowns at Lanspeary Park on Sunday, Aug. 28. The Sarnia club failed to make an appearance for the game and it was acknowledged that the series was being forfeited to Windsor.

Last week, however, officials of the Sarnia Polymers club appealed to Perkin that it was not able to play in Windsor on Aug. 28 because it took part in an O.A.S.A. Intermediate "A" playoff game at Stratford the previous night (Saturday, Aug. 27).

Perkin then ruled that the Sunday game should not be ruled a forfeiture and ordered Walkers and Sarnia to play their sudden-death game today.

Perkins' ultimatum reached the city late Monday. When informed of it, Walkers manager Billy Boyce informed Ray that his club was planning to forfeit the proposed game to Sarnia and withdraw from the O.A.S.A. playdowns.

Less than 24 hours later, the Walkers players held a special

meeting and voted 8-2 to continue in the playoffs. So, today's game was "on" again.

Shortly before noon on Wednesday, however, another meeting was held at Walkers and, on the advice of Milne, it was decided to quit the playoffs.

Ray, in the meantime, is bitter about Perkins' "interference" and his ultimatum to Walkers.

"That forfeited game should stand. It cost Walkers a considerable amount of money for umpires and a scorekeeper that Sunday. Sarnia should have notified us well in advance if it did not plan to make the trip here."

"I can't blame Walkers for quitting the playoffs. They've gotten a raw deal. The O. A. S. A. has double-crossed me on this matter and I don't expect to have anything more to do with the organization after this season."

Sarnia now advances against either Peterborough or Oshawa on Saturday, Sept. 17, in the O.A.S.A. Intermediate Industrial final. Stratford Krochlers beat out the Polymers in their Intermediate "A" series earlier this week.

Walkers, in the meantime, will concentrate on its Manufacturers' Softball League final against Duplate which it trails by a 2-1 margin.

YEAR in and year out, it seldom fails to happen: Windsor has been "jobbed" again by the Ontario Amateur Softball Association. It's happened many times before and will happen many times again as long as local clubs are foolish enough to pursue the provincial softball laurels.

Remember how Bali-Hi Motor Hotel was "jobbed" at Stittsville in 1956? Remember how Gerry Parent's Dominion Twist Drill teams twice got the "dirty end of the stick" in the early '50s? Remember how the Ford Office Juniors were "taken for a ride" at Belleville in the late '40s?

The O.A.S.A. seldom misses the opportunity to "job" local teams. The intimate details of our latest "hosing" can be found in the news columns elsewhere on today's sports pages. But, in short, Hiram Walkers has quit the O.A.S.A. Intermediate Industrial playdowns in protest of an unexpected ultimatum from O.A.S.A. president W. C. Perkin of Simcoe and Art Ray, that hard-working ex-umpire who was destined to become president of the O.A.S.A. in 1963, has indicated that he will sever all connections with the provincial softball organization at the conclusion of the 1960 season.

WHAT'S all the fuss about? Well, it centred around a best-of-three semi-final series between Walkers and Sarnia Polymers, a series which appeared to be forfeited to the locals when Sarnia failed to fulfill a local commitment back on Sunday, Aug. 28.

The Distillers were marking time in anticipation of their next opponent when Perkin got a tearful earful from Sarnia, overruled Art Ray's handling of the series and ordered the forfeiture to be thrown out. Perkin further decreed that Walkers should play a sudden-death game against Sarnia at Chatham this afternoon, the winner to advance into the division final against either Peterborough or Oshawa.*

A double-crossed Walkers team naturally quit the playoffs in a huff and how can you blame them? And Ray, obviously stabbed in the back by his fellow O.A.S.A. executive members, is ready to tell his "friends" in the softball organization where to go. And the O.A.S.A. wonders why there are so few playoff entries from the Windsor district each summer ! ! !

BEFORE leaving this now-sordid topic, here's a question we'd like to ask certain O.A.S.A. executive members: Is the O.A.S.A. in such a sad state that it must continue to accept entries from one team in two divisions?

The fiasco involving Hiram Walkers and Sarnia would have never come about if the Polymers had been restricted to one classification instead of being allowed to enter the same team in both the Intermediate Industrial and Intermediate "A" playdowns. Closer to home, there is no sound reason why Brunner Mond of Amherstburg should be allowed to enter in the Intermediate Industrial and Intermediate "B" groups simultaneously each year.

Our district problem was solved, of course, when Walkers beat out Brunner Mond in the district final of the Industrial playdowns but there's no guarantee that Brunner Mond won't have two clubs seeking O.A.S.A. honors next season. The O.A.S.A. must either be hard up for entries or short of revenue from entry fees to continue this stupid practice of allowing one team to enter two championship series.

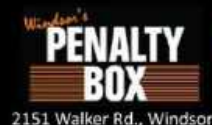
