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Kennedy Card Attracts 400

BELL ICE, WINDSOR ICE AND COAL, SILVERWOODS WIN OPENING ENGAGEMENTS; HEAVY SCORING IN INAUGURAL

BELL ICE, Windsor Ice and Coal, and Silverwoods were victorious last night as the 1934 campaign of the Border Cities Softball Federation opened with three games, two at Kennedy Stadium and one at Stodgell Park. Bell Ice trounced West End, 14-3, at Kennedy in a City League tilt, after Silverwoods had walloped Paris Shines, 12-3, in a girls' game. At Stodgell Windsor Ice and Coal defeated Walkerside Dairy, 18-13, in an Industrial Group fixture.

Joe Saby Shines

About 400 fans were on hand at Kennedy Stadium to see the first double-header of the season, and Joe Saby, Bell Ice hurler, grabbed the lion's share of the spotlight. He was the outstanding performer in the City League contest with West End.

The West End club, considerably weaker than it was in winning local senior honors last year, found Saby and his hard-hitting team-mates too strong a combination last night. Saby was in mid-season form and struck out 13 while allowing but five hits and walking three.

Neither Ted Jacomb nor Bill Cullen could stop the Bell Ice clubbers and 13 hits rattled off the winners' bats, two each by Saby and Chapman, and three each by Weaver and Jack Smith.

Bell Ice scored three times in the third on a walk to Aitchison, Weaver's single and errors by Leishman and Jim Taylor. What proved to be the winning run was scored in the fourth on a walk, a single and an outfield fly. Weir's double, a wild pitch and Robson's fly brought West End its first run, and the others came in the eighth on a walk, an error and a single.

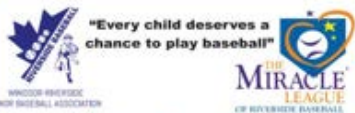


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BOLTER IN FORM

AID LOW SCORING

Border Cities fans who attend tomorrow night's twin bill will realize that the American rules have been devised to keep the scoring within reasonable bounds. A batter may not reach base on a dropped third strike, nor may a base-runner advance by way of a passed ball, wild pitch, or stolen base. Furthermore, the fact that there are ten players on a team, instead of nine, makes it harder for the batter to get on base.

The tenth player, known as the long-centre-fielder, plays behind the second base cushion and in that position cuts off many knocks that would otherwise go for safe hits. The only difference in the diamond is in the pitching distance, the Americans pitching 37 feet, whereas the Canadians hurl only 32 feet. The Canadian distance will be used in both games tonight in order to avoid altering the Kennedy diamond.

Silverwood last season went to the semi-final round of Ontario intermediate competition, and so far this season have been playing close to the form they maintained during 1933. Manager "Hutch" Hutchinson's club is setting the pace in the Border Cities League.

TEAMS SIMILAR

There is a noticeable parallel between Silverwoods and Page Dairy. Both clubs have all the necessary requirements for a successful team—hitting, pitching, fielding and speed on the base paths, and each club has been supreme in its own group for several years. Although Silverwoods have done well, their record is not nearly as impressive as that of the Toledo rivals. Page Dairy has won every game but one in the past two years. 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Ice Luger Chapman Keeps Cool for Many Softball Chores

GEORGE CHAPMAN REVELS IN SOFTBALL

Has Interest in Three Clubs



MEET George Chapman, 21-year-old Assumption College student and probably the busiest individual around the Border Cities these blistering days. George plays for two softball teams, manages another, and between games packs a pair of ice tongs for a local firm. Left, Chapman in the uniform of Bell Ice of the City League; centre, as the "Any ice today, lady?" expert with Windsor Ice and Coal (he plays for that company's Industrial League team); right, Manager Chapman of Dayus Roofers in the City League attempts to solve a knotty problem.

The boss and I were chatting during one of our few leisure moments and, like the postman who goes for a long walk on his day off, we soon found ourselves talking about sport.

"Say, I imagine some of these fellows playing softball in both the City and Industrial Leagues have a hard time filling their engagements, don't they?" It was the boss speaking and I agreed with him, not only because he was the boss but also because some local softballers really do have a hard time being where they are supposed to be. Take, for instance, George Chapman. There's a fellow who never seems to get enough softball. It was natural that Chapman's name should crop up during our little discussion and the boss thought he was a worthwhile subject for a feature story. I thought so too, and, being a softball editor of sorts, was assigned to the business of giving you readers the "low down" on young Mr. Chapman.

"Chappie" was born at Newboro, Ontario, on October 4, 1912. Apart from its effect upon the Chapman household, the blessed event did not qualify as an outstanding one in the history of the community. If "Chappie" were to go back to the old home town now, though, he might be appreciated more because of the fine record he has compiled in amateur sport. However, the Chapmans came to the Border Cities when George was only seven years of age, and it is here that "the local boy" has made good while his home town still remains oblivious of his accomplishment.

