† From the Pastor's Study **†**

Let's Talk About It

For though by this time, you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food, for everyone who lives on milk is unskilled in the word of righteousness, since he is a child. But solid food is for the mature, for those who have their powers of discernment trained by constant practice to distinguish good from evil. Therefore, let us leave the elementary doctrine of Christ and go on to maturity, not laying again a foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God, and of instruction about washings, the laying on of hands, the resurrection of the dead, and eternal judgment. Hebrews 5:12–6:2

This passage of Scripture is one of the most misunderstood sections of the New Testament. Most people take it something like this, "You are juvenile in your faith and are still struggling with the more difficult teachings of the Bible; get into a good study and learn the more weighty things of God's Word!" That is not what the author of the book of Hebrews is saying, although he is saying something like that which is why this passage is so often misconstrued.

The author was not practicing some kind of heavy-handed recruiting because their local church needed more Sunday School instructors. He was jabbing at God's call for them to "teach" their closest companions. They were not telling those they interacted with at work and in their communities the ever-

present realities of Jesus' rising from the dead. They knew our great Father in Heaven has invited us into a vital relationship with Jesus. They simply were not sharing it with others with any kind of necessary or compulsory fervor.

What the Scripture writer is getting at is not a lack of understanding but a deficiency of obedient living. To catch that nuance, one must look at the whole of the book of Hebrews and then zero in on this passage. The problem with the original audience of Hebrews was that they wanted to shrink back into their old ways (i.e. attending synagogue and pretending to be Jewish still believing in the resurrection) to avoid the nasty situation of aggressively living out the realities and responsibilities of what Jesus Christ's conquering the grave means to the world. It was not that their senses were untrained because of a lack of mental acuity, they simply were not sharing that truth with their friends for fear of persecution and rejection.

Notice in the passage they were quite good at talking about repentance, the rituals of washing and laying on of hands, and even the eternal state of the resurrection and final judgment. They just were not fine with saying, "JESUS has done all this for us, and <u>you</u> (fill the blank here with the name of your loved one who has yet to trust Jesus) need a relationship with Him, because knowing all that other stuff and even practicing it *in no way saves anyone*! You need to have –by active living faith– a dependent personal relationship with Jesus!"

Let's put all this in practical terms for those of us who worship regularly at 8373 Kings Highway. Our task is not to invite people to come worship with us. As much as our egos (especially mine) may relish in the fact that our attendance could be more robust and energetic, anyone's relationship with our church and participation in our liturgy will not move them any closer to Christ if they do have a relationship-seeking-faith in Jesus. That is what we should be inviting people to participate in.

Let's be skilled in that. Let's be skilled in saying to others, "I have a soul enriching walk with the LORD, and I would like not only to share with you how that is possible through repentant faith, but I would also like for us to walk alongside one another as we pursue together the wonders of His matchless love." That would be time well spent.

♦ Jacob's Church Board Meeting ♦ July 1, 2024

Attendance: Senior Pastor Stan Newton, Elders Mike Follweiler and Dave Zoghby, Deacons Michael Bailey, Tom Foulk, Kayla Fusselman, Kaitey Sacks, Ed Sawyer, Treasurer Kelly Mease.

Absent: Mike Madtes and Diane Wertman.

No visitors.

Pastor noted that attendance should not show Treasurer Kelly Meese as absent, since she is not required to attend board meetings, but does so voluntarily.

Reports

- 1. Pastor opened with a reading from *The Valley of Vision* and with prayer.
- 2. Treasurer's Report for June, 2024 One-month and six-month income/expenses, cash balances and cash report for the month ended June 30, 2024

One-month income/expenses for June, 2024:
Total Income \$69,600.75
Total Expenses \$25,972.53
Net Unrestricted Profit/(Loss) \$43,628.22
Less: Restricted Income \$12,842.64
Add: Restricted Expenses \$ 0.00
Net Unrestricted Profit/(Loss) \$30,785.58

Note: Net Unrestricted Profit/(Loss) represents the profit/(loss) of the General Fund excluding any Unrealized Gains/(Losses)

It was noted that an electric bill credit for a house that is now rented was applied to another property owned by the church. Michael B. made a motion, seconded by Kayla, to approve the treasurer's report. The motion carried.

