BY THE TIME MANY OF YOU get around to reading this, Windsor Drop-In Tavern will be deeply involved in the Ontario fastball championships at New-market. And Dick Meloche, who has assumed the managerial reins of the talent-laden local club this summer, will be a a most disappointed fellow if his charges fail to return the coveted McIlwraith Trophy to Our Town Sunday night.

"We're the team to beat," Meloche boldly proclaimed prior to the team's departure for Newmarket Friday. "If we win five games in a row, we'll be home free. Frankly, I don't think there's a team in this (16-team) tournament that can touch us.

"Oshawa Tony's (which handed Drop-In its lone worry about London (the tournament's defending champions) anymore."

A tournament triumph at Newmarket would qualify Drop-In to represent this province in the Canadian championships at Halifax over the Labor Day holiday weekend. The evenutal winner at Halifax will represent Canada in the 1972 world fastball championships at Manila in the Philippines next March.

Quips Meloche: "You know, I've never been to the Philippines."

MELOCHE WAS A STAR CATCHER with three Ontario Amateur Softball Association Senior A champions — Len Kane's Men's Wear in 1955 and 1957 and Arena Sports Shop in 1962. He's been away from the game for the past eight years.

What made him decide to take over as the skipper of the Drop-In Tavern team this summer?

'THE SPONSOR and many of the players have been after me to take over this club for several years...I guess it was Al Zakoor (the team's business manager) who fin-

ally talked me into it.

"I have an excellent arrangement with the team ... my job starts when I get to the park and ends when I leave the park. Al (Zakoor) handles all the other details such as the money, equipment, travel arrangements, etc."

How good is this Drop-In Tavern team?

"I don't care to compare this club with my '62 club or any of the previous DropIn teams," replied Meloche, "but I'd have to say that there are no apparent weaknesses on this club. Admittedly, a couple of players (Gord Plenderleith and Ted Zalba) are getting along

in age and we may have a shortcoming on defence in the outfield, but this is a pretty solid ball club.

"I'll tell you one thing, everybody's doing his job and our older ballplayers are playing better now than ever before. It seems they realize that they must put it all together this year ... next year may be too late."

* * *

MELOCHE THEN POINTED with pride towards his team's hitting and pitching.

"This is a a good hitting team," he declared. "I don't think there's another team in the province that can match bats with us. Why, even my guy batting seventh in the lineup is capable of hitting the ball out of the park." Story Continued on next slide ON THE SUBJECT OF PITCHING, Meloche observed that "obviously, we have no problems there with Bill Noble, Garrie Nolan, Don Dominas and Gary Hanke. I wouldn't say that any one of them was the key pitcher on our staff. I'm not afraid to use any one of them against any opponent that we face.

"I usually rotate them on starting assignments in our league . . . in a tournament such as the one coming up in Newmarket, I might spot a certain player against a certain team because he's been particularly successful against that team.

"Noble, Nolan and Dominas are all established throwers. Hanke, who comes to us out of Chatham, is a bit young and lacks experience but he's got a couple of years of softball in the States under his belt. I think he's going to be a good one in two or three years."

It had been whispered in the past that there was dissension in the ranks of the Drop-In Tavern club. I asked Meloche about this.

* * * *

"DISSENSION? The only dissension on our club involves the other teams in our league," he replied. "I'd have to say that our attitude is just beautiful. I've got 14 ballplayers and several of them are capable of playing three or four different positions.

"I have yet to hear one of my pitchers complain about being removed from a game. That's what I'm here for ... to handle the pitchers as I see fit and my decisions are being accepted most graciously." MELOCHE FEELS that the day of top-calibre fastball in Windsor are numbered.

"When the Plenderleiths and Zalbas and (Earl) Smiths are gone and our present crop of pitchers are through, fastball will be dead in Windsor because, unlike several other areas in the province where there is an abundance of minor fastball programs, there's nothing being developed on the minor level around here.

"That's why these guys are hustling their fannies to win it all this year. Time is running out on some of them and they seek to make the most of their opportunity now.

"So, if we lose this tournament in Newmarket this weekend, there'll be nobody to blame but myself."