What really led up to this story is the fact that of all the busy softball players hereabouts, "Chappie" is probably the busiest. You go to a ball game one night and see that one of the most important cogs of the Bell Ice club's infield machinery is a third-baseman by the name of Chapman. The next night you decide to take in the double-header at Kennedy Stadium. In the first game you see Windsor Ice and Coal battling for an Industrial League playoff berth. The third-sacker for that club bears a strong resemblance to the guardian of the hot corner for Bell Ice. Upon closer inspection you find that the two third-basemen are one and the same person—George Chapman.

Having settled that little matter to your own satisfaction and with the first game now completed, you sit back to watch the teams scheduled for the nightcap go through their infield practice. Dayus Roofers are playing tonight and who should be knocking out grounders but this same young Mr. Chapman. "Well," you say to yourself, "at any rate he doesn't play for this team. He's probably hitting 'em around to oblige the Dayus manager." Practice ended, the Dayus manager goes into conference with the opposing pilot and the umpire and you rub your eyes to make sure you aren't seeing things. No, it's an actual fact! Darned if this guy Chapman doesn't manage the Dayus outfit!

Yes, Mr. and Mrs. Reader, George Chapman is the Bell Ice third-baseman, the Windsor Ice and Coal third-baseman and the Dayus Roofers' manager. How he does it is hard to tell, but "Chappie" holds down all three jobs and holds them down in a highly efficient manner.

"Chappie" is one of the veteran softballers of the Border Cities, having broken into Federation competition back in 1928 with the Red and White Store Intermediates. He was only 15 then but earned a place on the roster. Next year, though, Chapman played junior with the Glenmore Club. He jumped to intermediate ranks again in 1930, however, as centre-fielder for the Sugar Bowl club. He stayed with the same outfit throughout 1931 but played second base.

When the 1932 season rolled around, Chris Bergeoine, anxious to build up a team capable of bringing the Border Cities their first junior championship, went after Chapman to play third base for his Dayus Roofers, the position he had held while with Red and White and Glenmores. "Chappie" signed and Dayus won the Ontario junior title. One of the big reasons for the club's splendid success was the work of this same Chapman, who batted .440 and fielded .970 for the season.

The Roofers stepped up into Senior "B" circles in 1933 and Chapman kept

up his good work, although his club just failed to make the playoffs.

At the start of the current campaign Bell Ice, a new entrant in Senior "B" ranks, enlisted the entire Dayus infield of 1932 and 1933. In the meantime Commissioner Prank Dayus decided to back a team for the fourth successive year. He wanted a junior club and had plenty of good material. All that was necessary was a good manager, so Dayus secured the services of Chapman, whom he held in high regard as a smart ball-player.

"Chappie" has managed the youthful Roofers since the start of the season and, while the club has not set the league on fire yet, it gives every indication of making a strong bid for junior honors in this district, thanks largely to good coaching by Manager Chapman.

Despite his managerial worries, "Chappie" continues to compile high-class averages as a player. The latest release of the official batting averages show that he stands fourth among the regular players of the City League with a fine mark of 426. He is fielding .912 in the same league and, though he has not hit well in Industrial League competition, it is a fairly safe bet that he will be up among the leaders when the season ends. So far he has played in only two Industrial League games.

Softball is not the only line of sport in which George Chapman has made a name for himself. He has more than 20 medals to prove that he is also a stellar performer in track and field events, American football, Canadian rugby and basketball.

He won the individual intermediate track and field championship of the Border Cities Secondary Schools Association in 1929, after winning the championship of his own school, Kennedy Collegiate. Two years later he won senior honors among Kennedy students. During his tenure at Kennedy, Chapman won eight letters and he had already won one at Windsor Central Collegiate, which he entered after passing out of Prince Edward Public School.

As a representative of Kennedy Collegiate he set Border Cities Secondary School Association records in the senior boys' running broad jump and in the intermediate 880-yards race.

At Western Ontario Secondary Schools Association track and field meets, held annually, Chapman won the half-mile in 1930 and finished second in the quarter the same year. He had finished second in the half in 1929, and finished second in both the senior running broad jump and the senior half-mile in 1931. He again finished second in the senior half-mile in 1932. He has won track and field medals at the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto, the Cadillac A. C. meet in Detroit and the Michigan A. C. U. meet at Ann Arbor. He was second in the intermediate half-mile in the Ontario Interscholastic Meet in Kingston in 1929 and two years later was second in the senior half at the Ontario Interscholastic Meet in Toronto. His latest achievement was in the spring of 1934, when, as a member of Father William McGee's Assumption College team he established a new record in the running broad jump at the Michigan-Ontario Conference meet at Ypsilanti. The old record was set by Julius Goldman, another Windsor boy, at that time attending Detroit Institute of Technology.