3. The board reviewed the minutes for June, 2024. It was noted under Scholarship Committee that the second recipient was Isaiah Johri, not Elijah Johri. Mike F. made a motion, seconded by Tom, to approved the minutes as revised. The motion carried.

Old Business

Elders:

- -Dave reported that the elders discussed the donation policy. He noted oversight by the elders and pastor of the Good Samaritan Fund, and stated that contributors to specific needs should designate "Good Samaritan" on the check memo line, or notify the financial secretary. He indicated that these funds are tracked in the elders' meeting minutes.
- -Youth Minister update: Dave reported that the elders and pastor agreed on the following general job requirements: 2 events per month, 2-3 hours per event (like a mini-VBS) = 10 hours per month. Compensation will be \$25 per hour, with a budget of approximately \$50 per month for supplies. Kayla said she would consider the position. She indicated that there would be times or specific months (such as during VBS) when the required hours would need to be averaged due to her time constraints. Pastor stated that the position would be re-evaluated when Will Dellicker returns from military duty.
- -New Members So far, 6 people have expressed an interest in the fall membership class. Pastor explained his view on the need for a membership class, and asked for feedback.

Finance Committee:

- -Dave stated that Janney Montgomery Scott is asking what "big ticket" items for which the church anticipates fund withdrawals. Ed asked about improvements to make the activity center floor less slippery for active use. Mike F. mentioned an alternative surface for sports, and Tom looked into using a grinder. While there have been no complaints from activity center users, the high use increases the possibility of an accident.
- -Faye Foulk has the few responses received from the membership/giving letter recently sent.

Property Committee:

- -Fuel oil Dave reported that Countryside, the church's fuel oil supplier, offers 3 payment methods: standard \$3.419/gal; budget cap same price, plus a 20-cent/gal cap insurance; and prepay. The church budgeted for prepay. Dave and others thought that \$3.419/gal is high, Ed said it was much lower recently. Jared Hermany will check into pricing for commercial programs; Tom believes that would entail paying sales tax. Katie made a motion, seconded by Ed, to elect the prepayment option, but to look for a better price. The motion carried.
- -Tower repair Dave reported that the church received an insurance proceeds check for \$26,000 after a \$2500 deductible for inside repairs. The church will need to submit a separate claim when the cost for outside repairs is known, which requires having a mason inspect the tower.
- -Landscaping It will not be possible to apply more mulch to the playground area before VBS.
- -Office Air conditioning is to be completed on 7/2. The office phone is not working, will be fixed.
- -PA DEP inspection Dave reported no violations.
- -Fox property Tom stated that he opened discussions with the property owner.
- -Wuchter property Dave reported that porch work slowed during the heat wave. Tom said he would soon have access to a 40' lift which could be used.

Christian Education Committee:

- -VBS Kayla reported that 30 children are currently enrolled, and more are expected to approach the average of 60. All positions have been filled, and decorations will start going up this week. Katie noted that the sound system and projector need to be set up, and Tom said he would spray the nests of stinging insects. Kayla stated that help is needed to discard VBS prep trash.
- -Confirmation class Stan provided a 2-year schedule for classes, to be conducted the first 3 Sundays of each scheduled month. He indicated that there are 4 or 5 prospective students.
- -LC Medical (formerly Life Choices)— Tom said they are looking for a liaison for their banquet in October. Faye Foulk will ask Donna Shay if she is interested.
- -Shoebox Ministry Kayla found labels and stickers. Preparations need to start soon.

Music Committee: The praise group seeks a pianist and a guitarist.

Sound System and IT Committee: Stan urged the board to proceed with the proposed sound system upgrade. Bill Dellicker knows of another company to approach, since the company that gave the proposal has been reluctant to return to meet with the board. Stan related that the singers' priority is to be able to hear themselves clearly.

Missions Committee: The elders continue to work on recommendations for guidelines to use in evaluating ministries. Ed stated he sees full garbage cans at SPADE, a supported ministry, but no people. Michael B. asked if the elders could complete guidelines so that whoever constitutes the Missions Committee will have time to use those criteria to evaluate current and potential supported ministries in time to make recommendations for the next budget.

Special Events: Katie reported that Ladies' nights out will take a break until September. Ed said that Friday nights should resume in fall.

Doctrine Committee: Stan reported that the committee touched on various doctrinal points, and that one committee member felt that doctrinal direction should come from the board, not just a committee.

