Windsor Entry Heavily Favored

The heavy favorite in the upcoming Canadian fastball championship slated in Renfrew Park Aug. 11-14 will be the Windsor Unique Business Equipment team, Ontario champions.

Windsor is the only Canadian entry in the International Fastball League, which is centered in the Detroit area, and promises to be a handful next week. Windsor's opening is set Friday at 8:30 p.m. against Edmonton Playboys, one of two Alberta teams in the tourney.

Windsor lost its first game in the Ontario championship, dropping a 12-9 decision to Welland. Then victories against Richmond Hill (9-2), St. Thomas (3-4) and two triumphs over Welland by 9-6 and 5-0 scores, gave it the right to represent Ontario.

WUBE has shown plenty of power at the plate this year, cranking out circuit blasts in five tournament games.

VETERAN COACH

Leading Windsor into Calgary will be Sid Forster, who has the dual position of coach and manager. Forster is coaching fastball for the first time after several years as a baseball coach, during which he guided two Ontario senior baseball champs.

With him will be three pitchers, led by Bill Noble who won four games in tournament play and hurled 26 innings. He is regarded as one of Windsor's best moundsman and hits with power. Joining Noble will be Gary Nolan who has one no-hitter and two one-hitters to his credit in International League play. Dick Hames, the third hurler, a native of Windsor although he has been the number man on the staff of St. Thomas for the past three seasons. He pitched St. Thomas to the Ontario championship in 1963-64 and was a shining light for the Canadian entry in the world tournament last year.

Sharing the catching duties are two veterans, Andy Van Hooren and Abie Scott. Scott, the oldest of the two with 27 seasons of senior ball behind him, also plays other positions in both the infield and outfield when called upon.

TWO AT FIRST

Holding down first base will be either Gord Haidy or Ted Zalba. Haidy was a former star pitcher in the Ontario league and is the leading hitter on the club. Zalba is also a big hitter and often is used in the outfield by coach Forster.

At second base will be Earl Smith, who moved over from short stop this season and is rated as one of the better infielders in Ontario.

Holding down the 'hot corner' will be veteran Gord Plenlerleith, recently rated the best third baseman in the International League. Relieving Plenlerleith will be Joe Ponie who does some catching as well.

Roger Awad is the shortstop. This 22-year-old youngster is one of Ontario's fine fielders and hitters. Em Theriault rounds out the infield in a utility role.

The fastest man on the club is outfielder Mel Carter and he will be joined in the pastures by Craig Halliday, a defensive star, and power-hitter Nick Sajatovitch.

Windsor will arrive in Calgary on Friday.

Savinkoff Blanks Portage As Hectors Display Power

Righthander Pote Savinkoff and Calgary Hectors drew first blood in the opening game of the Canadian senior men's fastball championships at Renfrew Park Thursday night as the locals drubbed Portage LaPrairie All-stars from Manitoba 7-0.

Savinkoff showed the 841 chilled fans why he and Jim Haley are rated the best fastball hurlers in the province, striking out 16 Manitobans and allowed just one hit for the seven innings he worked. Meanwhile, his mates got to lefthander John Kalinowsky for 13 hits in the six innings they were at bat.

The victory, the 32nd without a loss, moved the locals into the semi-final of the A section in the double knock-out competition and a rest until Saturday night at 8 o'clock. The defeat sent Manitoba into the B section.

Their next game will be against the loser of tonight's first game at 7 o'clock between Vancouver Blue Boys and Saskatoon Merchants. Windsor goes against Edmonton Playboys in the second contest at 8:30.

Former Calgary Sportsman of the year, Lloyd Turner threw the first ball to open the championships to batter Hon. Robert C. Clark, newly appointed Minister of youth. Queen's Own Rifles band provided the entertainment.

16 STRIKEOUTS

The whole story Thursday was Savinkoff who was seldom better with his breaking stuff and drop balls. He fanned the first eight in order and after giving up a single to his opposing moundsman in the third, closed the door the rest of the way. While he whiffed 16, he walked two and hit another batsman, leaving all three stranded. He faced only 25 men.

