

The Windsor Expos have developed a reputation across Ontario in recent years as being a top-flight developer of boys baseball talent.

This year, the organization has expanded to include a girls fastball squad and the midget-aged travel team is already making a name for itself.





Three off to U.S. schools on baseball scholarships


ngela Lauzon's baseball career has hit the road and teammates Kelly Gray and Krysten Gray will soon follow.



Hogan used sports to bring people together

Club 240 founder a tireless worker

For a man dedicated to bringing people together through sports, the late Jimmy Hogan gained national recognition during the Second World War for something that fell apart.

Hogan, who will be inducted into the Windsor-Essex County Sports Hall of Fame Oct. 16, was a goalie in the Ford Association Hockey League during the war years.

Back then, the pucks were pre-fabricated instead of being made of a single piece of the rubber, which was needed for the war effort. In this particular game, an opponent took a shot and the puck split in two with half going in the net and the other half being caught by Jimmy.

Not long after, the incident was mentioned during Hockey Night in Canada's radio broadcast and the crew discussed whether or not a goal should have counted. The answer is no.

In the early 1960s, Hogan's two sons started playing pee wee hockey outdoors at Memorial Park. Murray Ewing, a longtime friend, also had a son playing and the two men would get to talking about establishing more teams for kids.

A few years later, that germ turned into Club 240, an organization dedicated to sponsoring minor sports teams throughout Windsor. In addition to

ing. the other founding members were Eddie Hogan, Sam Loreto, Carl Popkey, Ed Kornacki, John Wood, Art Butcher, Ron McNamara and Bob Hind.

"Jimmy and I first met when we were playing softball back in the old Ford league about 50 years ago," McNamara said.

"He was a real go-getter even then. So it made sense a few years later when he got us all involved in Club 240.

"He was president initially but later became treasurer because he was a

real good money-man," McNamara said. "If anybody ever said no to one of his fund-raising pitches, it just made him that much more determined."

Hogan was born in Lucan Feb. 5, 1917, moved to Windsor five years later and died on New Year's Eve, 1985.

He played in various local leagues during his athletic career making his mark as a softball pitcher and hockey goalie.

He played throughout the 1930s and into the late 1940s before turning his attention to non-playing pursuits.

Busy schedule

He was also, at various times, manager-coach of the Ford office juniors basketball team, coach of St. Joseph's high school basketball team, a basketball referee, secretary-treasurer of the Windsor & District Basketball Association, a Little League coach, president of the Ontario Amateur Church Basketball Association, coach, manager and fundraiser for the Windsor Minor

Hockey Association, president of the Central Roller Hockey League and a committee member of both the University of Windsor basketball tournament and Sedo Martinello Memorial Bursary Committee.

He won numerous awards for his involvement in amateur sports throughout the years.

The most valuable player award at the university basketball tournament is named after him as are memorial bursaries offered by the university and established by Club 240.

A longtime employee of the Ford Motor Company, Hogan was also active in UAW Local 240 as financial secretary for eight years and president for six. He also served as a UAW staff member for 20 years.
