Rich Piekos and Jack Westlake supplied a nifty one-two hitting-pitching punch as C and D Sunoco kayoed Paragon Tool, 12-1, Tuesday night in the Metro Softball League season-opener at Booster Park.

Piekos slammed five hits in five trips for a perfect night at the plate while Westlake handcuffed the Toolmen with just three singles as he went all the way for the victory.

The Paragon team made it easy by committing three errors that enabled C and D to score six unearned runs. They got three of them in the third frame on singles by Piekos and Larry Painter, two errors, and four wild pitches by Wally Parent.

That made it 4-0 and with Westlake striking out 11 and walking only one C and D coasted home, rubbing it in with five more runs in the eighth, three more of them unearned.

Piekos' big night included three singles, a double and a triple and two RBIs. Nobody else managed more than one safety in the winners' 10-hit attack.

Metro Softball Action

East Windsor Tavern, Toolmen Both 2-0

A bloop double and a sunset helped East Windsor Tavern stay unbeaten in Metro Softball League action Tuesday evening.

The defending league champions rallied for three runs in the top of the eighth inning and walked off with a 5-4 victory when C & D Sunoco failed to score in their eighth and the sun went down to prevent playing of the ninth at Booster Park.

Steve Vorkapitch, pinch-hitting for Moe Poisson, blooped the double with two out to drive home the tying and winning runs after George Lemay's RBI single narrowed the gap to 4-3.

International Tool also ran its record to 2-0 with a 7-1 verdict over Silversteins (1-1) in another eight-inning game. In other action: North Star Lodge evened its record with a 5-2 decision over winless Windsor Merchants; and Milan Tavern (also 1-1) dumped Paragon Tool, 7-1, in a game called after seven innings.

Duke Snider had two hits in four trips and batted in the first two runs for East Windsor, who were outhit 8-6.

Don Dominas, who came on in relief of John Moynahan in the third inning, got credit for his second win as he struck out 12 and allowed just four hits in the final six innings.

Jack Westlake tried to help his own cause with three-for-three at the plate but was still tagged with the loss. Ernie Magone had two hits for C & D, now 1-1 for the season.

Fred Hussey's three-run homer in the 6th broke up a 2-1 pitching duel as International Tool breezed behind Brian Plante's second straight three-hit pitching performance.

Plante helped himself with three safeties in four trips while Ernie Fraser and Terry Gagnier each chipped in with a pair in a 12-hit attack on loser Bob Cojocar.

Silverstein's lone run came on

a fourth-inning homerun by Evans Telegadas.

Back-to-back four-baggers by Dick Drouillard and Rolly Jones in a three-run seventh inning provided North Star Lodge with its margin of victory.

Willie Palko went all the way with a three-hitter to win a pitching battle with Merchants' Gord Gillies, who scattered five safeties.

Jim Bennett scattered seven hits to pitch Milan Tavern to its first win and provided all the runs he needed with a two-run single in the fourth inning. Ray Trudell slapped a pair of hits and Andy Parichi contributed a solo homer.

Pitching-Rich I-C Opens Monday

Tremendous front- and second-line pitching is expected to be the strength of a well-balanced five-team Inter-City Fastball League which kicks off its 1965 schedule on Victoria Day with a single game at Windsor Stadium.

Defending champion Essex Packers (formerly French-Canadian Club) will tangle with Unique Philips Centre (last season's Hiram Walker team) in Monday night's opener, with the first pitch scheduled for 7:30 o'clock.

The other three clubs will be Riverside Sports Shop (Argo Cleaners last year), Oliver's

Spring Service, the lone hold-over club, and Shirriff Chips (last year's N & D team).

All league contests, with each club playing a 24-game schedule, will be played at Windsor Stadium. Games are slated for Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights with 24 doubleheaders listed on the schedule.

Twinbills in the league guided by George Mahler, circuit president, secretary, treasurer, schedule-maker and what-have-you, are slated for 6:30 openings, with the second game listed for 8:15 p.m. All single games will start at 7:30 p.m.

The top four teams will enter post-season play, with the first and third, and second and fourth hooking up in best-of-five semi-final series. The league final will be of best-of-seven duration.