Catcher Dave Shiak of Portage did steal second on him but that was as far as he got. Third baseman Jerry Attwood, after leading off the fourth with a walk, managed to get to third on routine outs and died there. Portage committed two errors, one of them by pitcher Kalinowsky in the first inning which permitted Hectors to plate a couple of runs.

Meanwhile, Hectors, who were just another ball team at the plate in last year's Dominion championship, gave an indication they just might gain some revenge on Vancouver Blue Boys, the defending champions who knocked them over twice in 1965.

BELL PERFECT

Lead-off batter Keith Bell cranked out four singles in four trips and scored one of the seven runs. Centerfielder Dave Smith had a two-for-three night before he was pulled for a pinch-hitter in the

sixth. Matching his performance at the plate was catcher Harvey Marchand, who looks more like a football player than a fastball star. Big Harvey's bat cranked out a bases-empty homer, 262 feet over the centre field fence, and a double. His bat drove in three Hectors' runs. Third sacker Terry McCool clouted a triple in two trips and Keith Harrison drove in two runs, one on a sacrifice fly and the other from a single in two times he went to the plate.

The locals didn't commit a miscue and left six stranded.

Saturday's games will be at 10:30 in the morning, 1 and 3 in the afternoon and 8 o'clock in the evening. On Sunday games are at 10:30 a.m. 1, 4 and if necessary, seven o'clock at night.

Playboys Surprise Windsor Nine

When Calgary Hector's captured the senior men's Alberta fastball championship in Edmonton last Sunday, coach Jack Stephen and captain Jim Finney stated Edmonton Playboys would win a game or two in the Canadian championship this week at Renfrew Park.

Playboys made the Calgary pair look real good Friday night as they toppled the favorite Windsor Unique Business Equipment, champions of Ontario, 5-0 to join Hector's and Vancouver Blue Boys as the unbeaten teams in the double-knock-out competition.

Defending champion Blue Boys won the opening game of the doubleheader by crushing Saskatoon Merchants 7-1.

The way the Edmonton club manhandled Windsor surprised most of the 586 paying customers at Renfrew Park as two Playboy hurlers handcuffed Windsor without a hit until a two-out seventh inning single spoiled their no-hit, no-run game.

CONTROL TROUBLE

Lefthander John Litke started on the mound for the Alberta capital crew, who were invited to the tournament when Nova Scotia couldn't come. He hurled the first three innings, didn't give up a hit, struck out three, walked four and hit one batter. His wildness got him an early trip to the showers in the fourth when he issued the fourth walk and hit a batter with none out.

But righthander Stan Kern came on to put out the fire, striking out the first batter he faced, then retiring the next two on routine outs. He was coasting along on a no-hitter until the bottom of the seventh when, with two out, Dick Hames, the second-nicked issued struck

ings of relief. Losing hurler Bill Noble went 6½ innings for Windsor, was tagged with five hits, four runs, two walks and struck out 10. Hames came on to get the last out, but before he got the last

man he was tagged for two hits, including a triple by Edmonton's Wally Robbins and was charged with one more run. Windsor committed five errors, three of them by catcher Abie Scott, while Edmonton played errorless ball.

ERRORS A PLENTY

In the opener, defending champion Blue Boys had only two earned runs of the seven they plated. Saskatoon's lone tally was also unearned.

Merchants booted the ball four times and Vancouver three in the game that took 1 hour and 35 minutes to complete.

Third baseman Dick Foster was the big man at the plate for Blue Boys with three singles in four trips while left fielder Ronnie Clark had two singles in four trips and catcher Denny Rogers was one-for-two.

Jim MacMillan and Gerry Gombar each clouted triples for the winners in the 10-hit assault on losing hurler Ollie Fiddler

who went the distance, striking out three and walking one.

Opposing groundsman Lorne Auvache gave up only three hits in the seven innings he worked, whiffed five and issued two free passes.

Saskatoon got a scare in the fifth inning when catcher Nel Rissling gained first on an error and then fell over the base, injuring his ankle. However after some first aid he was back in action.

