Civic League set to debut Friday

The Civic Fastball League, its ranks lessened by two teams, opens the 1974 season Friday evening with two games scheduled.

Separate Teachers and Public Teachers, both representatives of the eastern division, will meet tomorrow at 6:15 p.m. at Lanspeary Park. The only other test has Local 444 and Hiram Walker from the west clashing at Wilson Park at the same time.

Windsor Building Products, Metro Catering-Police, the defending champion Rossini-Firefighters, Branch 143, Separate Teachers and Public Teachers are all returnees in the east. Covemen (formerly Sasso Trimmers), The Windsor Star, Local 444 and Hiram Walker are all back in the west. But, Bellvue Tavern and International Tools have dropped from that division.

The clubs in the east play 25 times each and those in the west play 24 times, with the top four finishers in each division qualifying for the playoffs. The teams play three games against each team in their own division and twice against the clubs in the other section.

The Windsor Fastball Club has scheduled exhibition games for Friday and Saturday evening at Windsor Stadium, meeting Civic League teams on each occasion. Friday, the WFC meets Local 200 and Saturday it'll be Arlington Covemen, both games beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Firemen pick up where they left off

Lloyd Bornais and his Rossini-Firefighters are at it

again.

Bornais twirled a four-hitter and struck out eight as Firemen started the 1974 Civic Fastball League season in pursuit of a fifth consecutive championship, smothering Windsor Building Products 12-0 Wednesday night at Wilson Park.

The game was one of five in what served as the Civic League's opening program. All three games originally secheduled to open the season last Friday were postponed.

A doubleheader at Windsor Stadium produced a pitching duel and a slugfest. Branch 143 edged Separate Teachers 3-1 in the tight-fit opener and Public Teachers shelled Police 13-7 in

the nightcap.

Two western division games saw Windsor Star prevail 6-5 over Arlington Covemen at Shore Acres Park and Local 200 nudge Local 444 5-4 at Lanspeary Park.

Bornais, recognized as the league ace, was never in difficulty against the error-prone Builders. No-one reached third base Sadia on Bornais and only Gerry Sadia touched him for more than one hit—singles in the fourth and sixth innings.

Firemen, meanwhile, were having a merry time with Product pitchers Bill Chudyk and Les Johnston. They roughed up Chudyk for nine runs and 11 hits in eight innings and Johnston for three runs and four hits in the ninth.

Building Products committed seven errors but Smokeaters didn't need the help. John Smith spearheaded their attack with four hits in six trips, Gary Spratt added three and Chuck Matte and Gary Newton two each. Ron Carley uncorked a two-run homer.

Branch 143 jumped veteran Brian Plante for two runs in the first inning and held off Separate Teachers behind the seven-hit control pitching of Rick Dinham.

Dinham lost his shutout on a two-out 'ninth-inning double by Paul Murray that chased Jim Mauler home from first base. Otherwise he was close to being flawless, limiting the losers to six scattered singles, striking out five and walking none. Plante also finished with a seven- hitter but singles by Ellsworth Banks and Tom Thompson and a costly error by catcher Ken Ambrose did him in the first inning.

Branch 143 added another unearned run in the fifth, Banks bringing it across with an infield single.

Public Teachers ripped 16 hits off Dale Larsen to back the strong relief pitching of Frank Johnson. Johnson came on for starter John Perry in a six-run second inning for Police and hurled three-hit ball the rest of the way.

Perry made up for his pitching lapse at the plate, banging four hits, a two-run homer and three doubles.

Bill Ruiter also socked four hits for the winners including a triple, Doug Cowan and Andy Vince contributing two each. Larsen stroked three hits in three official trips for Lawmen.

The Star squandered a tworun lead in the top of the ninth inning but Gary Shreve made Richard Bartnik a winner with a run-scoring single in the bottom of the 11th to break a 5-5 tie. Dave Anderson led off the Star 11th with a single, moved to second on a sacrifice by Bartnik and raced home on Shreve's rap up the middle.

Covernen tied the game at five in the ninth on a single by Doug Robbins, a triple by Bud Bondy and a wild pitch by reliever Bartnik.

