I've always been a car guy, and for that matter, loved Growing up, my stepfather had an assortment of vehicles at the property where we

lived. He had an area of about a quarter acre that he had cleared in the woods behind the house where he stored the equipment necessary for a small general contracting company ('53 Ford dump truck, Oliver backhoe, John Deere 450 bulldozer, well drilling machine mounted on a '50 Chevrolet truck, Diamond T Flatbed, etc). All of these I learned to operate at a young age. In addition, there were about a dozen or so cars in various states of disrepair. More about those later.

Given that all this equipment was used regularly for their intended purposes (and some purposes I am sure the design engineers never anticipated) they regularly broke. All maintenance and repair work was done outside. We had no garage. I can vividly remember lying in the snow in the dark underneath the backhoe holding the light so my stepfather could weld some broken piece. My job was always to hold the light. Somehow, it seems I could never hold it properly! But I learned a lot about rotating mechanical equipment and what made them tick.

By the time I was twelve I was competent enough to change the head gasket on our 1964 Buick Special. It had a one year only engine with an Iron Block and Aluminum heads that repeatedly needed repair, which leads me back to those cars out in the back forty. Most of them were old family cars that just wore out. In those days it was not unusual, at least in New England, to keep old vehicles. Others were vehicles that my stepfather brought home and deposited out back. If I could get them running, I was allowed to drive the vehicles on the property (we had seven acres). I had a ball! The first car I got running was a 1959 Plymouth station wagon, followed soon by a 1960 Opel Cadet. But it was all done outside in the weeds and the mud

and the snow.

Thus began my lifelong fascination with cars and everything about them. By the time I left home for the anything mechanical. Navy, I was a halfway decent shade tree mechanic. Finding shelter for auto repair proved more difficult. I finally got a house with a one car garage when I was in my early 30's and stationed in Maine. I promptly went out and got my first hobby car, a 1961 Chevy Impala. As I got older and more established, more houses with bigger garages followed. But I found that as I could afford bigger houses, I could also afford more hobby cars! I developed a habit of always having more car than garage. This culminated in a house I built with a four car garage and a workshop. Within short order, I found myself with a fifth car that I absolutely had to have! And then it got worse; life changes dictated that I sell the house with the four car garage. I ended up where I live now. It is a fabulous house that I like even better than the last one. But it only has a three car garage. So I was having to pay storage on two vehicles. One day earlier this year Maggie said "Why don't you outfit yourself with a space where you can keep and play with ALL your cars?". We then had a discussion about car condos and prices and location, after which she said "Well why don't you just ask a commercial realtor"? So, I did. What I found was a 1,200 square foot warehouse space with access to utilities only three



miles from my house and for not much more than I was paying for a storage space that was too small to do anything with, never mind that it was 120° inside! There was some initial demolition to be done. This was accomplished with the help of Bill Swanson & Jimmy Mayne. I hired a contractor to complete construction to my design. You can see some of the results in the accompanying pictures to this article. The completed space includes a generous workshop with storage for up to four vehicles and a seven thousand pound lift (no more lying in the snow!). There is a 12'x20' air conditioned space in the back with a kitchenette, toilet, shower, & vanity. It is my dream come true; a real man cave and a real shop where I can work in climate controlled comfort!

So now I have five vehicles with storage for seven (six ideally, because the seventh would have to be stored on the lift). Oh, did I mention I just bought a 1967 Ford F100? It will probably be delivered by the time you read this. So that makes six......

One last thing. Where did the "Wrench's Garage" moniker come from? When I lived in Colorado (1993-



2012) I did a lot of motorcycle riding. Being me, I liked to ride OLD motorcycles, preferably Harley Davidson's. Old Harley's vibrate a lot. Because of that, pieces regularly become loose and broken. I became adept at roadside repairs of my motorcycles and acquired the nickname Wrench. Maggie heard one of my friends from Colorado greet me as such and had the sign that hangs over the door made for my birthday. It is my hope that all of you stop by for a visit. ## Tales from My Early Days at the Dealership (Experiences as a Car Salesman)

In 1988 Julia & I made the decision to move from Binghamton, NY, to Syracuse. It was late spring, and the move was only a few months away from becoming a reality. A friend who knew I was changing jobs called and told me that he had spoken to a local Ford dealer who wanted a general manager. I told him I would be moving in just 3-4 months, and he said he understood. The next day I received a call from the Ford dealer saying he had spoken with my friend, but he wanted to talk with me anyway. It was a Thursday, and I told him that I could see him Monday. However, he insisted I see him Friday morning, in as much as he wouldn't be available on Monday. He asked if I could meet him at his store at about 7:00 AM. I agreed to do so, and when I arrived the next morning at 6:45 AM, he was there pacing the showroom floor, smoking a cigarette, and puffing like a steam engine. He unlocked the door and ushered me into his office where we sat and went over the situation. His offer regarding working hours, a company car, benefits, & salary were very interesting... After talking for about half an hour, we reached an agreement. He then said to follow him, and we toured the facility before any other employees arrived. I should add that we had not really met prior to that day, and he only knew me by reputation and seeing me at dealer meetings. He took a large ring of keys from his jacket pocket and explained what each of them fit. This key was for his office, that key was for the showroom door, this key was for the parts department, and that key was for the main office. He then handed me a piece of paper with the combination for the safe. We went outside where he showed me the key for the outside service area doors, the eight foot fence around the back parking lot, and the used car department which was a separate building. After that he took me to my office and showed me the sales board where vehicle sales were recorded.

The employees were due to arrive, and I expected him to introduce me to his crew. But instead, he tossed me the keys and said he had to leave. I then told him that I would start Monday morning, but he insisted that I stay and begin immediately. He had a limo coming to take him to New York City to catch a cruise ship. I asked him about various things I would be responsible for. He said we could discuss them when he got back in two weeks.