Mahler today announced the first trade under the I-C's new draft system, Gord Plenderleith going from Essex Packers to Oliver's Spring Service as playing manager in exchange for Ted Zalba.

The following in a brief run-down on each club:

ESSEX PACKERS — Managed by Peewee Quenneville and coached by Omer Vailancourt, the Packers will have Bill Noble and Mel McCartney for mound duties, with John Lambie handling the catching. The infield will consist of Nick Sajatovich,

Bob Quenneville, Dunc Stewart and Earl Smith, with Bob Fraser, Bob Corchis and batting champion Gerry Sadai in the outer garden. Bill Symonds, Frank Benda and Zalba will be available for utility duty.

RIVERSIDE SPORT SHOP — Able Scott will manage and handle the catching chores, with Red Wilson as his back-up man. Gary Nolan, returning to Windsor after several years' absence, and Ron France will do the pitching. Jim Stannard, Emile Theriault, Roger Awad and Jerry Nowitsky will form the infield and Doug Carley, Murray Cameron and Mike Mailloux will line up in the outfield. Bill Willson is a utilityman.

OLIVER'S SPRING SERVICE — Don MacEwan and Hec Marinacci will be hurling to Barry Groulx for Plenderleith's Springmen. In the infield, Don St. Pierre, Ron Bourdeau, Ed Ducharme and Joe Ponc will front an outfield of Craig Halliday, Mel Carter and John Harcarufka. Gord Miller, Larry Lefaive and Gary Zatko are utility players.

UNIQUE PHILIPS CENTRE — Ron Wilson, who will also play first base, and Reg Meiliunas are managers and Jack Eaves is coach. Bill Chudyk and Jack Krutsch will do the hurling and Andy VanHooen the catching. Jack Forrest at second, either Gaye Queen or Doug Cowan at short and

Gary Quenneville at third will make up the infield. The outfield corps will be drawn from Dave McLelland, Dennis Deschamps, Larry Johnson, Doc McCarthy and Mike Murphy.

SHIRRIFF CHIPS — Wes Battle will coach for manager Biggie Kaschak's squad. Joe Budinsky and Bill Bolohan

have been lined up for mound duty and Larry Cascadden will work behind the plate. Infielders are Russ Rudling, George Mahler, Len Parent, Phil Abbott, Tom Paterson and Walt Caplin. Junior Barash, Mike Ferencik, Frank Conley and Paul Wilkinson will patrol in the outfield.

Toolmen Held to Tie

Third Straight, 5-4 For Metro Leaders

Bill Hobbis' two-out single in the top of the eighth drove in Dave Brooks with the winning run as East Windsor Tavern tipped North Star Lodge, 5-4, at Stodgell Park Thursday night. The victory was the third straight for the unbeaten Metro Softball League leaders.

Also unbeaten is International Tools, but the Toolmen (2-0) were forced to settle for a 2-2 tie with C & D Sunoco (1-1) when darkness halted the game after 10 frames at Lanspeary Park.

Milan's Tavern and Silverstein's Produce each posted its second victory in three starts in the other two contests Thursday night.

Milan's broke loose in mid-game for five runs to crush Windsor Merchants, 11-3, at Optimist Park. Silverstein's scored early and often to crush Paragon Tools, 18-5, at Wilson Park. Both Merchants and Paragon are winless in three starts.

East Windsor won behind the six-hit, 13-strikeout hurling of Don Dominas. Hobbis won it in the eighth with his single to centre after Brooks had walked and been advanced to second on Paul Valentine's sacrifice.

Hobbis paced the winners at the plate with a pair of singles in the Tavernmen's seven-hit attack. Ken Morris went the route for North Star on the mound and was backed by Sheldon Taylor's triple and single at the plate.

Back-to-back doubles by Ernie Magone and Ben Glaude, plus an outfield error and Ray Lesard's infield out scored two runs and lifted C & D Sunoco ahead of International Tools in the sixth, but Garnet Soucie stroked a leadoff homer in the bottom half to force the tie.

C & D's Jack Westlake blanked the Toolmen on one hit the rest of the way and International Tool's Art Anderson allowed only two more hits until darkness intervened.

