Jack Sidle hit a bases-empty homerun for East Windsor Tavern while Ron Ethier connected for a three-run homer for Silverstein's.

Jack Moynahan was the winning pitcher. The loss went to Gord Bate.

Dan Allen cracked a grand-slam home run in the 6th inning to lead Windsor Mechanical Contractors to its easy win over the Merchants.

Jim Bennett, who tolled the final five innings in relief of WMC starter Wilf Janisse, was the winning pitcher. The Merchants managed only three hits, all of them at the expense of Bennett.

Al Alofs rattled out three singles in as many trips to the plate for WMC.

The latter team will be sponsored by N & D but will consist chiefly of players from the Merchants (last year's Ritz Hotel squad).


Other teams in the league are French-Canadian Centre, Oliver's Spring Service, Hiram Walkers, Argo Cleaners and Essex.

Six Teams In Circuit

Metro Loop Opens New Softball Year

The six-team Windsor Metro Softball League kicks off the district diamond season Wednesday with an arc-light game at Amherstburg opening a 54-game schedule.

The circuit has undergone considerable change since the close of last season when it played an interlocking schedule with the Sandwich East League.

The six clubs ready to hit the wire for the 1964 campaign are Windsor Merchants, East Windsor Tavern, Silverstein's Produce, 1964 champion International Tool, Windsor Mechanical Contractors and Amherstburg.

Silverstein's will provide the opposition for Amherstburg in the 8 p.m. opener on the downriver club's diamond.

Thursday night, the other four clubs get into action with Merchants facing East Windsor Tavern at Stodgell Park and International Tool tangling with Mechanical Contractors at Lanspeary Park. Both games are slated for 6 p.m.

All league action will be played on four fronts — at Amherstburg on Wednesday nights and at Windsor's Lanspeary, Stodgell and Wilson parks on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Amherstburg games start at 8 p.m. and Windsor games at 6 p.m.

The schedule winds up on July 15 with best-of-five semi-final series scheduled to start July 21. The final for the league

championship will be a best-of-seven affair.

Al Alofs is president of the circuit and Luce Baillargeon is secretary.

Don Cote's East Windsor Tavern entry has lined up Jack Westlake for mound duties and Silverstein's, under Al Zakoor's guidance, will have Gord Bate doing the flinging. Art Anderson is ready to toe the slab for Baillargeon's International Tool club.

Jim Carr's Windsor Merchants will call on Gord Billes for pitching duties and Windsor Mechanical Contractors, with Eddie Whited managing, will depend on Wilf Janisse's arm. Marion Bryska will do double duty for Amherstburg, both managing and pitching.

Six Set in Fastball League

Twin-Bill Monday Opens Inter-City

Stung by the loss of two clubs Tuesday night, the Inter-City Fastball League regrouped its forces at a meeting Thursday night and is set to hit the wire Monday with an opening double-header at Windsor Stadium.

Officials, although disappointed that the league makeup has dropped from eight to six teams, expressed confidence that the structure of the circuit and the calibre of competition under the new setup will be even stronger.

Four of last year's teams are entered again with French-Canadian Centre defending their 1962 and 1963 championships. The other three returning clubs are N & D Supermarkets, Argo Cleaners (formerly Windsor Police) and Hiram Walkers.

The two additions to the circuit are Oliver's Spring Service and Essex Aberdeen Hotel.

Two of the 1963 entries will not hit the wire—River Canard and Merchants (formerly Ritz Hotel)—although they had earlier planned to function.

Each team will play 25 games with action at Windsor Stadium Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday of each week. Double-headers will start at 6:30 p.m. and single games at 8:15 p.m. Aberdeen Hotel will play home games on Wednesdays at Essex with an 8:15 p.m. starting time.

The opening twinbill on Victoria Day will pit French Club against N & D in the curtain-raiser and Oliver's against Walkers in the nightcap.

Mayor Michael Patrick will participate in the opening ceremonies and His Worship, a former pitcher, will test his arm by tossing out the first ball.

