



Fireman hot again in Civic

The five teams in the league will play 16 games each. Optimists, the fifth team, is idle tonight.

The Civic Fastball League is a prime example of what is happening to Windsor area softball and baseball teams this soggy month of May.

Another five Civic games were called off Wednesday night because of muddy diamonds throughout the city, running to 14 the number of postponements for the first 18 contests scheduled.

Local 200 and the Windsor Star were to have met at Wilson Park, Sasso Trimmers and International Tools were slated to play at Lanspeary Park and Belland-Local 444 and Hiram Walker were to have clashed at Stodgell Park. A Windsor Stadium doubleheader, with Public School Teachers scheduled to face Metro Catering-Police and Branch 143 ready to to battle with Windsor Building Products, was also postponed.

It took Branch 143 Legion a long time to get into their first game in the Civic Fastball League this season, but Rick Weir was ready when they did.
