## Noble sparkles in Civic opener

Garrie Nolan had a slight edge over Bill Noble in the statistics Wednesday night, but Noble came out on top where it counts.

Noble and Nolan both pitched six-hitters as the Civic Fastball League finally got its season started.

At Mitchell Park, Zuliani went on a 15-hit attack to defeat Thompson's.


Dennis Little had four of the hits, including a home run and three rbi's.


Sajatovich also drove in another run in a two-forthree effort but Brian led the way with three singles as winless Teachers dropped their third straight.



CHICAGO (UPI) - Use of a designated hitter has been made legal in fast pitch softball, the International Joint Rules Commmittee on Softball announced Monday.



Despite their 12-0 victory on their home field at Amherstburg, Calvert's, the defending league champions, still couldn't make it into first place on their 11-3 record.



### Some good, some bad



AS ONE WHO HAS BEEN involved in fastball for a number of years, I'm encouraged by a number of positive signs that I've seen this season.

Tournaments in the tri-county area are becoming more plentiful - and the competition is getting keener.

The North Essex Boys' League - and other junior leagues - are beginning to groom good players for the men's leagues, too, which creates a feeling of hope for the future. And the girls are getting into the act with more enthusiasm, giving the women's leagues reason to share the optimism.

More and more good athletes are finding the game interesting and entertaining and have discovered that it's a good alternative to baseball. It requires less than two-thirds the time to play the game and the ingredients are there to make it even more exciting - like better use of the bunt, hit-and-run and steal

It isn't just a pitcher-dominated game, either, as many have suggested for years.

THE DISCOURAGING THING IN FASTBALL - and in baseball, slow-pitch and lob-ball - is that dfamonds, particularly in Windsor, leave a lot to be desired.

Admittedly, there isn't much spectator interest in any of these sports in Windsor, but that's no excuse for the deplorable condition of the diamonds.

City diamonds are rock hard and without the normal markings - batters' boxes, foul lines, out-of-play lines and the like - except perhaps once in every half-dozen games.

It has been a treat to go to fastball tournaments in Chatham, Comber and Camlachie and come away impressed. Not only has the opposition been first class, but the quality of the diamonds has been something to boast about.

Perhaps some of our city parks department employees should view some of the out-of-town diamonds to discover how well kept they can be, with a little care and dedication.

MAYBE THE DIAMONDS in Windsor are ignored most nights because there are so many of them.

But it is a shame that infielders are being hurt by had-bounce ground balls and players are being injured when they slide, because the diamonds are not well cared for.

Parks and recreation commissioner Harry Brumpton pointed out last week that the number of diamonds in Windsor has risen from 35 to 130 in the last 12 years, covering nightly play for 5,000 people for all diamond sports.

One then has to wonder why - if the interest is so great the diamonds are in such poor shape.

It's sad to watch players hesitate before sliding, because they feel they might be injured when they attempt to beat a throw to a base or the plate. As a result of the hestitation, they often are hurt.

PROBABLY, THERE ARE MORE pressing matters than ball diamonds for parks employees to look after - like our many beautiful rose gardens - but if there are as many as 5,000 people playing every night, something should be done to look after such a large percentage of the population.


If 5,000 men, women, boys and girls are playing ball every night - and there are leagues for all, no matter the sex - then it's time somebody did something to ensure their safety.

Camlachie is a tiny village and its excellent, enclosed park was in peak condition for an eight-team, double-knockout Canada Day weekend tournament that was hampered by rain all day Saturday

Tournament chairman Jack McEwen, first baseman John Jones, pitcher Bill Blunt and leftfielder Mark Smith - the latter the former Windsor Spitfire and St. Clair Saint hockey player - were among those who helped drag and line the Camlachie diamond before every game.

They did a fine job making the diamond playable, even after the heavy Saturday rain, but their job was made easier by the pebbled infield that withstood more punishment than do Windsor diamonds.

Tournament chairmen Marcel Branquet in Comber and Ed Bruyette in Chatham were also instrumental in assuring that games went on as scheduled. They, too, dragged their infields before every game, with small tractors part of their equipment that made the job easier.

IF THE WINDSOR PARKS department doesn't have enough employees to handle such chores as dragging and marking diamonds, perhaps union officials could give managers and coaches in various leagues permission to at least rake the infields to take away bad bounces and allow runners to slide without fear.

'Most managers and coaches would be more than willing to carry rakes and shovels in the trunks of their cars, just to avoid the hassle of trying to arrange for rescheduling of games that often wouldn't have to be postponed if the diamonds were worked on for even a short period of time.

When out-of-town teams come here for tournaments, the diamonds are always in good shape, to impress the 'visitors.' Why not do the same for the people — the taxpayers — who

pay for such upkeep?

There have been too many incidents of leg injuries this sea-

son for officials to ignore what's happening.

Injured players' employers can't be too pleased when they have to pay wages — and compensation boards must feel the same way — for someone who misses work and is on crutches because of ligament, tendon, or cartilage damage brought about on the diamond.

THE FASTBALL TOURNAMENTS in Comber and Camlachie were the first of what are to become annual events and others are scheduled for Windsor and Amherstburg for the first time in 1978.

Windsor's Civic League will host a 16-team, double-knockout tournament Aug. 18-20 and Calvert's of the Greater Windsor League is planning a similar tournament in SeptembThe only thing that remains is for teams to find a way to beat Camlachie Grain and Feed and Comber, which definitely rank as the one-two teams in the area.

Camlachie qualifies as the best team in Essex. Kent and Lambton counties, with tournament wins in Chatham and Sarnia and its own tournament and an over-all record of 25-5.

The team has an excellent 10-1 record in the Bluewater League, which also encompasses teams from Petrolia, Sarnia and Port Huron, and earned \$1,600 with its three tournament championships.

CAMLACHIE HAS A LINEUP loaded with lefthanded hitters — a definite plus in fastball, with the bases only 60 feet distant — and exceptional depth.

Manager McEwen carries a full roster of 18 players and gives all a chance to play, with a heavy schedule helping him keep everyone satisfied. He also does a superb job emphasizing the fundamentals, which makes the team exciting to watch.

One can only hope that McEwen will bring his team to the tournaments in Windsor and Amherstburg, because maybe then fans here would appreciate the game more.

Camlachie has a solid following of supporters for its home games and the crowds are vocal and appreciative of sound fastball, even if it's the opposition that helps provide it.