Milan's managed only six hits, but Gord Gillies walked six and the Merchants kicked in with nine errors in a contest halted by darkness after seven innings.

Bob MacMilland sparked the winners at the plate and on the mound. He stroked a pair of hits, including a two-run double, allowed only four hits and struck out 11. He was working on a no-hitter until the sixth and gave up a two-run homer to Pat McEachen in the seventh.

Lyle Symonds socked a homer, two doubles and a single to bat in six runs as Silverstein's rolled over Paragon Tools. The winners broke a 4-3 game apart with nine runs in the fifth.

Ralph Fox also had four hits for the Producemen and drove home three runs. Evan Telegadas kicked in with three safeties in a 15-hit assault on Wally Lafromboise and Larry Parent. Gord Bate limited the Toolmen to eight hits, with Al Pidgeon rifling a pair of singles.

Seven Teams Civic Loop Launches '65 Sked

A seven-team Civic Softball League kicks off its 1965 schedule with three games tonight, two at Optimist Park and a third at Lanspeary Park.

The circuit has four clubs returning from last season—Customs, Ontario Motor League, Bell Telephone and Post Office and has added three new entries, Windsor Star, Hiram Walker and Windsor Firemen.

Each club will play an 18-game schedule with the top four finishers entering post-season play.

In tonight's openers, Customs faces Ontario Motor League and Bell Telephone clashes with Windsor Star on diamonds at Optimist Park. At Lanspeary, Post Office and Hiram Walker clubs hook up. All games are scheduled for 6 p.m. starts.

Firemen draw a bye on opening night.

In addition to a weekly three-game program on Wednesday night, the league will play doubleheaders at Windsor Stadium on Saturday nights, with the schedule concluding on Wednesday, Aug. 18.

Hill's Home Run Propels Toolmen To 6-5 Decision

International Tools rallied for four runs—three of them on a homer by Gary Hill—to nip Milan Tavern, 6-5, Tuesday at Wilson Park and move into a first-place tie in the Metro Softball League.

The victory ran the Toolmen's record to 3-0, the same as East Windsor Tavern, whose scheduled encounter with Silverstein's was postponed because of wet grounds at Stodgell Park.

In the other action, C & D Sunoco scored eight unearned runs to beat Windsor Merchants, 11-6, at Booster Park and North Star Lodge edged Paragon Tool, 4-3, at Lanspeary Park.

International trailed, 5-2, in the sixth when Bob Wilkins led off with a single and Bob Westlake rapped a double with one out. Dave Ambedian sent Wilkins home with a single and Hill then slugged his round-tripper to make it 6-5.

Art Anderson, in relief of Brian Plante, set down Milan's in order in the top of the seventh and the game was called because of darkness. It took two hours to play the six and one-half innings.

Plante and Ernie Fraser drove in the other two runs with singles. Four of Milan's tallies came on homers—solo shots by Andy Vince and Jim Bennett and a two-run blow by Andy Parichi.

Each team had six hits with Vince and Parichi the only batters with two safeties. Bennett was the loser in relief and Anderson the winner.

C & D erupted for seven runs in the seventh to erase a 6-4 deficit against Merchants. Ray Lessard's bases-loaded triple, a three-run homer by Gary Spratt and Jerry Grabowski's sacks-empty four-bagger did the damage.

Lessard also rapped a two-run single for a total of five RBIs and Ernie Magone was three-for-five for the winners, who collected 12 hits off loser Frank Johnson and Gord Gillis.

Merchants slugged 13 hits off winner Jack Westlake but counteracted that by committing six errors, four by shortstop Dick Awad. Pat McEachen, Jim Johnston, Joe Matz, Dave Johnson and Awad had two hits each.

North Star Lodge topped Paragon with two runs in the sixth when Dick Drouillard was safe on an error and Rollie Jones'

fly ball was misplayed into a two-run homer.

Drouillard socked a bases-empty homer in the first frame while Dave Milben and Dennis Maitland each collected two of North Star's nine safeties off loser Wally Laframboise.

Willie Palko was the winner on an eight-hitter, three of them by Leo Ditty and two by Don Begley.

International Tools Grabs Metro Softball League Lead

The International Tools won the battle of the "unbeatens" Thursday and took over sole possession of first place in the Metro Softball League.