Cemetery Association: There are 12 small piles of excavated dirt that need to be removed because they are encroaching on the area for grave sites.

New Business

- -Membership Removal Request Ed made a motion, seconded by Mike F., to approve the request of Tom Linette to be removed from the membership roll.
- -Sales Tax Exemption From Dave is to provide information for Kelly to input onto the form.
- -Little Lambs Day Care Stan is to meet with them on 7/16 at 6:30 pm to discuss ways they and the church could interconnect more (ex. parenting class).
- -Activity Center How does the board want the center used? Currently, it is reserved on a first come, first served basis, which sometimes prevents church use. Tom said that some groups block out too much time or too far into the future.
- -Tucker Wessner and Denise Macalush Elders will discuss these needs at their next meeting.

Stan informed the board of planned travel the week of 8/5 and return on 8/10. He also will be flying to Houston on 8/17 and will miss that Sunday.

Pastor offered a closing prayer. Kayla made a motion, seconded by Katie, to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried.



Come, let us sing for joy to the Lord; let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before him with thanksgiving and extol him with music and song. Psalm 95:1 - 2

Thank you so much to all of you who shared your musical talents with us during the summer months. It was blessing to everyone!

Choir season is here! Rehearsals will begin on Thursday, September 5 from 7:00-8:15 PM. The Choir will be rehearsing in the large room in the basement. The choir folders with all of your music and schedule are in the cabinet at the bottom of the steps.

Any one grades 9 to adult is welcome to join, whether you are a member of the church or not. Rehearsals begin with warm-ups in breathing and singing, as well as working on singing posture and vocal production. We sing a variety of styles of music to praise God such as, classical pieces, traditional hymn-based anthems and contemporary songs.

Any new members will be assigned someone in the choir to be your "buddy" and help you with any questions you may have during rehearsal. I am also available to assist members either during or after the rehearsal.

We will be starting off the year with the anthem, "O That I Had a Thousand Voices" with music written by Jay Althouse. The interesting part is that the text was written in 1704 by Johann Mentzer, who was a theologian in Germany. He studied at Wittenberg and was assigned to be a preacher at various churches in Germany. In total, he wrote the text for 34 hymns, some of which have been translated into English.

Organ tidbit: Organs are either electronic (digital) or pipe. We have a pipe organ, although you cannot see the pipes, due to the fact that they are located in chambers on either side of the chancel behind mesh screens. There is a large blower in its own room in the basement which provides pressurised wind needed to produce sound in the pipes. So....in essence, the pipe organ is a wind instrument played by means of a keyboard. (The Greek engineer Ctesibius of Alexandria is credited with inventing the organ in the 3rd century BC!)







BARNABAS BENEFIT CONNECTING CARING HEARTS WITH NEEDS WORLDWIDE

Thank you for your recent prayers, encouragement, and giving.

A few "off the cuff" updates:

A young leader who manages a computer store in Nepal arranged to buy components wholesale from China to program 100 micro-SD cards with Nepalese Bibles and stories and songs and install them into solar radios. He travels many miles on his motorbike crossing many rivers/streams and eventually trekking on foot carrying items like these to reach the mostly illiterate tribal families high in the mountains. We previously helped him with PVC pipe to provide drinking water and build relationships.

Another young lady celebrated her 29th birthday today traveling 5 grueling hours home to her Husband, Daughter and 7 orphans after her second of 5 chemo treatments for her breast cancer. She is discouraged that she is losing her thick black hair but "looking forward to another year". While she was there, she somehow managed to start a project to clean, care for boils, and delice the refugee children in the area where she was getting treatment as well as to arrange for multiple wells to be drilled. She even got the hospital to provide vitamins for the anemic children.

The leader in Dimapur is attempting to send about 20 refugee children to school and has raised a substantial amount locally. The same situation exists for orphans in South India who hold all night prayer sessions for their schooling and supplies. Many schools are not "free" like they are here in the US, and tuitions are major concerns. Many times, travel is quite a distance and prohibitive. We are anxious to equip the students with notebooks and pencils in the building we helped purchase with the intent to start a basic school in an Assam teagarden with 500 families. Hopefully the building can be used to provide skills training like basket weaving, sewing, etc.