The rules of fastball and softball are basically the same with the exception that the runner is entitled to leave his base as soon as the pitcher releases the ball. In softball, the runner must wait until the ball crosses the plate.

The other main differences are in distances. The bases are 60 feet apart rather than 55 feet and the pitching distance is 43 feet rather than 40 feet. In addition, the ball is slightly smaller and lighter than the standard softball.

The league has also adopted a speedup policy for double-headers to ensure against exceptionally late finishes. The first game of a twinbill will be played to a conclusion with the second game commencing 20 minutes after completion of the opener. However, no second game will start after 9:30 p.m. and no inning will start after 10:45 p.m.

To shorten any game that might turn into a rout, where one team is 10 or more runs ahead at the completion of seven innings the game will be terminated and the team in the lead will be declared the winner.

Trophies up for competition include the George Wilkinson Trophy going to the playoff champion and the Hiram Walker Trophy going to the team finishing first in schedule play.

Following is a brief rundown on each team:

FRENCH - CANADIAN CENTRE: The defending champs will line up with Bill Noble and Mel McCartney handling the hurling and John Lambie and Don Long behind the plate. The infield will present Steve Sobocan, Nick Sajatovich, Earl Smith and Gord Plenderleith and the outfield will have Vince Sobocan, Gerry Sadai and Bob Corchis, Bob Quenneville and Frank Benda are available for utility duty under coach Homer Vaillancourt and manager "Peewee" Quenneville.

N & D SUPERMARKETS: With Larry Cascadden handling the hurling of Joe Budinsky and Bob Sorenson, the Marketmen are capably staffed in those departments. In the infield are George Lung, Gord Miller, Phil Abbott, Russ Rudling and Junior Barash. The outfield makeup will include Mike Ferencik, Joe Ivan, Frank Conley and Jim McKay. Others available to manager Biggie Kaschak are Gary Zatko, Chris McCaffrey, Wally Caplin and Tom Newton.

HIRAM WALKERS: Bill Chudyk and Andy Van Hooren will form a potent battery for the Distillers, with Ron Wilson, Gary Quenneville, Doug Cowan, Larry Johnson and Wayne Rawlings available for infield duty.

In the outer garden, Dave McLelland, Dick Ducharme and Dwayne Hataley will perform with George Mahler and Warren McCarthy taking utility roles for coaches Gord Waffle and Jim Mowers and manager Jim Beattie.

OLIVER'S SPRING SERVICE: Hec Marinacci and Don MacEwan give the Springmen balance on the mound. Leroy Turner and Barry Groulx will handle catching duties with Don St. Pierre, Ed Ducharme, Ron Bourdeau and Joe Ponik working in the infield. Mel Carter, Craig Halliday, John Harcarufka and John Flanagan former the outfield patrol for coach Ted Zalba.

ARGO CLEANERS: Ron Hatch, Ron France and Gord Haidy have been lined up for mound duties with Able Scott and Red Wilson donning the mask. The infield for manager Jim Mousseau's club will include Fred Robinson, Emile Theriault, Ron Carley, Dunc Stewart, Bill Moore and Bill Willson, Jim Stannard, Doug Carley and Neil Mathieson will form the outfield.

ESSEX ABERDEEN HOTEL: The complete makeup of the team is not known at present, but the club was awarded three draft choices from last year's Arena Sports Shop team made available through the folding of Merchants and River Canard. Len Parent, Sam Sisco and Jerry Nowitsky are slated to line up with previous draftee John Marcinko to add power to the Essex lineup. Andy Valeke has been signed for mound duties by manager Herve Rounding.

Defending champion French-Canadian Centre took up right where it left off last fall, tipping N & D Supermarkets, 3-1, in the opening game of the Inter-City Fastball League season at Windsor Stadium Monday night.

In the nightcap on the Victoria Day twinbill, Don MacEwan fired a superb one-hitter to pace Oliver's Spring Service to a 5-0 victory over Hiram Walkers in the Springmen's league debut.

F-C Centre, the club that knocked off N & D in the 1963 league semi-final, jumped into a 2-1 first-inning lead and coasted behind the sparkling five-hit hurling of Bill Noble, who struck out nine and walked only one.

