

South Canadians reach semis at worlds

Strong defence helped Windsor advance despite a loss Thursday. The South Canadians had allowed fewer runs than two clubs with identical records.

Windsor South Canadians lost a battle but won a war Thursday at the Little League World Series for Major Girls' Softball in Portland, Ore.

The South Canadians lost a 3-1 decision to South U.S.A., which is represented by Waco, Texas, but they won a tiebreaker for second place in their round-robin pool and have advanced to the semi-finals tonight.

They will face either California Lancaster Little League or West Point, Penn. in a game that's set for 7:30 p.m. Portland time.

Waco won its pool with a perfect 3-0 record while the Far East, represented by the Phillipines, Central U.S.A., represented by Escanaba, and Canada all finished with 1-2 records.

The tiebreaker became runs allowed and that's where the South Canadians' defence held up, allowing 14 runs in three games compared to 28 by the Phillipines and 19 by Escanaba.

"We knew if we could stay close to Waco we had a chance (to win the tiebreaker)," said John MacDonald, the girls' softball director for the South Canadians.

"You could see the scoreboard of the Escanaba game from our field, so we kept an eye on it. The girls had the jitters early on in this one, just like the

In fact, Waco got all three runs from the first four batters that went to plate, with the key blow a two-run double by Laura Decker, who later scored on a sacrifice fly.

Waco loaded the bases three times in the game, but the South Canadians shut the door on each occasion to preserve the runs allowed differential.

The South Canadians got their run in the fourth inning, when Shayna MacDonald reached base on a one-out bunt. Bryn Pengelly came in as a pinch runner and advanced on a single by Suzanna Verbeem.

That duo completed a successful double steal, with Pengelly coming home on a ground out by Melissa Galamb.

Laura Sovran flied out to end the inning.

"We didn't get anybody else to second base." MacDonald said.

"They used three pitchers in the game and they brought in their best one in the sixth inning. They weren't fooling around because if they lost the game then we would have won the nool."

Six hits to five

Waco got just six hits in the game to five by the South Canadians. Verbeem went two-for-three and Jessica McCullough was two-for-two for the locals. Jackelyn Desjardins was the starting pitcher for Windsor.

"We're playing a new kind of ball out here," MacDonald said of the low-scoring affairs the girls have been involved in.

"It's definitely not a slugfest. We're teaching the kids to bunt and all kinds of things. It's much more strategical."

MacDonald said team officials had an inkling that good things might await them in Portland when they left Calgary after winning the Canadian major championships for 11 and 12 year olds.

"The Calgary Northwest team has been to the last three Canadians and they told us we were the strongest Canadian representative they'd seen," MacDonald said.

"They said 'you'll have a shot down there.'"

Win or lose tonight, the South Canadians will play again Saturday — either in the final or in the third-place game.

Softball ambassador

City woman takes talents to world championships

ast week, Dana Tofflemire was far from Normal.

But she's a lot closer today.

The 18-year-old Windsor native is in Normal, Illinois as part of Canada's national youth team that will take part in the ISF Women's Youth World Championships for softball.

"I'm very excited," said Tofflemire prior to a Windsor Wildcats' game at Wigle Park recently. "I'm going to learn as much as I can. Shan McDonald is an excellent coach and I'm honored to play for her."

McDonald is a Scarborough native who is now the head coach of women's softball at the University of Nevada Las Vegas.

Versatile player

She first saw Tofflemire play four years ago and has followed her progress since.

"She's a pretty versatile player."

McDonald said from her Vegas office. 'She can catch, play first or third and she can hit the ball okay."

Like the rest of her lineup, Mc-Donald has no idea how she will utilize the Forest Glade resident because budgetary cutbacks have not allowed the youth team to have a tryout camp or even much preparatory time together.

The entire team will assemble for the first time just five days prior to the start of the tournament June 20.

Nagging injury

"We won't know about any of the players until we get there," McDonald said. "And then we've only got five days to figure it out."

The biggest factor in Tofflemire's participation will be her health. A rotator cuff problem in her right shoulder has hampered her for more than a year now.

Since returning from her first season on a softball scholarship at Gulf Coast Junior College in Panama City, Florida, the St. Joseph's grad has been undergoing laser therapy on her shoulder.

She's also limited her play with the Wildcats' junior team to designated hitting.

Winning ways

In past years, she's pitched the Wildcats to a pair of Ontario championships and in 1993 she was invited to join the Compuware Softhall team in Michigan which allowed her to compete across the U.S.

While her shoulder prevented her from playing early in the Gulf Coast season, she did see action at second base at the state tournament where her team finished fourth with a roster of mostly freshmen like herself.

Tofflemire intends to return for her second year of study at Gulf Coast this fall before moving on to a U.S. university.

"I'll definitely be ready for university after this," Tofflemire said of the world championships.


The team went up against 22 teams from Illinois and Michigan and were the only team to represent Ontario in this international tournament. The Wildcats' record was 8-0.



to look at the interior of a vacant house located at 2714 Front in hopes of using the property as a temporary Legion headquarters. The property is owned by the municipality.

"We are without a place to operate from," Brunini said. "This prevents us from making money and donating it back to charitable foundations."

Council agreed to allow the Legion executive to view the property but did not commit to allowing the organization to use the building.

Buy a brick Council heard another report from Brunini regarding the new town cenotaph.

Brunini said the cenotaph committee is still selling bricks for the structure to the public at \$50 per brick. He said the committee will be taking orders at Zehrs on Malden Road today and Saturday.

The cenotaph, which will be located in the park beside town hall, will be officially dedicated Remembrance Day.

On the block Council agreed to put municipally owned property, located at the end of Normandy Street, up for sale. The property was to be purchased by the CAW Community Development Group with help from the Co-operative Housing Board prior to the elimination of the co-op housing program by the new Ontario government. The property was to be developed into co-op housing.