We have done extensive work to help displaced refugees and recent orphans in NE India, The Monsoons were especially bad this year which displaced wildlife and people alike. Many died from various causes like falling trees, etc. in addition to the disease that follows what are normally unsanitary conditions. A Huge dam was in danger of overflowing so the floodgates were opened wiping out 230 family homes in the flood plain.

We continue a wonderful ongoing relationship with a sympathetic well driller with a well drilling truck and a 100% record of hitting water in spite of often having to drill through rock. We just completed two wells and have continuing never ending requests, 3 deemed urgent. All of the wells in the past year have been at least partially funded by the villagers, (These 3 above raised 10-15%) More and more folks are honoring their loved ones. by dedicating a village borewell to them. Costs range from about \$95 for a pump for a hand dug well to about \$375 (less village contribution) for a machine drilled well.

We are exploring ways to again connect with the precious leper community I visited in South India. I miss them. They say to "come at Christmas time and bring presents"! Being with them is very humbling to realized how blessed we are. Even though leprosy in not active, the older folks lost and will never regain many body parts and their extended families who don't have leprosy are ostracized and must live in the leper compound with their extended families.

We have many sewing school graduates waiting for microloans. Even though the repaid loans fund new microloans, they don't begin to cover the demand. Traditionally, we have worked with single mothers from abusive backgrounds. However, we now have Men recovered from addictions and the instructor even went to school to learn to tailor men s clothes. I just had a request this morning from a 55-year-old man who has lived a life of crime and recently had his life miraculously changed. He went to school for three weeks to learn a trade to become legally and morally self-supporting in his new life. He like many others learned basket weaving and I saw a short video of him preparing raw materials to start the process. He has requested a micro loan to start his business. Microloan repayments vary and are often slow but over 90% are making arranged payment to be recycled into new loans..

Nagaland in NE India is a primarily Christian state among many hostile states. Leaders in the hostile states are crossing the border there to bring back Bibles and Book of John, but never enough to satisfy demand. Everyone wants" A big book (Bible)"!

The house church leader who was badly beaten is slowly recovering. What I thought was a little house church has 257 adult members that meet in the open field.! We are encouraging them to meet in small groups and have replaced some of the Bibles that were "taken as evidence" along with cell phone contacts.

Although I have mixed feelings about investing in costly buildings, there are many requests to build or complete partially built churches that want to meet together as a "progression from meeting in house churches". We have been granted land in over 30 villages to help build small churches, many where we have helped with borewells. I am hoping that if they are built that they will be multipurpose facilities to include schooling and occupational teaching., and even child guidance instruction and care. One church shell that Natalie and I visited still meets in the weather with no roof. They have raised \$639 and the additional \$729 to put everything under roof is a very slow process even for 13 villages jointly. Although I am inclined to favor small house gatherings, churches in India can be big. There is a Christian church (Calvary Temple) in Hyderabad with over 350,000 members that meets from 3 am till 11 PM with the same preacher preaching all services. (Unfortunately, I didn't know about it when I was in Hyderabad). Check it out on CBN or YouTube.

Although I won't be able to join on this trip, my past traveling partner to many places in India and Nepal will soon be traveling there again and I look forward to exciting updates from him. (Natalie and I are having lunch with him tomorrow to hear of his plans) I am anxious to hear if the "anticonversion" sentiment has cooled now that the elections are over. It was a hot issue like current immigration is in our elections.

These are a few updates which you may see repeated in a hopefully soon to be distributed newsletter. Natalie had a routine CT scan today and is slowly regaining her strength from a difficult year of chemo, surgery, radiation, and immunotherapy. I am being helped with the banking/QuickBooks accounting that she formally was able to do so faithfully and some other administrative things so you may see some changes in receipt formats, etc. as we transition to a new online form of QuickBooks and other administrative changes.

Thank you so much for your faithful prayers, encouragement, and compassionate giving. I hope as things get more back to normal to bring you more testimonies and updates on lives you are touching. We may be out of touch for much of September because we are finally able to do the "footsteps of Paul" tour through Turkey, Greece, and Italy that we actually met with an agent and planned two weeks before Natalie's cancer diagnosis.

May God continue to richly bless you and yours for making so much possible that I wouldn't have dreamed of when I ventured to India for the first time alone at the age of 60 many years ago.


