Inter-City Debuts Monday

Expect Hot Flag Chase In Eight-Team Circuit

The season doesn't open until Monday night, but already they're saying the Inter-City Softball League, circa 1962, may turn out to be the most-competitive and best-balanced circuit in Windsor in the last four or five seasons.

Boasting eight entries, all dotted with name players, the I-C circuit hits the starting barrier on three fronts Monday night.

River Canard meets Windsor Police at Lanspeary Park. Island View Tavern opens defence of its 1961 title at Wilson Park against Oliver's Spring Service and Erie House tackles French-Canadian Centre at Shore Acres Park on the opening bill-of-fare.

Action will continue over a 21-game schedule every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at the three Windsor diamonds and the softball layout at River Canard.

All four league members in 1961 are back plus four strong new clubs. Martin House, champions last year, are under the Island View Tavern banner this term. Hiram Walkers, Ritz Hotel and River Canard are other returnees.

New entries are Erie House, Oliver's Spring Service, Windsor Police and the French-Canadian Centre team which compiled an unbeaten season in the Sandwich East League in 1961.

The circuit, handled by the team managers instead of an executive, has announced that only four teams of the eight will make the playoffs, a small but important item that will make the action that much more competitive.

Following is a partial rundown of each team's personnel in alphabetical order:

ERIE HOUSE—Manager Leo Leger has brought righthander Joe Budinsky with him from last year's Martin House team which should be enough right there. But he also has Don Begley behind the plate and an infield boasting Steve Sobocan, Tom Kilgallen, Phil Abbott and Joe Ponik. In the outfield are such name stars as Don Ethier and Al Zdonek and possibly Norm 'Porky' Jones who, of course, will also pitch. John Ferencik will be in reserve.

FRENCH-CANADIAN CENTRE—Bill Noble and Mel McCartney will share pitching duties for manager "Pee-Wee" Quenneville with Norm Hall and Don Long behind the plate. Earl Smith at shortstop is F.-C.'s choice as the player allowed each team from last year's International League. His infield mates include Bob Wilkins, Bill Moore, Bob Quenneville and Rosy Trahan with Nick Sajatovich, Jerry Sadai, Lou Cochois, Vince Sobocan and Doug Souilliere in the outfield.

HIRAM WALKERS — Manager Jim Mower has MVP Dick Ducharme back again and he'll pitch, along with Ed Derus, and play all over the place as well. Kiel Nantau and Doc McCarthy (outfield, too) are behind the plate. Ron Wilson, John Harcarufka, Wayne Rawlings, Hank Dumouchelle, Al Smith and Gary Quenneville are infield candidates. Dave McClelland anchors the outfield which also

includes Bill Martin along with McCarthy, Ducharme and Quenneville.

ISLAND VIEW TAVERN—Larry Cascadden is the playing manager and he'll work at first base with Andy Van Hooreet catching. Wally Parent will do the bulk of the pitching but Jim Millman is also signed. Infielders include Don Cameron, George Mahler, Arnie McCallum, Walt Caplin and coach Red Miro. The outfield includes Joe Ivan, Don Rideout, Jim McKay and Jack Pacey.

OLIVER'S SPRING SERVICE—Manager Mel Lewis counts on ace hurler Don MacEwan for a lot of victories, backed by young Hec Marinacci. He has a good club behind him, too, including catcher Willie Ulicny and infielders Cal Pearson, Len Parent, Ron Carley, Clayt Brent, Denny Morrison and Gord Miller. The outer garden boasts such as Larry Johnston (pitcher, too), Jerry Grabowski, Mel Carter and Doug Carley. Pat McEachen is the second receiver.

RITZ HOEL—Much of this team's success will depend on whether manager Bill Kaschak lands pitcher Sam Sisco or not. The Police and Walkers are also after him. Kaschak also has Bill Bolohan, Al Lansing and 15-year-old Gord Bates on his mound staff with Lionel Rivait and possibly Harley Curtis catching. Harvey Burns, Pat Keane, Bill Beaudry, Phil Hebert, Jim Moore, and Frank Conley are among those signed at the moment for infield and outfield duty.