TODAY'S SCHEDULE

Blue Boys and Playboys were scheduled to tangle at 1 o'clock this afternoon with the winner going against Hector's in the semi-final at 8 o'clock. Hector's will be without catcher Harvey Marchand who had to make a hurried trip to Saskatchewan after Thursday night's opener, due to a death in the family. Marchand pounded out a homer and double in three trips Thursday. Ray Gerwin will get the nod for the catch-

ing job and Whitey Haley is slated to toe the mound tonight.

This morning at 10:30, Manitoba was scheduled to play Saskatoon and at 3 o'clock Windsor was to go against the loser of the Edmonton-British Columbia tussle.

Sunday, games are billed for 10:30 a.m., 1 p.m., 4 p.m., and if necessary, seven o'clock.

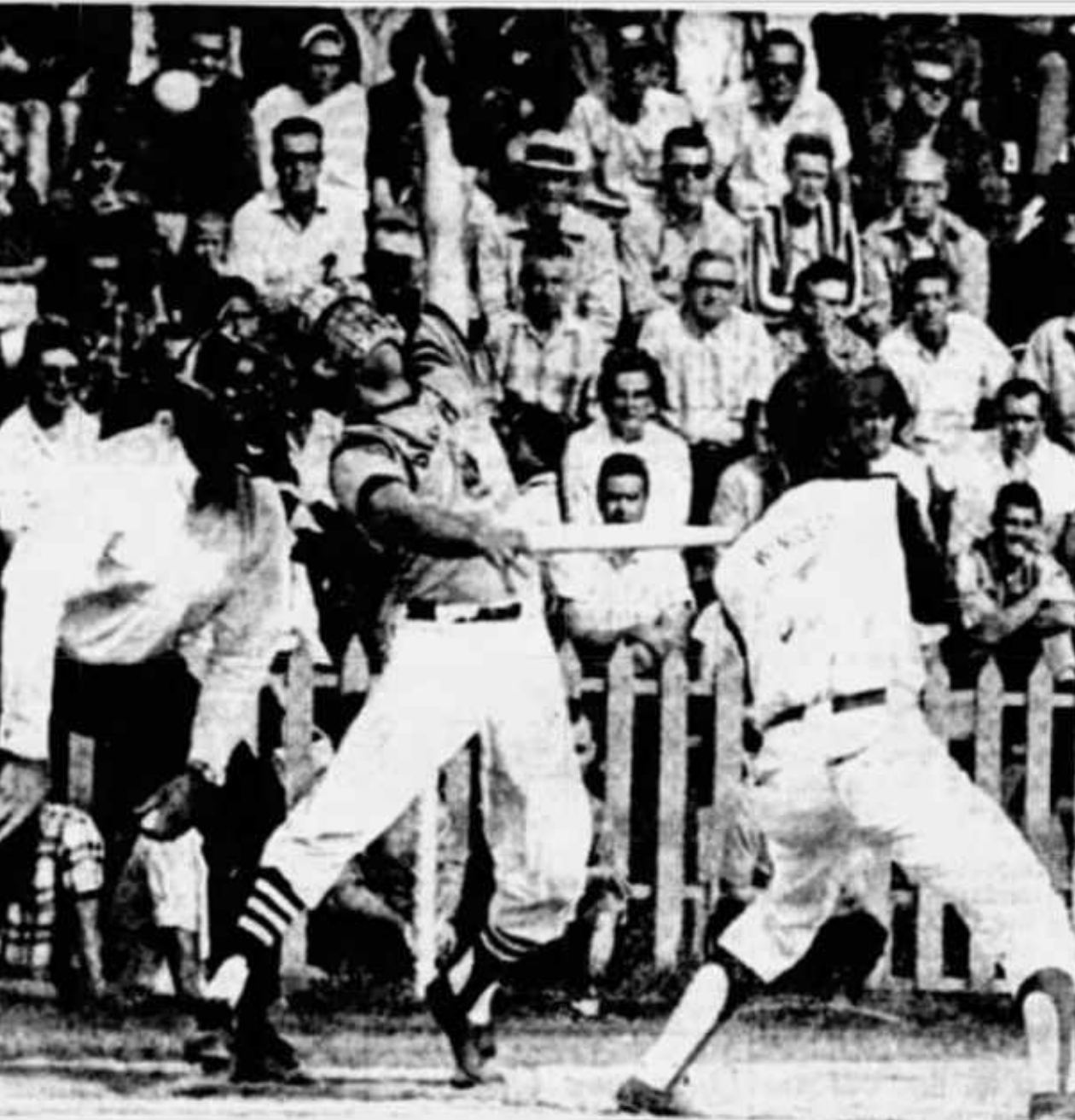

Vancouver Retains Men's Fastball Title

There is no truth to the rumor that Vancouver Blue Boys are going to use Renfrew Park as their home diamond.

For the second successive year, the coast squad used Renfrew Park Sunday to capture the senior men's Canadian fastball championship in a real cliff-hanger. Blue Boys waited until the last half of the seventh inning to score a narrow 1-0 victory over Windsor Unique Business Equipment, before 1,400 fans. It was the fourth straight triumph for the coast squad in the double knock-out competition as they blanked Calgary Hectors 2-0 Saturday night in the semi-final, nipped Edmonton Playboys 1-0 Saturday afternoon and drubbed Saskatoon 7-1 in their opening game.

Meanwhile Windsor, eliminated Hectors Sunday afternoon by a 1-0 count, used the 10-run rule to advantage Sunday morning and made Portage La Prairie Stars quit after six innings by a 11-1 score and triumphed 5-2 over Edmonton.

Blue Boys used the same method in gaining the championship that Windsor used in eliminating Calgary. Batting last, they waited until the seventh inning to score the only run.

Jim MacMillan, shortstop for Vancouver who was voted the most valuable player in the tournament, clouted a triple.

With outfielder Denny Rogers due to bat next, playing coach Bobby Leek looked toward his bench and called on Jack Mitchell. Mitchell never did get a chance to swing as Windsor hurler Dick Hames threw two outside pitches for a 2-0 count, then uncorked a wild pitch, his fourth of the game, which allowed MacMillan to score.