Jack Westlake threw perfect ball through five innings for Covemen but the Star erupted for four runs in the sixth, three scoring on an opposite-field home run by Bert Smith. Smith added a triple two innings later.

Building Products on Civic rebound

After a rough beginning, Windsor Building Products is managing to put things together in the Civic Fastball League.

Building Products was shelled 12-0 by defending champion Rossini-Firefighters in its season opener last Wednesday evening, but has rebounded for two straight triumphs. Monday night Building Products made Public Teachers a second victim, 4-3 on Bill Chudyk's five-hitter.

Firemen collected their second consecutive win last night, nipping Branch 143 5-4 to become the lone undefeated team in the eastern division. Separate Teachers and Metro Catering-Police were tied 8-8 in the other eastern game when it was called after eight innings because of darkness.

Meanwhile, in the west, Hiram Walker was victorious for the second time in as many starts by edging Local 200 4-3 in 12 innings in the opening half of a Windsor Stadium doubleheader.

Arlington Covemen broke into the win column by dumping Local

444 5-2 in the nightcap.

Reliever Frank Johnson wild-pitched Bruce Desjarlais home with the winning run with two out in the eighth inning as Building Products clicked at Wilson Park. Wolf Schneider and Paul Clark supported Chudyk's six-strikeout performance with two hits each for the winners, Doug Cowan duplicating that for Teachers and John Perry adding a two-run homer as the losers' record fell to 1-



Gary Spratt stole home with the winning run in the bottom of the eighth as Firemen fought back from a 4-0 disadvantage. Star surprises Distillers

Dave Anderson's eighthinning home run allowed The Windsor Star to squeak past Hiram Walker 2-1 in Civic Fastball League action Friday in a game that featured plenty of hits but few runs.

The victory was the first over Hiram Walker in the Stars' three-year history. In the only other game scheduled Local 200-Caboto Club managed eight runs on only six hits to move past Arlington Covemen 8-1 at Shore Acres Park.

Early indications point to the east again showing the strength in the Civic Fastball League. . . but the evidence up until now is far from conclusive.

Metro Catering-Police and Separate Teachers took the initial Civic interlocking games Monday evening. However, both had difficult times and emerged with 3-2 wins over Arlington Covemen and Local 200-Caboto Club,

respectively.

The triumphs were the first of the season for both the Lawmen and Separate Teachers, with Police now all square with a 1-1 record and Separate Teachers at 1-2 in the east.

In other games last night, Public Teachers handed Rossini-Firefighters their initial defeat, 8-5, and Windsor Building Products hammered Branch 143 8-2 in tests involving only

eastern division teams.

Nine clubs enter teachers' tourney

Nine areas will participate in the second annual Ontario Teachers' Fastball Tournament Saturday at Windsor Stadium and Jackson Park.

A new champion is assured since last year's winner from Leeds and Grenville Counties has indicated it will not defend its title.

The two-game-knockout competition will feature entries from Windsor, London, Ottawa, Peterborough, Essex County, Waterloo Kent County public school boards as well as the Lambton County and Peterborough separate school boards. Dale Larson scattered five hits, struck out seven, walked none and was supported by Don Ing's hot bat as Police eked out their first win on runs in the third, sixth and eighth innings.

Ing cracked a home run to push Police in front 2-1 in the sixth, then rapped his second triple and scored on a wild pitch as the winners snapped a 2-2 deadlock in the eighth. Mike Rehner added two hits for Lawmen and Jerry Hay managed the same total for Covemen, losers of four of their first five games.

Vie Piecolo's infield single, a sacrifice bunt by winning pitcher Brian Plante and two wild pitches gave Separate Teachers their margin in the last of the ninth in another exciting struggle at Wilson Park.

Plante authored a fivehitter and whiffed nine to outduel Bob McMillan, who threw a four-hitter and struck out eight but walked five. Singles by Terry Killen, Paul Murray and Peter Aubry in the sixth had produced Teachers' second run to force the suddendeath situation in the ninth that sent Local 200 to its second loss in five tries and from first to third place in the west.

Tim Rounds cracked a three-run homer and Paul Mousseau followed with a solo blast in the third as Public Teachers turned a 3-2 disadvantage into a 6-3 lead. John Perry did the rest for the winners, stopping the defending champions on nine hits and striking out five.