RIVER CANARD—A question mark at this writing with manager Steve Temesy having lost several stars from last year's league finalists. He still has Bob Sorenson to pitch, Joe Beneteau, Jim Harwood and Jim Sylvester for the infield and Chuck Maxim in the outfield. Temesy also picked up Butch Rivard for the outfield and hard-hitting third baseman Ray Bastien from Essex but needs more ball players at the moment, especially at first base and behind the plate.

WINDSOR POLICE—Playing-pilot Ron Thompson has a strong lineup ready with Ron Hatch and Jack Krutsch sharing the hurling and Joe Gibalo and Thompson catching. Fred Robinson, Dunc Stewart, Tom Paterson and Neil Mathieson will be infield headliners, ditto John Zdonek, Pat Murphy, Al Langlois and George Rocheleau in the outfield. Reserves include Tom Mailloux, Brian Shannon, Ray LeBlanc, "Scotty" Laughland, Dave Workman and Mel Hodges.

Play Opens Wednesday

Border City Clubs Bolster Metro Loop

With eight entries in the fold, the Metro Softball League begins its third season of play this week on an optimistic note.

This year's edition of the Metro circuit will feature many new faces from the Border City League of 1961 which failed to operate this year. The influx of stronger personnel should make the Metro League a well-balanced and competitive loop.

Two teams, Amherstburg Beatniks and International Tool, have moved over from the Border City group while another B.C. team of two seasons ago, Maple Leaf House, is back in action. The only other new team is Allan's Meats.

Windsor Mail and Grand Hotel are back from 1961 while White's Elbow Room is last year's St. Clair Tavern team. The Windsor Barber Supply outfit is the Drouillard Barber School team with a new name and several additions from the 1961 league champions, Wyandotte Tavern.

Many members of the 1961 runners-up, Club Castor, will be found with the Grand House.

Now considered the second-ranking loop in the city behind the Inter-City League, the Metro group, like the I.C., will play a 21-game schedule with four teams qualifying for playoffs.

Four Windsor diamonds and the arc lights at Amherstburg will be the scene of action on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights.

White's will be in Amherstburg Wednesday night at 8 p.m. to face the Beatniks in the league opener. Three games are on tap Thursday, Grand House vs Allan's Meats at Shore Acres, International Tool vs Windsor Mail at Stodgell and Maple Leaf House vs Windsor Barber Supply at Lanspeary Park.

Team managers are as follows: Maple Leaf House (Dave Clinansmith), Windsor Mail (Conrad Senay), Allan's Meats (Bud Havens), White's Elbow Room (Bob Queenan), Windsor Barber Supply (Al Mayer), Amherstburg (Maynard Hurst), International Tool (Luce Bailargeon), Grand House (Richard Casey).

Al Alofs is serving as league president while Ernie Hamilton handles the secretary-treasurer chores.

Erie House, hurled a nifty two-hitter at Shore Acres Park as Erie House blanked French-Canadian Centre, 6-0.

In the other games, Don MacEwan's fine hurling for Oliver's Spring Service toppled Island View Tavern, 5-1, at Wilson Park, and Windsor Police out-slugged River Canard, 10-7, at Lanspeary Park.

Budinsky struck out eight and walked only one and was never in trouble. He faced no more than four batters in any inning. Bill Noble, who went the route for F-C Centre, fanned 11 and also walked just one but was touched for 11 hits, four of them by Norm 'Porky' Jones.

Erie House scored twice on one hit in the third and added three more in the sixth to clinch it. Jones' double, Al Zdonek's triple and Joe Ponic's two-base knock were the big blows in the inning.

Tom Kilgallen and Zdonek each laced a pair of safeties to back up Jones' four-for-five effort. Kilgallen's homer ended the scoring in the 9th.

MacEwan edged Wally Parent in the fine mound duel in their game. MacEwan fanned seven and walked one while Parent struck out nine but was in constant trouble with

six walks, not to mention three unearned runs.

A two-out throwing error gave Oliver's a run in the second and they nursed that lead, although failing to hit, until the 5th. Then Parent fumbled Gord Miller's squib back to the mound with two out and Len Parent followed with Oliver's first hit, a long homer to right-centre field.

