Saints in tourney with depleted pitching staff

Women's team at St. Clair to open against New Brunswick

If the St. Clair Saints manage to win a medal at the national fastball championships they're hosting this weekend, they'll give a whole new meaning to one-armed bandits.

The Saints head into the sixteam Canadian Intercollegiate Fastpitch Tournament with just one fulltime pitcher in Melissa Bowyer.

Rookie hurler Allison Telfer injured her knee in a game against Mohawk a week ago and is unavailable for the weekend championship.

"I have a really excellent team," Saints coach Bill Smith said of a roster that includes veterans Trisha Whaley and

Keri Bagley.

"I'd like to finish with a bronze medal

finish with a bronze medal but I don't know if I can do that with only one pitcher."

Trisha Bowyer is Whaley more than capable of

capable of throwing multiple games in short order but the Saints will also miss Telfer's bat. "She's an awesome hitter," Smith said.

Smith has had rookies Kelley Nelson and Ashley Carr brush up on pitching mechanics they've used in the past.

The Saints open the twopool, round-robin tournament Saturday with a game against the University of New Brunswick at 9 a.m. at the John Ivan Complex at Mic Mac Park.

The Saints are in a pool with lege the University of Western field. Ontario and Durham College while the University of Windsor is in with UNB and the University of Calgary.

The Saints have reached the quarter-finals in each of the previous two national tournaments, knocked out both times by the eventual champs from the University of Saskatchewan.

With a mix of colleges and university programs, the na-

tionals are an invitational tournament where participants are extended positions based on their performance the previous season.

"They use a pecking order," said Ted Beale, a Saints athletic co-ordinator:

Organizing the fall championship was even more problematic than usual due to the strike by college support staff last month and the loss of Quebec's John Abbott College to the original eight-team field.

When a replacement couldn't

be found, Guelph was eventually dropped from the schedule to even up the pools at three teams each.

The Lady Expos reached the Eastern Canadian championship two years ago and finished fourth.

"It was a huge deal," Schincariol said.

"Now, it's great to have this opportunity at home. We've been really excited waiting for it since we found out we were (hosting)."

Manger Ken Lebert said the challenge now is getting the players to focus on the task at

"I think we have the talent." Lebert said.





Down the road, the two might be teammates again, but for now they've just enjoyed the ride this season.





Watch Brittany Hicks in action for a few innings and it becomes apparent that she is an elite softball player.

She hits for power. In the field at shortstop, her range is impressive.

Baseball Canada has also noticed. Hicks was invited to try out for the national team last month, and reached the final cut down before she was let go.

At 20, she knows time is on her side.

"Hopefully in a few years," said Hicks, in town playing for the Guelph Gators in the Canadian under-23 women's fastball championship. "I plan to keep trying."

Hicks intends to keep the dream alive, even though the ultimate carrot no longer dangles in front of the planet's best female softball players.

When the sporting world gathers in London, England next summer for the 2012 Summer Olympic Games, for the first time since 1992, women's softball will not be contested.

"It's a little disappointing, but all we can do it hope that one day, it will be back in the Olympics," Whithy Eagles


It was a choice many outside the game haven't yet realized took place.

"I was actually talking to a friend about it the other day and he was like, 'Well, we have a good fastpitch team,' and I said, 'Fastpitch isn't in the Olympics anymore.'

"I hate it. It's one of those things I would look forward to when I was watching the Summer Olympics."

In 2009, the IOC board met in Berlin and it was determined that softball would not return for the 2016 Summer Games in Rio de Janeiro, meaning that the earliest the sport could return to the Olympic program would in 2020, when most of the players in this tournament will be at or closing in on their 30th birthday.

Canada is currently ranked third overall in the world, and to the game's top players, this Olympic slight is cause for outrage. It's akin to telling Sidney Crosby to forget about the Stanley Cup, or informing Justin Verlander that the World Series is no longer an option.

"When you're younger, growing up, you see Team Canada playing and you say, 'That's what I want to strive to achieve,'" said Katherine Guenther, a pitcher for the defending national champion Saskatoon Outlaws.

"It's one of the goals you'd like to try and achieve in your life. When they take it out, it takes away the dream you once had."

Earlier this year, the International Softball Federation and the International Baseball Federation announced they were planning to band together to make a combined bid for inclusion in the 2020 Games.

Getting back into the Summer Games is essential to grow the popularity of the game. At the moment, with softball on the outs with the IOC, maintaining the staus quo is proving a challenge.

Player participation tends to plummet in the older age groups, as life's demands supersede diamond dreams, especially when there's no hope of Olympic gold.

"When you get older, it's like, 'Softball or a job?'" Sullivan said.

"There's nothing to look forward to beyond this, like the chance to get the gold medal for Canada."

Regaining Olympics status isn't merely about restoring softball's prestige.

A continued absence from the Olympic movement will significantly impact the future of the game.
