



End of the line for Dawson scholarships

For years the Dawson family has handed out scholarships to Windsor's finest student/athletes.

And with those scholarships, the family has also handed out quite a few dreams.

The generous financial aid offered by the Gladys and Edward Dawson Memorial Scholarship has allowed graduating students to pursue careers in teaching, law, medicine and journalism to name just a few.


The six winners honored Tuesday at a dinner at the Royal Marquis, each recieved \$4,000 towards their post-secondary education.

They are: Riverside's Colleen Caplin, Assumption's David Michels and Massey's Sydney Hope, Matthew Jones, Julia Thomas and Rhys Trenhaile.

THIS GROUP comprises the final recipients of this prestigious award. After 20 years, the committee is ending the scholarship at the request of the family.

"They did not want winners who would not be able to identify with the people responsible for making the award happen," said committee member Frank Johnson.

Edward Dawson passed away in 1968 after an outstanding career as a teacher and coach at Patterson Collegiate. His wife, Gladys, came up with the idea of a scholarship fund in his name and when she died in 1973 the family decided to honor both of them.

Over the course of 20 years, 117 student/athletes have received a total of \$263,110.

"It's kind of sad to see it end but it's nice to go out on a high note," said Diane Girard, a niece of the Dawsons.

THIS YEAR'S scholarship total of \$24,000 is the highest one-year output.

It will allow Caplin to study sports medicene next fall at Eastern Michigan University, where she has been offered a softball scholarship. She ran track and played badminton, basketball and volleyball at Riverside.

Hope, who participted in basketball, soccer, volleyball and gymnastics, is bound for McMaster University to study geography and environmental studies.

Jones, who swam and played badminton, is intent on a career in dentistry that will begin at the University of Windsor.

Michels swam and played volleyball and soccer at Assumption, is off to the University of Calgary for its pre-med program.

Thomas, who ran track and cross-

country, is debating whether it's Queens or Windsor for biology.

And Trenhaile, like fellow Massey grad Jones, will be at the University of Windsor to study science. He played soccer and ran track and cross-country.

As well as excelling in sports, all six have maintained averages of 85 per cent or better during their high school careers.

"It's a little difficult to see this come to an end," Johnson told the gathering. "But in you, the winners, this scholarship doesn't end, it just carries on."

Angela Lauzon led the club with a .500 average, seven RBI and also pitched 41/4 games. Christina Cushman also batted .500 and drove in eight runs.

The squirt team, which features players 12 and under, won a silver medal.

The club opened pool play with an 8-2 win over Waterloo that featured a no-hitter by Sarah Tremaine. The Wildcats then completed a triple play in beating Brampton B 6-2 before Jodi Nelitz's no-hitter completed pool play as Windsor beat Cawthra 19-1.

Windsor bested Stratford 7-6 in the semi-finals before falling 7-0 to Brampton A in the gold-medal final.

Offensively, Jill Farrah batted 571 in the tournament and Mary Beatty batted .555.

The bantam team finished with a bronze medal. The club scored pool play wins of 3-0 over Brampton, 13-1 over Six Nations and 7-1 over Stratford.

The club then fell 7-3 in the semis to London, which is the defending provincial champions.

For the tournament, the club received strong performances from pitchers Chantelle Seguin, Tracy Lambert and Robin Fairin.






Fred Thomas inducted into Detroit's Afro-American Sports Hall of Fame

A n old friend begins by saying there are so many positive characteristcs you could submit about Fred Thomas the athlete, the teacher, and the person.

Unselfish?

"Oh, yes, completely. When he played, what he did never mattered

LLOYD McLACHLAN never mattered to him. Everything was for the team."
Leaping ability in basketball?
"You know, he was only sixfoot-two, but his strength was rebounding, controlling the boards, and usually he was the best player out there.

about special athletes and their distinctive qualities.

A half-century ago, his own career as a basketball player at Assumption drew raves. Two of his sons, Bruce and Chris, followed in his footsteps and played for the University of Windsor Lancers. A third son, David, starred at York University.

Coulthard's memories of Thomas originate with an unusual decision by Ed Dawson, who was the basketball coach and head of athletics at Patterson Collegiate for more than three decades.

"Mr. Dawson had an eye for talent. Fred had attended public school. That meant he hadn't played any organized basketball, or even played sports in a gym.

"I remember when Fred first came to Patterson. Our senior team was playing half-court during a "I remember one game we played against a team from Toledo. Fred was our centre. They weren't too worried about us at the start because they had a centre of their own who was six-foot-ten. Then, Fred took the opening jump from him."

Intelligent?

"Such a talent, and he was able to impart his knowledge. Of course, kids in a gym class always like to think of their teacher as being somebody special, with the reputation of a world-class athlete.

"WELL, FRED'S students had it right. He was exactly that, and they

respected him."

The old friend is Bill Coulthard of Tillsonburg. If the next question is about a bond of companionship, the answer almost goes without saying.


"We were the same age," Bill reveals.

"We went through high school together, although since I was able to start a couple of years earlier, we weren't in the same grades.

"Later on, we did play basketball together at Assumption College.

We were friends."

The multi-faceted legacy of Fred S. Thomas, considered by many to be Windsor's greatest athlete, is to be re-affirmed tonight with his posthumous induction into the International Afro-American

ship fund.

Former University of Windsor basketball coach Dr. Paul Thomas will speak about Fred Thomas, his life, and his stellar career in sports.

"He's the best I ever saw," Paul Thomas says.

The former athletic director at a Metro Toronto high school was 57 when he died of cancer in 1981.

Joining the Hall with Fred Thomas in the International category is Brazilian soccer legend Pele. practice, and Ed gave him a basketball and told him to work on his dribbling, shooting, and lay-ups at the other end of the gym.

"THAT TOLD us something right away about this new player. You see, Ed didn't have time to work with every youngster who happened to come to the door wanting to play. He recognized Fred's athletic ability. He knew Fred had special talent."

Dawson became a mentor to Thomas, and in time, the coach's instincts were proven correct.

Thomas was blessed with natural athletic skill. He was able to master virtually every sport he tried. He established formidable standards of performance on the basketball court, the baseball diamond, and the football field.

Basketball was his favorite pursuit. In the late 1940s, at Assumption, he reached dizzying offensive plateaus during an era in which scoring wasn't dominant. His local career points record, more than 2,000 generated in four college seasons, remains unmatched.

HE LATER SIGNED professional contracts with the Toronto Argonauts of the CFL, and with the Cleveland Indians' organization. He performed with the Harlem Globetrotters, and also coached and played senior basketball in Toronto.

"There are so many things you could say about Fred.

"Such a sense of humor. He was funny, friendly, outgoing. Of course, when we were on the road playing for Canadian championships, other teams wouldn't care too much about that, but away from the competition I can't think of anybody who didn't like him.

Such a legacy. So many positive characteristics. Who can even guess what might be the most positive of all?

Maybe an old friend.

"Just a delightful personality," Bill Coulthard remembers. "He was liked by everybody."