HEARTBREAKING LOSS
 It was a heartbreaker for Windsor to lose as they had runners on base every inning

but found Blue Boys tough in the clutch. Hames allowed Vancouver only three hits while whiffing seven and Windsor collected seven hits off Buster Moberg, including two doubles.

In the previous game, Bill Noble was stingy for the Ontario champs as he gave a lead-off single to Hectors' Rae Gerwing, then slammed the door the rest of the way. The 1,200 fans were in a frenzy as Whitey Haley, who also lost on a three-hitter, gave up a one-out double to Nick Sajatovich. Craig Halliday followed by flying to Daird Craig in left, then Gordy Haidy, who clouted a three-run homer for Windsor Saturday, pinch hit for outfielder Mel Carter and singled Sajatovich home with the winning run.

In the opening game Sunday morning, Gary Nolan made his first appearance in the series a thriller as he tossed a no-hitter at Portage La Prairie and made the Manitoba champions quit after six innings.

Windsor's Gord Plenderleith won the batting award and Hectors' Pete Savinkoff was the top pitcher of the tournament.

The Labatts trophy was presented to Blue Boys by Canadian president Ed Corbett following the final game.

FIRST ELIMINATED
 For the second straight year, Saskatoon was the first club to be eliminated.

Two passed balls by catcher Nels Rissling and a throwing error by first sacker Keith Murray enabled Portage La Prairie Stars to gain the first extra inning victory of the four-day tourney by a 9-8 score Saturday morning.

Edmonton Playboys suffered their first loss of the tourney and it was a narrow 1-0 defeat to Vancouver Blue Boys. After starting hurler Wes Gogal gave up the only run in the first inning, Stan Kern, the top reliever for the Alberta capital squad, came on after one was out in the second inning and allowed Blue Boys just one hit for the rest of the way.

Windsor rebounded from its first setback to Edmonton by a 5-0 count, to sideline the Alberta squad in the third game 5-2. Again Kern was called upon for his relief work but it was asking too much from the big right hander and too late. He hurled the last four innings for Playboys when his club was behind 4-0 and gave up the final run on three hits and struck out two.