Oliver's added singletons in the 6th and 7th while McEwan lost his shutout when Larry Cascadden smashed a one-on triple in the 8th. Don Rideout for the losers and Len Parent each had a pair of safeties.

Trailing 1-3, Police tied six runs in the bottom of the third inning and were never headed. Tom Mailloux drove in two runs with a single in the inning, and Fred Robinson followed with a triple. Joe Gibala's two-run homer in the 5th clinched it.

Butch Rivard hit a bases-empty homer for River Canard in the seventh. Rivard, one-for-two, scored four of the loser's runs. Mailloux belted three safeties for the winners and Gibala had two as Ron Hatch got the win with a seven-hitter over Bob Sorenson.

THEY all know the financial risk involved but softball teams in the Windsor area still keep coming back for more as far as the Ontario Amateur Softball Association's annual playdown run is concerned.

District O.A.S.A. convener Art Ray announced this week that seven local and district squads have filed entry and will soon start down the glory trail, their hopes high of bagging an Ontario championship.

Every year it's the same story. A team goes O.A.S.A., loses its shirt or possibly only the buttons, depending on how far it goes, then vows it won't do it again.

Maybe not but there always seems to be another squad ready to make the try. There's no way to make money without miracles. Sometimes the sponsor will willingly take the beating. Other times the players are forced to dip into their own pockets to pile up enough travelling funds.

Be that as it may, Windsor still has its best O.A.S.A. entry in years this summer. Mr. Ray is a persuasive fellow.

Heading the list, of course, is the Arena Sport Shop aggregation which bids to retain the top crown of them all, the senior "A" bauble.

★ ★ ★ ★ ★

IN 1961, most of the present Arena Sport Shop roster played on the Colcat Hotel team that swept aside all opposition without the loss of one contest in grabbing the "A" crown.

They'll be minus a couple of standouts in pitcher Dick Hames and outfielder Hank Czerwiec this year but manager Dick Meloché still figures his outfit will give a good account of itself.

INCIDENTALLY, this observer is not one to belittle a softball umpire and never has been. His job is a tough one. But I've come to the conclusion that the Windsor Umpires Association should take a long look at some of the decisions rendered by its members this year.

It's true that the Inter-City League has more than its share of "beefers" who holler just for the sake of hollering. But there are many others who won't say much until they have a justifiable beef.

This latter group has had plenty of grounds this season. There have been many well-handled games but too many of the other kind featuring decisions that no mature man should make. I hope for the sake of softball's future in Windsor some improvement is soon seen.

Respect for the man in blue is vanishing and it shouldn't be.

THE Arena nine will engage St. Thomas Western Hotel in its first round and arrangements have been made for a best-of-five series, detouring from the usual best-of-three O.A.S.A. plan.

Windsor's first hurdle may be its toughest chiefly because the lanky Mr. Hames is the No. 1 hurler for the St. Thomas club. Dick now works and resides in London while Czerwiec, leading the Senior Inter-County Baseball League in hitting for London Majors, is also expected to play for the St. Thomas team.

They'll open with a double-header in St. Thomas Aug. 18 and 19 then swing back to Windsor the following weekend for two more games, if a fourth is necessary.

In senior "B" ranks, Leo Leger, who managed Martin House to within two outs of an Ontario title last summer, is back again, this time with Erie House.

Erie House features the pitching of Joe Budinsky but also boasts a fine all-round aggregation. Leger has picked up several of the Inter-City League's star players to round out his travelling squad.

Like three other Windsor nines, Erie House will meet a Sarnia area representative in the first round, in Sarnia Aug. 22 and in Windsor Aug. 26.



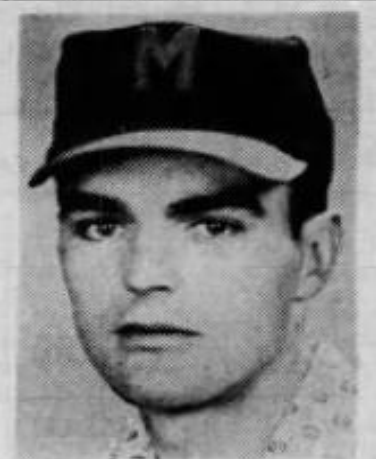
F-C Centre Takes Title By Forfeit