Chapman has played basketball for Kennedy Collegiate, Windsor-Walkerville Tech and the Assumption College "B" team but in only one year has he been fortunate enough to be a member of a champion court aggregation. In the 1932-33 season "Chappie" was one of the stalwarts of the Windsor-Walkerville Tech team which won the Eastern Canada high school basketball championship.

The runs were the result of three hits, an error by Payne and a much more costly error by Hawken, who let Smith's line drive go through his hands for a four-base muff.

DEFENSE FAILS

The Chrysler defense fell to pieces completely in the eighth inning. H. Jacomb and Weir reached second and third respectively on errors by Leeson, Patterson and McMillan. Bruggeman then lined a hit into right field and received credit for a home run when the ball took a trick hop past Payne. Smith, next up, looped a fly to centre-field and Haugen dropped it. McMillan threw out Robson, but Smith scored when Hawken dropped Douglas' lift to left field. Douglas reached third on the error and scored when Finlay singled after Leishman had fanned. G. Taylor next cracked a double to right but Finlay was run down between third and home to end the inning.

Later he connected for a three-base hit but spoiled this by making his four-base error on Smith's drive in the seventh. In the eighth he dropped Douglas' fly, then wound up an eventful evening with an almost miraculous catch to rob Robson of a home run with one aboard in the ninth.

Chryslers In Playoff Win

Take First Contest Of
Senior "B" Series

Chrysler Airflows, representing the Border Cities, today are one up on St. Thomas R. G. Dun Babies in their O.A.S.A. Senior "B" playoff series. In those first four frames only Alex Norry met with any success in the way of hitting. Norry slammed out a single in the first and a double in the third, but did not get past third base. During the same four innings Bill Payne and "Lefty" Haugen each drew two bases on balls and Tom Patterson walked once, but all were stranded.

CHRYSLER RALLY

Norry refused to be downhearted, however, and rapped out another double, his third straight hit. "Red" Kennedy and Bill Payne then drew free tickets to first to fill the bases, but Goldman's fly to right field did not do any good. "Mickey" McMillan, next batter, had fanned and hit a foul fly to first base in his first two times at bat, but this time he came through with a bang, slamming a three-base hit to left-centre to chase home his three mates and tie the score. That rattled Neil apparently, for Patterson then drew the third base on balls of the inning and stole second. Haugen next dropped a Texas Leaguer double into short centre field, scoring McMillan and Patterson, then crossed the plate himself when Antaya singled to centre. Drubs Chrysler Club In One-Sided Softball Playoff Tilts

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C. H. Smiths Win Title

Beat Bendix Softballers In Industrial Loop Playoff

With Russ Evon pitching over the entire route in both games, C. H. Smith's last night swept both ends of a double-header with Bendix at Kelsey Park to annex the championship of the Industrial Softball League for 1934. Smith's romped to an 11-1 victory in the curtain-raiser, but had to play 11 innings before nosing their way to a 14-13 win in the nightcap.

SMITHS EVEN SERIES

Smiths had to win the first game to even up the series, but they did it without difficulty, as Evon gave a fine display on the mound. Four hits and five bases on balls were all that the Bendix batters could get off the young rise-ball pitcher, while he fanned 14 of their number. Ed Saby, the Bendix hurler, was exceptionally wild and issued 11 passes to first, besides being reached for 10 hits.

Smiths scored often enough in the first inning to win the opening game when they counted twice on two bases on balls, three stolen bases and an out. Bendix did not tally until the seventh and just after their run had scored they almost got another on one of the weirdest plays ever seen on a baseball or softball diamond in this vicinity. With three men on base and two out Wilf Lewis fanned, but Catcher "Turch" Evon dropped the third strike. Lewis and his teammates went out to their positions in the field, then Lewis suddenly strolled to first base. Under the rules he was safe and Umpire "Star" Mason signalled as much. Plevin, Smiths' centre-fielder, kept his head during this amazing play, however, rushed up to Pitcher Evon, grabbed the ball and touched home plate to force the runner who had been on third base and thereby retire the side.

Lewis and Evon were the opposing pitchers in the nightcap and each had a bad stretch. Evon's came in the second, third and fourth frames, while Lewis, handicapped by poor support, was scored on 13 times from the sixth to the ninth innings, inclusive.

Evon, naturally enough, had shown signs of tiring at the start of the second game, but he settled down again and wound up in great style. He fanned 14 batters in this game, just as he did in the opener, while Lewis struck out 17.

WINNING RUN UNEARNED

The run that won the second game, the series and the championship, was scored by Bomier, who led off with a single, reached second on a wild pitch and came all the way home on Heydon's wild heave into centre field.

The teams pounded out 52 hits during the twin bill and the outstanding individual hitters were Heydon, Norris, R. Evon, Keenan and Murdock.