Dominas records season's first no-hitter

Whiffs 23 Paragon Toolmen

Reflex romped behind Jim Bennett's eight-strikeout, five-hit hurling.

Chuck Vallance, safe on a two-out fielder's choice in the fourth, scored the winning run

when Bob Keach's drive to right field was bobbled.

Reflex then added a singleton in the seventh, two more in the eighth and five additional runs in the final inning.

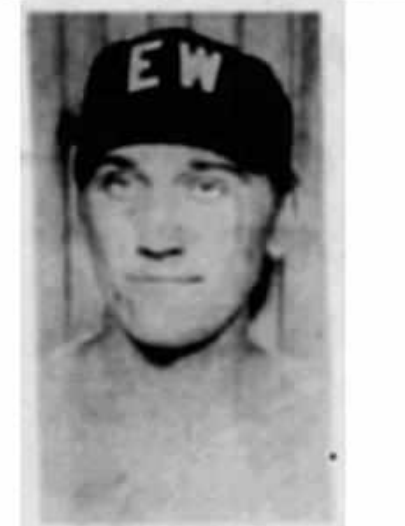

Tavistock pitcher real fireball

TAVISTOCK, Ont. (CP)—Softball is a pitcher's game and no-hitters are not exactly uncommon but, even so, Keith Wagler's feats are remarkable.

The 18-year-old pitcher for Tavistock Merchant Juveniles pitched three no-hitters this season while running up a 7-0 record. Even more impressive, he didn't give up a single earned run.

He faced 216 batters in 67 innings, striking out 171, and didn't give up a hit in 11 innings of relief work.

Wagler's three no-hitters bring his total to five since he joined the club three years ago after being spotted playing in a church league by coach Fred Currah.

During the three years, Wagler has won 69 and lost 18, and has struck out 1,290 batters, often with a rising fast ball, his best pitch, sometimes with his good drop and change of pace.

At six-foot-one and 190 pounds, he's strong and doesn't mind pitching three times a week. Last season he was 34-11 despite missing six weeks with a shoulder injury.

At a juvenile tournament in Niagara-on-the-lake last year he struck out all 21 batters in a seven-inning game against Niagara. His other no-hitters have come against Baden, Linwood, Otterville and Moorefield, neighboring villages in the area near Kitchener.

When Tavistock won the all-Ontario juvenile B title, the Western Ontario Athletic Association championship and the Inter-County juvenile crown last year, Wagler had a 0.75 earned-run average and struck out an average of 18.4 a game.

As many as 800 fans came out to see him pitch in playoffs in this small community.

Wagler's fame has spread. He has been offered a contract to play in the Hamilton Big Four League and has had offers from senior teams around the Kitchener-Waterloo area.

Walkers' Bornais in rut

Two straight one-hit efforts

Lloyd Bornais wasn't any closer to a no-hitter Monday night — but he wasn't any farther away either.

The lanky hurler for Hiram Walkers tossed his second straight one-hitter to beat Dominion Forge, 7-1, and keep the Distillers in a first-place tie in the Civic Softball League.

Bell got all the runs Smith needed when they scored three in the third on four errors, a walk and one hit — a single by Don Stockwell. Whitt McDougal added a solo home run while Doug Newman, Gary Newton and Norm Beatty each had a pair of hits off loser Pete McLarty and reliever John Hames.

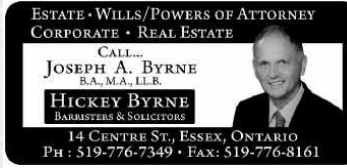

Lodgemen blow wrapup chance

The action went from the sublime to the ridiculous Monday night in a Metro Softball League playoff double-header at Windsor Stadium.

At this point the alleged manhandling of Duffy by Millben took place but players from both teams stepped in quickly to prevent further trouble.

Harvey Burns had driven in three runs with two singles to help put Silverstein's in front 7-4, while John Hall had been credited with a two-run triple instead of a three-run homer when he missed home plate to pace North Star.

The first game more than made up for the unfortunate finish to the nightcap, however, as Argo captured the best-of-five set 3-1.
