# City Softballers Ready to Start

## Inter-City Seen as Top Circuit

Four or five softball leagues—depending on how you count them—embracing 24 teams will operate in the Windsor area this season with relatively few changes from last year.

The six-team Inter-City League will again be the premier circuit in the area. Sandwich East and Metro leagues of 1962 have combined into an eight-team circuit with two divisions playing an interlocking schedule, but with separate playoff arrangements leading to an overall championship series.

The other two loops, both of which operated in 1962, are the four-team Suburban League and the six-team Civic League.

The Inter-City loop, which has cut back from eight teams in 1962 to six for this season, will be the last circuit to open—it debuts on Wednesday, May 22.

French-Canadian Centre, the 1962 champions, will be back in a bid to retain the title. Other returnees are Hiram Walkers, River Canard, Windsor Police and Ritz Hotel. The new entry is Riviera Motor Hotel.

Each club will play a 20-game schedule with action slated at Windsor Stadium, River Canard, Wilson, Lanspeary and Stodgell parks on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights.

Bill Andrews has been named president of the league

and George Mahler will act as secretary-treasurer.

The Sandwich East and Windsor Metro League will operate with a five-team Sandwich East Division and a three-team Windsor Division with each team playing 17 games in an interlocking schedule.

In the Sandwich East Division, Coates and Dunseith Sunoco takes over sponsorship of the 1962 champion Remington Park entry. Other clubs are Canada Tavern, Skylark-Fleming House, Local 444 and Lauzon Stop House.

The Windsor Division has Windsor Plumbing, Grand House and International Tool entries.

The circuit debuts next Tuesday night with games at

Booster, Stodgell, Coronation and Lanspeary parks. The league will play Tuesday and Thursday nights with games also scheduled for Kiwanis and Wilson parks.

Gord Bacon heads the executive of the combined league with Glenn Watkins serving as vice-president and Ernie Handbridge as secretary-treasurer. Al Alofs is the Metro representative on the executive.

The Suburban League, under the guidance of president George Warrender, vice-president Bernie Soulliere and secretary-treasurer Bob Miller, will go with Erie House, the 1962 champions, Windsor Merchants, Riverside and Mady's Big Boy Drive-In.

The teams will play an 18-

game schedule opening Tuesday night with Erie House meeting Mady's at Memorial Park and Merchants facing Riverside at Stop 26 diamond. Games will also be played Thursday at Memorial and Stodgell Parks.

Joe Ponio and John Marcinco will be at the helm of Erie House. Leo Leger guides Windsor Merchants, Dick Drouillard pilots Riverside and Bernie Soulliere manages Mady's. Each club will be allowed to sign three Inter-City League players, excluding pitchers.

The six-team Civic League has undergone a couple of minor changes with Windsor Mail replacing Junior Achievement and Immigration expanding with the inclusion of Tunnel help.

The other clubs are 1962 champion Local 543 (City Hall), Customs, Windsor Utilities and Unemployment Insurance.

Under the guidance of president Doug Davies, vice-president Dan Costea and secretary-treasurer Chuck Tollmie, the circuit, which debuts next week, will play each Wednesday night at Optimist and Memorial parks.

# New Combined Loop Ushers in Softball

The recently-organized Sandwich East and Windsor Metro Softball League kicks off a 68-game schedule tonight with a four-game card, including one interlocking test.

The circuit, as its name suggests, is a combination of last season's Sandwich East League and Windsor Metro League. This season, the loop will function in two divisions—a five-team township group and a three-team Windsor branch.

Each will operate as a separate entity, but the results of interlocking games will count in the standing of each division. Separate playoffs will be held with the divisional champions meeting for the overall championship.

In the lone interlocking game tonight, Local 444 of the Sandwich East circuit faces Grand House of the Windsor division at Stodgell Park.

The Unionmen, managed by Stan Trantor, have a three-man hurling corps — Jack Westlake, Norm Horn and Ed Rocheleau—ready to go. Ivan Meloche's Grand House, made up mostly of former Maple Leaf House players, will counter with Ron France.

In the Sandwich East Division, Canada Tavern tackles Coates and Dunseith, 1962 champions under the Remington Park banner, at Booster Park.

Wally Parent and Len Sampson handle the hurling chores for Bob Brydges' Tavern crew and Jim Bennett and Jerry Renaud fling 'em for Art Donovan's defending champions.

The other township circuit contest pits Laurzon Stop House against Skylark-Fleming House at Coronation Park. Andy

Vaicke and Hank Keil form a two-man mound corps for "Flash" Genga's Stop House club and Chick Logan's Combines have Dave Brooks and John Monaghan ready for pitching duty.

Windsor Plumbing and International Tool of the Windsor Division clash in the night's other tilt. Bob Reid and Will Janisse will handle the hurling for the Plumbers under manager Roger Lemieux.

International Tool's Garnet Soucie has Brian Plant and Art Anderson lined up to do the firing.

With plenty at stake in every game due to the interlocking factor, here's a league that should produce some interesting action through the 1963 season.

The club, Sandwich East loop champions in 1962 under the Remington Park banner, plastered Canada Tavern, 13-0, Tuesday night in one of four games in the eight-team, two-division circuit.

In the lone interlocking game, Local 444 of the Sandwich East Division stopped the Windsor Division's Grand House, 8-6. In other tilts, Lauzon Stop House edged Skylark-Fleming House, 3-1, and Windsor Plumbing ripped International Tool, 10-4.

Hefty Jim Bennett chilled Canada Tavern on one hit and cracked out three himself as Coates and Dunseith romped. It was a close contest until the fifth when the winners pushed across four runs for a 6-0 margin.