Andy Vince stroked three hits, Bill Ruiter, Doug Cowan and Bob Small chipped in with two apiece as Public Teachers moved into a tie with Firemen in the Lanspeary Park test. Mike Mailloux had a homer and double for the losers, Wayne Fields, Wilf Leblanc and losing pitcher Lloyd Bornais adding two hits each.

Bill Chudyk gave up only four hits and his mates helped out with 11 safeties of their own as Building Products moved into first place in the east with their third win in four tries. Chudyk struck out seven, walked nobody and was provided with all the breathing room he required when Builders erupted for all of their runs in the sixth and seventh innings.

Ray Major slammed a solo homer in the sixth and two-run shot in the seventh to spark Builders, who also had two-hit efforts from Dave Desjarlais, Gerry Sadai and Chudyk, Tom Thompson and Rob Smith shared Legionnaires' hits, with two apiece.

Belland's Local 444 were lodged in the Civic Fastball League west cellar going into Friday's encounter with the Windsor Star but Jerry Renaud's four-hit 5-1 victory moved them to within two points of first place in the huddled division.

Local 200 leads the pack with six points while the remaining four teams are just two two points back.







Two more stellar pitching performances were wasted by Windsor in the ouster against London Childs.


Starter Bill Noble pitched two-hit ball for seven innings before Nolan took over at the expense of only three hits over the final 10 innings.



Lessard delivered the key blow when he smashed a three-run double in the sixrun Windsor fourth inning.


Lessard then scored the winning run in the 10th inning after brother Ray's single to right field. Mike had reached base after outfielder Jim McDonald dropped his fly ball.



proved to be Separate Teachers' undoing in the bottom of the 11th when Lawmen pushed across the winning run.


With one out, Killen hit Emile Theriault with a pitch, then wild pitched him to second where winning pitcher Dale Larson delivered him with a single to left field.



McCaffery's two-run triple.







He earns respect



"I THINK I'VE THROWN six or seven guys in 32 years."

That tells you more than just a little about Bill Jordan. First, it classifies him as a seasoned member of the Windsor Umpires Association. Second, it lets you know his tolerance level.

Jordan is unwilling to reveal his age, saying simply "I won't tell you how old I am, but I will tell you I retired three and a half years ago." Reliable sources, however, place Bill's age between 68 and 71.

In spite of his advanced years, Jordan isn't quite certain he's ready to hand in his mask, chest protector and indicator to allow the younger generation to take his spot behind the plate.

HE HAD PLANNED TO BOW OUT of the umpiring fraternity after this season. Now he's not so sure, saying "if

I'm healthy, I'm still going to umpire. I enjoy it.'

He could be one of the original boys of summer, the way he has appeared at baseball and softball diamonds in and around Windsor for the past 52 years. After all, how many individuals can boast of such a record of longevity at staying close to the games they love?

Jordan is fondly referred to as Old Bill by his partners, players, managers and coaches. He possesses that rare characteristic that sets him apart from so many of the others, though. It's called respect.

He's in a class with few others when it comes time to go over the ground rules and proceed with the game. Re knows how to address people without creating animosity, and in inimitable fashion, speaking softly all the while,

When I first contacted Bill about putting down on paper some words of praise I feel are well deserved, he hesitated.

"I DON'T WANT ANY publicity," he said, with his customary show of modesty. But, when I assured him it might bring newcomers into the association when they learned of his contributions and umpiring's benefits, he agreed.

I reached Bill at his Windsor residence, where he spends a portion of his time. However, he lives at his daughter's "most of the time, in a new subdivision at Woodhaven, Mich., out near Trenton."

Although a Windsor native, Jordan took up United States citizenship in 1951 because he was working in Detroit. For 35 years, he searched titles and deeds and did other interesting chores while with the Lawyers Title Insurance Corp.

"It was easy to come over here anyway," he says. All that time he earned the going rate of payment for umpiring, but there was never any extra cash paid out for the 32-mile round-trip trek he had to make whenever he came over to handle a game.

"All I have to do is take I-75 to the bridge and I can be here in 40 minutes. I like it out there."
