

Distillers start right

Defending champion Hiram Walker picked up where it left off last fall as the Greater Windsor Fastball League opened its new schedule with five games Tuesday night.

The Distillers, who defeated Moser's Sport Shop in three straight games in the 1976 final, nipped Legionaires 4-3 in their

opener.

Moser's, meanwhile, opened with a bang, blanking Ottawa Tavern 15-0 behind the one-hit pitching of Winkie Allen.

In other action, a new entry from Amherstburg, Calvert's, trounced Wellington Tavern 9-3, B.F.I. outlasted Forest Tavern 12-5 and Westwood Tavern edged Zuliani Glass 9-7.

Walker over Lou Tousignant, who allowed eight hits. However, seven of the hits off Tousignant were by the top three hitters in Walker's lineup, Ozzie Wolf going three-forthree and Bob Shaw and Rick Gagnier adding two hits apiece. Gagnier drove in three runs, including Wolf with the winner in the eighth.

Homer Piche's one-out single in the sixth was the only hit off Allen, who struck out 10 and walked four. Ken Whitehead led a 10-hit Moser's attack with three and scored four runs.

Jerry Mayea, who led Hiram Walker to the championship last year, turned up with Calvert's this season and won a nine-hitter in his first start. His mates collected 13 hits, Steve Bryska driving in three runs with a single and two-run homer. Joel Dumouchelle hit two solo homers and Art Drake one for Wellington.

B.F.I. totalled 16 hits, with three each by Bob Chamberlain, Gerry Stewart, Ken Maleyko and Ken Cooper. Cooper drove in five runs and Stewart three.

Gerry Renaud had a four-hitter going for Westwood until the ninth, when Zuliani put together four hits and two walks for four runs. Then Emilio Piazza came on to shut off Zuliani. Tom Truscott led Westwood with three hits and Dennis Little had three for the losers.


McMillan shines, but Sound triumphs

It won't be determined until after that game which team will be placed sixth and which will be seventh. The results of regular-season play between Olympics and the Local 444-Teachers' winner will determine that.


Each team collected five hits in last night's game as Sheldon Taylor emerged as the winning pitcher over John Dinham. Both struck out two and walked one.

'Buzz' Nolan dies

Haidy is down on his luck these days. His situation isn't fatal but he cannot work. Indeed because of back problems, he cannot do much of anything, including dressing himself.

But the potential is still there.

And, if there was anyone coming out of Windsor 30 years ago with better potential than Haidy, nobody can attest to it.

Super at baseball, fastball, hockey - even golf in his heyday - was Haidy. We all should be so blessed.

But he didn't make it in anything, mainly because he chose not to try or there was a clash of personalities.

Windsor was to benefit from his talents.

From the podium, former mayor Frank Wansbrough said it

After a ribald discourse, Wansbrough finished in simple terms, saying "thanks a lot, Gord, for what you've done for the people of Windsor.'

There is really no need to go into Haidy's accomplishments here. Suffice it to say that he was a very important prospect in the Detroit Red Wings' system at one point but a clash of personalities with the late Jack Adams cancelled that

He eventually came home from minor pro hockey - amid a personal turmoil that negated his advancing in any professional sport - to star as a member of the Windsor Bulldogs in hockey and various teams in fastball as a pitcher, primarily, but also as a hitter.

He had other chances to leave but never did. He gave his heart to this city, even though he was born in Winnipeg 49 years ago.

Maybe that's why most of those people showed up last

The head table was glittering, headed by a superb toastmaster, Jack Pitt. They all had a few stories and insults for the guest of honor, people like Johnny Wilson, a teammate with the old Windsor Spitfires, and Alex Delveecchio, a new Hockey Hall of Famer from the Red Wings.

Not to mention Jack Costello, Lou Bendo, Alderman Louis Parent, Tommy Williams, Bucky Browning (a longtime buddy), Wansbrough, Lloyd Pollock, George Aitken, Dick Meloche, Jim Skinner, Budd Lynch and Lou Saddy.

You could have probably gone to various sections of the main audience and picked out a head table list almost as distinguished.

It was that kind of night. Respect, if nothing else, flooded the room.