Ben Glaude paced a 17-hit attack with four safeties and Larry Painter batted in four runs with a double and single.

Rival hurler Len Sampson picked up the lone hit off Bennett, a one-out single in the third inning.

Local 444 cut loose with an extra-base hitting attack in the top of the seventh inning to overcome a 6-3 Grand House advantage in the interlocking contest.

A pair of singles, Red Miro's triple, Frank Lasorda's double and Ray Bastein's homerun accounted for the winners' last-inning output, but Bob Snyder paced a nine-hit assault by the Unionmen with two doubles and a single. Jim Stannard, Bill Willson and Tom Bradd each had two hits for Grand House.

In the best-played game of the night, Andy Valcke tossed a five-hitter to lead Stop House's victory over Skylark. Consecutive doubles by Jerry Sadai and Don Cameron and Moe Lappan's single plated two runs in the fifth frame for the winners' victory margin.

Each of those three players had two hits to account for all the safeties given up by John Monynahan. Bob Hamilton, with a double and single, topped the Combines at the plate.

Wilf Janisse was touched for 11 hits, but stranded 10 International Tool runners as Windsor Plumbing pulled out all the stops. The winners touched Brian Plante and Art Anderson for only eight hits, but seven walks and six errors hurt the losers.

# Now It's Fastball Bulldogs

Champion in its last year of operation in the International Fastball League, Windsor will go gunning for title laurels in a return to the circuit this season.

Windsor Bulldogs, with most of last season's O.A.S.A. Senior "A" champion Windsor Arena Sports Shop back in the lineup, opens a 36-game schedule Saturday night at Windsor Stadium against Detroit Allen Park.

The Windsor club, provincial champions for the last two years, will try to make it three-in-a-row when O.A.S.A. playoff time rolls around a few months hence.

The Bulldogs, working under a three-man managerial setup of Sedo Martinello, Gord Plenderleith and Gord Haidy, will mainly play Saturday night home dates and Sunday afternoon road contests. In all cases, doubleheaders will be scheduled.

Entered in the 10-team International League, in addition to the Bulldogs and Allen Park, are Detroit Birch Mfg., Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Lansing, Pontiac, Wyandotte and Detroit Club 500 from Michigan, and Fremont, Ohio.

In addition to Haidy, the mound corps is expected to include Sam Sisco, Dick Hames, who will commute from London, and Bill Noble. Abie Scott and Andy VanHooren are ticketed to handle the catching chores.

Last season's infield of first baseman Joe Fairhurst, second baseman Len Parent, shortstop Earl Smith and Plenderleith have all signified a desire to return.

The outfield corps will call on Nick Sajatovich, John Marcinko, Ted Zalba, Jerry Nowitsky and Louis (Junior) Barash. The latter player has returned to these parts after a hockey sojourn in several Ontario centres and the Maritimes.

Birch Mfg., with Bonnie Jones lined up for mound duties, is expected to be one of the top contenders for the pennant. Jones twirled for Calcot Hotel when the Windsor club took the International League crown in 1961.

# Wilf Janisse Pitches First No-Hit Contest

Windsor Plumbing's Wilf Janisse unfurled the first pitching masterpiece in major district softball circles this season by tossing a no-hit game at Skylark Restaurant Tuesday night in the Sandwich East-Metro League.





**Fails to Hold 4-0 Lead in Ninth**

# N-D Blows Championship To Oshawa Seniors, 6-4

If ever a team had an Ontario Amateur Softball Association title in its grasp and blew it, it was Windsor's N-D Supermarket nine.

After squaring their best-of-three Southern senior B final series with a sparkling 7-0 win Saturday afternoon, the Marketmen took a 4-0 lead into the ninth inning of the decisive game at night—and wound up losing 6-4 to Oshawa Heffering Imperials in the 11th.

Oshawa was soundly whipped for eight innings at night as Bob Sorenson rolled along on a four-hit shutout.

But before he could get the three needed outs, Oshawa tallied four times, three on Ron Simco's two-out homer. Then Hefferings broke through for two more in the 11th to win it all.

The ninth started innocently enough when Bill Jordan pinch-hit for pitcher Reg White and drew a walk. Bob Mathewson running, Ralph O'Deilly singled but Jack Shearer popped to the infield. Joe Piontiak then rapped a slow roller back to Sorenson

who threw wild to first, scoring Mathewson.

N-D seemed out of trouble when Sorenson fanned Reg Hickey but then Simco stepped up and unloaded his three-run shot to right-centre to tie it up.

A walk, a sacrifice and singles by Piontiak and Hickey broke the deadlock in the 11th. N-D missed a great chance in the bottom of the ninth when they got the first two men on but couldn't bring them around.

Mathewson, who relieved White on the mound, was the winner although allowing three hits and a walk in three innings. Sorenson fanned 11 and walked only two in taking the defeat. It was a bitter pill for Sorenson in another way. His mates left 14 runners stranded to only three by Oshawa.

Hank Dumouchelle of N-D led both teams at the plate with three singles.

The afternoon game saw Don MacEwan, despite seeing limited action in recent weeks, toss a masterful three-hit shutout at the Hefferings. He walked four but struck out six. Hickey who pitched the first five innings and change, took the loss.

Willie Ulinicy's single which plated Mike Ferencik in the first inning proved to be the decisive blow. Mel Carter put it beyond reach, however, by sending Hickey to the showers with a three-run homer

which made it 7-0 in the sixth inning.

Ferencik and Carter with two bingles each, led the N-D plate parade in this game.

The Oshawa team will now play host to the Northern Ontario champions in the All-Ontario senior B final this weekend.