Well, I was shocked! This man had just given the keys to his kingdom to a person whom he didn't know. What was wrong with him? He shook my hand and left. I spent the rest of the day introducing myself to many surprised people; a very unusual day to be sure. Monday morning was the regular sales meeting in the conference room on the second floor. As the sales people arrived, the room filled with more & more smoke, I could hardly stand it. I had spent time on Saturday looking over the inventory and discovered that the dealership had cars from four different model years. I got cash from the office to use as incentives to clean up the old stock. I placed the cash on the table in front of me and said nothing about it until the meeting was nearly over. Every single sales person had noticed it. I explained that having such old cars in stock wouldn't do, and anyone selling those specific vehicles would get the normal commission and nice crisp \$100 bill. And the they would get it tax free. The inventory was quickly reduced down to an acceptable level. In the next week I discovered there was not a single department head who wasn't stealing in one way or another. I am not a super sleuth, but the theft was blatant. The service manager and his assistant both kept beer under the their desk. How did I know? They offered me a bottle of Budweiser first time I introduced myself. The service manager would go to lunch at a local watering hole and wouldn't return until the next morning. The parts manager sold parts on a onefor-you, one-for-me basis. Theft was everywhere, and it was very obvious.

When the owner returned two weeks later, he said hello, looked at the sales board, and said he had a gin tournament at the country club. So he would see me in the morning. There was only one loyal employee in a management position, and he was the comptroller who owned a part of the business. The following morning when the owner arrived I told him that we needed to speak at which point I told him what I had discovered. He responded with a shrug and that was the end of it.



The 2021 tour held on May 20-25 was hosted by the AACA Mountain State Classics Region at the Canaan Valley Resort in Davis, WV. The weather was perfect in the 80's and mostly rain free for the entire time. It was a definite challenge navigating the Mountain State road inclines of 5-10 degrees and hair pin turns testing the "old iron" vehicles brakes. A kickoff dinner was held at the Davis Fire Hall with tour director Franklin Gage welcoming the 90 plus vehicle participants and introducing the AACA National Directors in attendance. All were encouraged to have a great time and enjoy all the beautiful country scenery the area has to offer.



Day 1 of the tour began with the coffee stop at Yokums Store which is an old time county establishment with food and gifts galore. Next was a steep road to Spruce Knob to the summit of Spruce Mountain which is the highest point in West Virginia with a spectacular view of part of the Allegheny Mountains. Lunch was at staggered times to accommodate the numerous participants and was at the Gateway Restaurant at the foot of the road to the summit. The next stop was the well known landmark of Seneca Rocks with a ranger giving a presentation about the discovery and history of highest point in West Virginia, made for breathtaking

the formation millions of years ago. There was also a site homestead in the process of restoration. It was then time to return to the resort lodge for dinner on our own.

Day 2 was travel to Elkins, WV, to visit the Railroad and Appalachian Forest museums which was also the coffee stop for the morning. Both museums were well done to teach about the railroad history in the area as well as the importance that forestry played in the region. One very interesting vehicle on display was the 1946 Cadillac Rail Car under restoration sitting on the track in need of donations to complete the project.



Leaving the railroad depot, vehicles headed to the Gandy Dancer Dinner Theatre for a fabulous luncheon and rip roaring, foot stomping, musical show featuring music and dance performances covering all decades from the 30's to the 80's. There was something for all ages to enjoy. What a great show!

Day 3 had us heading to the Gateway restaurant for coffee & homemade cookies before moving onto Cass, WV, to ride the Cass Scenic Railroad and visit the museum & shops. There was a short video and a miniature layout of the town which had been built to process raw lumber into finished wood product. The ride on open air rail cars with coal fired steam engines pushing the train up to the mountain top lasted four and a half hours, and a box lunch was provided. An interesting track switch back process made it easier to climb the mountain. Bald Knob at the top, the third



views and photo shots with about a 30 minute stop. Heading back a little quicker downhill, the riders were ready to return to the resort after another day.

Day 4 heading down the steep mountains again brought us to the Smoke Hole Caverns and Gift Shop where they have an extensive layout of sweet treats and coffee to enjoy. This shop is reported to be the largest in West Virginia and covered two full floors with souvenirs and clothing of all descriptions. Groups of 50 at a time were guided for an extensive period deep



The last visit of the day was the Reeds Creek Fish Hatchery where hundreds of thousands of various trout are raised for stocking many West Virginia rivers & streams. Very interesting presentation.

Day 5 concluded the tour. The nearby Blackwater Falls State Park features a grand waterfall which is widely photographed, and steps to go to the bottom for an up

close look. Further down the road is the Pendleton Point Lookout to view the Blackwater Canyon. Coffee & treats were available at the pavilion. It was then off to Moorefield for lunch at the Moorefield Church of God. Following a great lunch, the private collection of AACA member Chris Alt was open featuring some 30 odd vehicles with rare cars & trucks such as REO, Nash, Knight, Studebaker, & others in two buildings. The



Grant County Mulch facility supplying much of the country with premium mulch products with narration by the owners concluded the day and the tour. It was then back to the Canaan Valley Resort to prepare for the closing banquet dinner. Again at the Davis Fire Hall, the evening concluded with remarks from AACA Executive VP Wayne Tuck congratulating the Mountain State Classics Region and presentation of an award to tour director Franklin Gage for hosting the 32nd Annual Event. Franklin thanked all the attendees for coming and reminded them that the 2022 Founders Tour will be in March 2022 in Alabama hosted by the Deep South Region.



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
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
