Top umpire left legacy of baseball excellence

U mpires prefer not to be the centre of attention, but it was hard not to notice the late Art Ray.

Ray was considered one of the finest umpires in Ontario for 27 years and one of the area's leading sportsmen for seven decades.

That legacy of excellence is being recognized Oct. 18 when Ray is officially inducted into the

Windsor/Essex County Sports Hall of Fame.

"We're so pleased and proud that he got in," said Fay White, Ray's eldest daughter.

Ray was voted into the hall the first time his name appeared on the ballot.

It's a fitting tribute for a man that was first in so many things.

Born in Victory Mills, N.Y., on July 23, 1903, Ray was only 14 when he began to make his mark on local sports by being a charter member of the Mic Mac Club.

In the 1920s, Ray played football for the Mic Macs and the Windsor Wolverines until he suffered a near-fatal back injury in a game in 1923.

Unable to continue as a player, Ray became a trainer, coach and official for a number of local baseball, hockey and football teams.

In 1937, Ray help found the Windsor Umpires Association and an instructing school for area umpires.

Tony Koski was one of Ray's umpire school students in the early '40s.

"He knew everything there was to know about

umpiring," said Koski, who umped from 1945 to 1974. "He was such an excellent umpire — the best.

"He knew all the little things like positioning yourself to make a call. He was a great teacher.

"One of the hardest things in umpiring is knowing the rules and how to interpret them. Art knew how to do that.

"When you had Art as a umpiring partner, you never had any worries. He'd take care of things."

Despite drawing praise from ballplayers and fellow umpires, Ray remained modest when discussing his own skills behind the plate.

When told by a Windsor Star reporter that a team from Stratford had called him the best umpire they'd ever seen, Ray embarrassingly disputed the claim.

"Shucks, I wasn't so good," said Ray following the game that took place in the early '30s.

"I missed one. It was a good curve that sailed half an inch wide of the plate."

When he wasn't umpiring, he was coaching often four teams at once.

When ball season ended, it was off to the arena for hockey or down to the local bowling alley.

"People used to say it must be hard because your father must never be home," White said. "But, I always remember him being there for us.

"We'd go and watch his games. Sports was just a big part of our family life."

As the '50s wound down, Ray turned to administration and became vice-president of the Ontario Amateur Softball Association and president of the Ontario Umpires Association.

The OASA recognized his efforts in the '60s by giving him the first OASA Award for a lifetime of contributions.


Ray continued his formal involvement in baseball until retiring in the mid-'70s.

"He became a resource then," White said.

"Right up until he died in 1990, people would call him asking his opinion about certain rules and plays. He loved that."