The winners touched N & D's Joe Budinsky for 10 hits, including two each by Vince and Steve Sobocan.



After Wayne Rawlings lined out, Doc McCarthy slammed a clean single through the


hole into left field. Fast fielding kept Wilson at third but he scored when the next batter, Jack Forrest lifted a sacrifice fly to deep right field.


NHL Players Try Softball On Saturday







In the Spotlight

ALTHOUGH the one championship a Windsor team has managed to pick off in the last few years is now gone by the boards, the 1964 season could still prove to be this area's most productive in Ontario Amateur Softball Association competition.

No less than five teams, three from Windsor and one from each representing Riverside and Amherstburg, are still deeply entwined in Ontario playoff competition.

And the manner in which they are all displaying this region's excellent brand of softball suggests one or more might just go all the way.

This will not, of course, include the strong French-Canadian Centre nine which will have to settle for a runaway pennant and possibly a league title in the city's major circuit, the Inter-City Fastball League.

French Club made its debut in senior A ranks on the weekend, attempting to follow in the footsteps of Calcut Hotel and Arena Sport Shop which bagged the No. 1 championship in the province for Windsor the past two seasons.

However, the magic pitching that belongs to elongated Richard Hames proved to be too much for the F-C nine. Hames, a Windsor native, downed the strong Windsor club twice in 24 hours. He improved as he went along, throwing a nine-inning 'perfect game' here Sunday before winning a 1-0 one-hitter.

THE EMERGENCE of Hames in the last three or four years as one of Ontario's great softball pitchers brings back a memory of the first time I played in a softball game in Windsor in 1957.

As I recall, I struck out (not unusual) in a pinch-hitting role against a young whiz-baller named Metro Szeryk. If Hames has a rival as top Ontario pitcher these days, it would be Szeryk, now of Sudbury. They were teammates on that good St. Anne's team of the Windsor Rec League in 1957.

IT IS regrettable that Pee Wee Quenneville's French Club had to come up against Hames in its first rattle out of the box in senior A competition. The F-C nine is a fine team with a fine young hurler in Bill Noble. But then, to be the best, you have to beat the best and Hames certainly fits that role.

Of the remaining five teams in OASA playdowns, Amherstburg would appear to have the best chance of winning a crown. The downriver town is represented by several players including pitcher Bob Sorenson, accustomed to superior competition.

The 'Burg squad currently is in the third round of Intermediate B play and owns a 1-0 series lead over Goderich. Amherstburg has had titles before, winning both the intermediate A and industrial crowns in 1958.

In junior play, Riverside Aces, bolstered by financial aid from Adam Martini's, will head into a second round this weekend, although at this writing, an opponent isn't yet known. Riverside knocked off Woodstock in its first competition.

IN SENIOR B ranks, the strong right arm of Joe Budinsky might carry N-D Supermarkets all the way. Budinsky, one of the best pitchers around, has been hurling at the fastball distance this season and hasn't enjoyed quite the success he has in the past.

Now that he's firing from three feet closer to the batter, Budinsky has registered 44 strikeouts and allowed only 14 hits in three playoff games.

The other two clubs still remaining are International Tools in intermediate A and Coates and Dunseith Sunoco in Intermediate AA.






Umpires' Rule Suspensions Given Lung, Al Parent

The Windsor Umpires' Association, in its most severe action in two years, cracked down on a Windsor softball player and a manager at its executive session Monday night.

The association said the official ruling reads that Lung was suspended "for being ejected from two games on successive nights and for unsportsmanlike conduct." Parent's suspension was "for unsportsmanlike conduct."

Both rulings came under Clause Eight of the Association constitution which includes the phrase "striking or intent to strike an umpire."

Mahler added that either Lung or Parent can appeal his case immediately to an independent board of observers.

Bert Upham, Ontario Amateur Softball Association Southwestern Ontario convener, said this morning that at the request of the Windsor Umpires' Association he would contact L. G. Pickard, OASA secretary at St. Catharines later today to fully discuss the suspensions.


