Split for Sarnia with Nothdurft

SARNIA—Larry Forbes helped Sarnia Huron Cable get off to a surprisingly strong start in the Windsor Senior Fastball League Sunday night.

Forbes tossed a tidy fourhit shutout in the opening half of a doubleheader as Sarnia blanked the tough Detroit Nothdurft Tool nine 4-0 before Nothdurft rebounded to whitewash Sarnia 10-0 in the nightcap as Bonnie Jones came up with a sparkling one-hit effort.

Huron managed only four safeties against losing pitcher Jack Sutherby in the opener but used their hits to better advantage. Three Nothdurft errors also aided the Sarnia cause.

Jones surrendered just a

fifth-inning single to Rick Deguire and Nothdurft pounded southpaw Dean McEachen for nine hits in the second half of the twin bill. McEachen whiffed six batters in the first two innings but his mates committed a total of five errors to help lead to his downfall. Nothdurft also made three miscues in the loosely-played contest.

And, after two postponements, that's not all they beat in making their league debut. Drop-In scored in the bottom of the final inning for a 4-3 first-game victory over Detroit Cole-Erwin, then romped 10-2 in the nightcap.

Gary Nolan turned the ironman stunt in pitching both victories, a six-hitter in the opener and a three-hitter in the second tilt.



CHAMPIONSHIPS ARE always worth shooting for and Gord Plenderleith has two goals in mind as he prepares his Windsor Drop-In Tavern entry for the Ontario senior softball title competition that is only eight days away.

Plenderleith, who filled the void when Nick Sajatovich was forced to step down as Drop-In field manager because of business reasons, is looking first to the provincial elimination series in Richmond Hill on June 26, 27 and 28. But he's also thinking beyond that to the Canadian finals to be staged in Winnipeg during the last week of August.

Of course, Plenderleith isn't alone when he begins to talk of wearing the Ontario and Canadian crowns. He's joined by such as business manager Al Zakoor, coach Andy Van Hooren, 18 players and a number of staunch supporters.

"I've always said the only team that worries me is us," jokes Plenderleith as he discusses the Richmond Hill tournament that boasts a lineup of 13 of the finest clubs in the province. "I respect everybody but the way we've been playing we should be in good shape."

Newmarket, London TV Cable, the host Richmond Hill entry and Niagara Falls are the teams Plenderleith thinks of initially when he talks of respect. He doesn't have too much fear for the defending champion Oshawa Tony's this season becaues they lost southpaw pitching ace Pete Landers to a Providence, Rhode Island professional squad.

STRONG RIGHTHANDED pitcher Don Dominas and catcher Bob Fraser, both of whom were with Drop-In in 1969, are two of the reasons Plenderleith feels Newmarket can be a threat.

As long as TV Cable has hurler Dick Hames it will be in the favorites' circle. Pitchers Bob Domic and Ed Neudorf are also strong indications why Plenderleith expects Richmond Hill and Niagara Falls, respectively, to be tough.

* * * *

"NOLAN (PITCHER GARRIE) is right on top of his game," offers Plenderleith, "and the American guys (in the Windsor Senior Fastball League) say they've never seen him better. Noble (Bill, the other Drop-In hurler) has had tough luck so far. He's throwing well enough but we haven't done anything for him.

The key to our whole game is Earl Smith, though," continues the field boss. "He's playing well and hitting extremely well. Czerwieniec (Hank) has been outstanding in the field and his bat is coming and Lung (George, the receiver who replaced Fraser) has been consistent. George is doing very

well for never having played at this level."
