Norm Bagnell Bested By Windsor Ace

Norm Bagnell, Tri-Bell A.C.'s ace hurler, finally met his match in Windsor-Calcot's, Dick Hames.

Hames and Bagnell matched pitch for pitch throughout the first game of the best-ofthree quarter-finals of the Ontario Amateur Softball Association championships, to delight the 850 fans on hand at Kinsmen park, Saturday.

Hames came out on top, Toronto whitewashing the

Bagnell, a veteran of 20 senior campaigns, has delighted fans of the North York loop all season with his unmatched pitching. Saturday, he was as good as ever, whiffing 16 men, walking one and giving up five hits.

But Hames, a substitute for regular mound man Bonnie Jones, who is at the world softball tournament in Florida, held the upper hand in the pitching duel, retiring Rugger Results 17 men via the strike-out route, walking one also, and giving up only two hits.

Calcot's Stock Rises for 1961 Fans 20 for Merchants

Acquisition of Jones Makes the Difference

Although it finished well down the list in 1960, Windsor's entry in the International Major Fastball League is looking toward the new season with high hopes.

With a new sponsor (Calcot Hotel) assuming the financial burden, manager Harold Morency and head coach Jim Mousseau have assembled another strong club in the field and with the bat.

But what makes the 1961 Calcot season so interesting is the recent signing of pitcher Bonnie Jones, regarded as one of the very best moundsmen in the United States.

Jones, 28, has been named by Mousseau as his starting hurler Saturday night when Calcot inaugurates a new season at Windsor Stadium under the lights at 8 p.m. against Detroit 500 Club.

Jones, who hurled Detroit Peter's Sausage to the International League crown last season, had already announced his retirement from the game when Calcot officials approached him. It didn't take long for the ace hurler to change his mind and join the Windsor club.

"I liked the idea of playing for Windsor because felt the team could go places," he said. "Besides, I had thought that this was the best hitting club in the loop last year."

In a 12-year career, Jones owns a brilliant 379-63 record. He has hurled 108 no-hitters. 31 of them perfect games. He has fanned over 7,000 batters and on 21 occasions fanned the entire opposition in seveninning contests in Michigan State tournament play.

A six - one, 200 - pounder, Jones has been on two state champions and five Detroit city titlists. He has been in four World tournaments where he owns a 9-4 record although none of his teams won the title.

Last year he was troubled by a sore arm but still compiled an over-all 58-5 record in winning the International, Palmer, Park and City of Detroit league titles. He was 62-4 in 1959 when his team also swept all three crowns.

Jones is also a pretty good man with the stick. Local fans will remember him last year as the first batter to whack a homerun out of the confines of Windsor Stadium. ,

Veteran Ted Czack returns to the Windsor club as the No. 2 hurler while young Sam Sisco will be the third man. Andy Van Hooren will be behind the plate with veteran Abie Scott backing him up.

Mousseau has signed a holdover first-string infield which sees big Joe Fairhurst at first base. Len Parent at second. Earl Smith at shortstop and Gord Plenderleith at the hot corner. Backing them up will be Scott, Russ Rudling and Jerry Nowitsky.

Ted Zalba, one of the league's top hitters last season, anchors the outfield which also includes John Marcinko, Al Zdonek, Hank Czerwieniec, Mike Ferencik and Nowitsky.

Missing from last year's Bali-Hi team are catcher Willie Ulicny and veteran hurler Gord Haidy. Ulicny is piloting a team in the Border City loop while Haidy, now residing in Allen Park, is reported to be ready to pitch for one of the U.S. entries in the International circuit.

The 500 Club, a predominantly-Negro team, is one of the finest in the area. They finished one-two behind Peter's Sausage last year and forced Jones to pitch a 1-0 no-hitter to kayo them in the finals.

Pre-game ceremonies Saturday evening will see a quartet of celebrities in action, Mayor Michael J. Patrick will do the honors on the mound. Former N.H.L. great Ted Lindsay will be at bat and sportscaster Joe Gentile will do the catching. Windsor Star sports editor Jack Dulmage will act as the umpire in the opening-game ceremonies to start at 7-45 nm







SOME mental meanderings along Windsor's sports row as the mid-summer point approaches (Ed. Note—subtitle: Life with a Lazy Sportswriter):

Although one major softball circuit in the city, the Inter-City loop, is now in its playoffs, it will be some time before the other such groups reach a similar stage.

The Manufacturers' League, the top-rated circuit, won't start playoffs for a couple of weeks although its schedule is almost completed while the Border City League still will be playing league contests as late as Aug. 16 and maybe later.

However, followers of these three loops as well as Senior Church League fans will have an opportunity on Thursday, Aug. 10 to see how their pets stack up in inter-League competition.

That's the date for the big charity softball evening at Windsor Stadium featuring All-Star teams from the four circuits in a well-planned double-header.

In the opener at 6:30, the Church League All-Stars will meet the Border City All-Stars. At 8 p.m., the Manufacturers' and Inter-City 'Stars will renew their rivalry for the fourth time in the second half of the double-bill.

.

PRESIDENT MERLE EVON of the Manufacturers' League states that the entire proceeds from the gate will be given to a charity, the Red Cross Crippled Children. There will be a host of door prizes while the umpires and scorers will donate their services.

Evon, who is looking after the project, also hopes to get the use of the Stadium free of charge to reduce the overhead to practically nothing. All they need now is people.