Aided by six enemy errors, the Toolmen nipped East Windsor Tavern, 3-2, at Lanspeary Park to run their record to 4-0.

The loss left East Windsor with a 3-1 mark and dropped them into a three-way second-place tie with C & D Sunoco, 10-1 winners over North Star Lodge, and Silverstein's Produce, who edged Milan's Tavern, 8-6.

In the other game, Paragon Tool collected its first win of the season and handed Windsor Merchants their fifth straight setback, 4-1.

International erased a 2-0

deficit with two runs in the sixth on a walk, singles by Dick Westlake and Ernie Fraser and three East Windsor miscues.

They won it in the seventh when Bob Westlake singled and came around on an error, an infield out and Dave Ambedian's sacrifice fly. The Tavern nine scored their runs in the first inning on just one hit, a double by Don Cameron, one of three safeties allowed by winner Art Anderson.

Don Dominas was the loser, despite a five-hit, thirteen-strikeout performance.

C & D socked four homers—two-run blasts by Bud Havens and Jack Westlake and solo shots by Frank LaSorda and Jerry Grabowski—to enable Westlake to coast to a four-hit victory.

Ernie Magone rapped a single and triple in the winners' nine-hit attack that was helped by seven errors by the Lodgemen, good for five unearned runs. Ken Smith was two-for-four for North Star.

Silverstein's tallied five times in the first inning and added three more in the ninth to top Milan's. Only three of them were earned.

A run-scoring double by Lyle Symons, Dick Wilhelm's two-run single, and an RBI base hit by winning pitcher Gord Bate did the damage in the big first frame.

Evan Telegadas, who tripled home two runs in the ninth, Symons and Don Allen each had two of the ten hits off loser Jim Bennett. Andy Vince slugged a double and triple for the Tavern team.

Paragon gave pitcher Wally Parent all the help he needed with a run in the first inning on Leo Ditty's single and a triple by Danny Dutka. Don Begley's two-run double capped a three-run burst against Gord Gillis that clinched it in the third.

Parent allowed just three singles, two of them by Ray Tuepah.

Two singles and an error loaded the bases and Carley promptly cracked a triple to

He beat Silverstein's 5-1 with a four-hitter last Wednesday in a warmup for the no-hit effort.

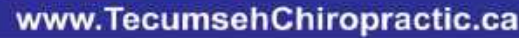
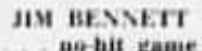

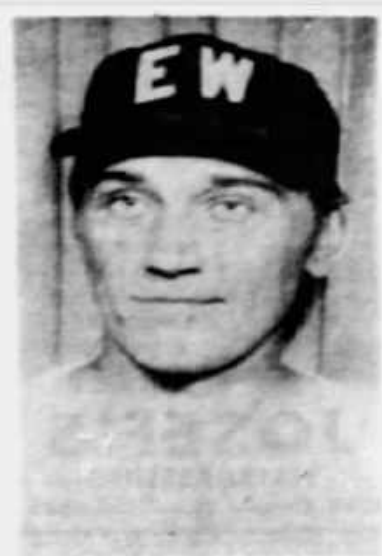

Bat Title In Metro To Snyder

In baseball or softball, they call a pitching-catching combination a "battery" because it is supposed to generate the spark that makes a good team go.

A look at the final statistics of the Metro Softball League provides ample proof that a high-voltage battery powered East Windsor Tavern to the league pennant on a 19-2 record.

The leading batter in the league was East Windsor catcher Bob Snyder with a .375 average on 24 hits in 64 official trips to the plate.

And the leading pitcher was Don Dominas of East Windsor, who ran up both the best won-lost record of 14-1 and the lowest earned run average—a sparkling 0.72.

It was Fraser's two-run homer that tied up the opening game of the series. McCartney, who pitched to only three batters, got credit for the victory Wednesday.

UBS scored their lone run in the fifth when Doc McCarthy doubled, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on Gary Quenneville's sacrifice fly.

Sadai and Fraser each collected two of the Packers' seven hits off Chudyk, who struck out six and issued just one walk—that costly one in the ninth. Andy VanHooren had two of the six safeties surrendered by Noble.
