
Spiritual Formation: The Heart of Mission Preparation

Empowered Ministry in the Church

One early morning while taking a walk down memory lane in Sector 29 NOIDA, as I passed the imposing steeple of Christ Church NOIDA (CCN), which dwarfed the surroundings with an amazing aura and radiance, made me reflect on how our Church, the body of Christ, has been such a blessing to our family and to many others. I reminisced the Church activities from the time when NOIDA Authority allotted land for the construction of a Church nearly 35 years ago and realised how impactful the journey has been thus far. Col Lawrence Massey, our founder Pastor was given the task of establishing a Church at NOIDA and with his visionary zeal took on the challenge step by step. Through appeals for contributory donations a small prayer hall, which housed approximately 50 people was constructed and soon thereafter funds, donations poured in for the construction of the main Church building and later the parsonage, the parish hall etc.

The neighbourhood saw the building coming up and inquisitively many came to see the church and even attended the worship services and later testified on how they felt empowered and blessed. It is upon such reflections that I felt a sense of fulfilment in Church's commitment toward 'Empowering Ministry of the Church'.

After reaching home, while discussing my experience with my wife, Vineeta, I received a telephone call from a lady who introduced herself as Rebecca, a reporter for an inter-faith magazine and said "I want to write a story on the concept of 'Community empowerment'. Since I was associated with 'Corporate Social Responsibility', my obvious follow up thought was that she wanted some inputs for a story on the social sector. However, when she went on to say - "The reason for my call is to interview you on the topic "Empowered Ministry of the Church", surprised me. I sure was taken aback as it was only a while ago that I was reflecting upon this topic and immediately agreed to her request.

Rebecca:

With your experience in the social sector, what are your thoughts on the concept of 'Empowered Ministry in the church'?

Rajiv:

Empowerment is a process that encourages individuals to develop their potential fostering, a sense of ownership and responsibility and in this context - in the ministry of the Church. When we empower others we invest in their growth and development, enabling them to flourish and make a lasting impact on the church community. There are many examples given in the Bible which allude to this concept and I would like to particularly quote the Bible verse from Acts 1: 8, which promises believers will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon them. The verse emphasises that God empowers the Church to fulfil its mission through the Holy Spirit and in the instant reflection aligns with 'Church empowerment ministry'. There is a Central authoritative figure, which is inspirational and drives us to share our talents and strength with the Church community and that Central power is our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Growth – both physical and spiritual are important facets in the Church ministry, which are well practiced and visible in our Church. The story of the Church has been transformational since early days with worship services being conducted in the 13 family homes in 1988 to conducting worship services for 50 people in the prayer hall to accommodating nearly 500 congregants in our Church today. Hence the growth story in these past 38 years is but an example of varied opportunities of community empowerment, a subset of Church Ministry.

Empowered Ministry in the Church

Rebecca:

What do you mean by community empowerment in the Church as a Ministry?

Rajiv:

Space is a requirement to build and transform community and help in their overall growth and development. A community is a conglomeration of people and at CCN, efforts are made toward giving opportunities to people to grow spiritually and intellectually as effective members of a society. What does that transcend into – It transcends into opportunities around education, skill training, entrepreneurship development, health care and so on. especially for the marginalised sections of society. At CCN after a base line survey, which was carried out at a village near the Church and after assessing needs of the community, we established Learning Centres in and around the Church premise, with preference for admission given to children of rag pickers, house maids and others with limited resources. This by itself is indicative of the Ministry that the Church carries out in an inclusive and responsible way.

In addition to education, CCN as part of its community engagement and entrepreneurship development started another initiative on skill training, where young women from the marginalised sections of society were enrolled and a tailoring centre opened. At the Centre, the women learn basic tailoring skills and later encouraged to become entrepreneurs. As part of the Church's contribution toward circular economy and creating employment opportunities at the Centre, walk-in orders are given by ladies from the Church congregation and the Learning centre places orders for children uniforms etc. In addition, the Church places orders on the tailoring centre for utility bags and other items, which are put up for sale at the Church fete and other open markets. I position this as a great 'Outreach program' and as another activity under the mission of Church empowerment Ministry.

Rebecca:

Besides community empowerment, what examples do you have with regard to individual social responsibility being carried out by the Church, which could be included under 'Church Empowerment Ministry'?

Rajiv:

Appreciate your question with regard to Individual Social Responsibility (ISR). The Pastor with the help of Church elders and others keeps a watchful eye on individual talents and see how individual can be further encouraged to hone on their skills for the benefit of the larger Church community. One of the major reasons for such veneer is lack of opportunity and even knowingly or unknowingly individuals do not come forward to display their talents. Hence as part of the Ministry of Empowerment, I have seen how young talented children, once given an opportunity have excelled giving solo recitals, conducting workshops, givng talks in the Church and other platforms and so on. I also observed that children and young professionals once shy and inert, with encouragement have bloomed into confident young leaders.

I would like to share the change I saw in Mr. Jeewan, the son of one of our Church staff member. He was once a shy and a quiet boy but with timely encouragement by the Pastor and others, he has excelled both in studies and other extracurricular activities. Jeewan has done well in his studies having been admitted to an English medium school and took on challenging roles in youth mentorship. Today he plays the keyboard and drums and is an active participant at various individual and collective youth activities. He is confident and resilient with great organising acumen. Such joys are immeasurable and are visible to the Church as also to his parents, who quietly in their own way feel empowered. This is what I would say is true empowerment and one can give many such examples as part of our Church Empowerment Ministry.

My final question to you Brig Williams is what about the Spiritual part of the Church Empowerment Ministry? Can you give one such example, which will help in my understanding?

Rajiv:

Rebecca this question is an outcome driven question. Outcome of the Church Empowerment Ministry'. Here I will briefly share an example of yet another boy Pushpender, again son of our staff member, who has been groomed by the Pastor toward Church ministry. Coming from a family once not in faith of believers yet seeing the Church activities, joined the Church youth group and started participating in various programs. He was spotted by the Pastor and is now being groomed toward theological education. His commitment is truly wonderful and helps the Pastor in running various programs in the Church. He even assists the Pastor in conducting the Sunday Worship service and is encouraged to give sermons. Pushpender's speaking skills have improved significantly as he has become confident and seeks additional roles. An absolute example of how the Church Empowerment Ministry has been impactful in grooming the youth toward ministerial work.

I would have been happy in talking more on the topic but need to wind up due to time constraints. I thank you for the surprised interview and hope it will help you and others in understanding the concept of "Empowered Ministry of the Church".

Key points which can further improve our outlook and our involvement may be described as such:



It is not simply about propagating institutional religion or increasing membership numbers. The heart of Christian mission is best understood as loving service: embodying the kingdom values of justice, mercy, reconciliation and hope.

Being empowered for mission entails entering into the world's pain and brokenness, rather than retreating from it. The incarnational pattern of Christ challenges the Church to move from comfort to compassion, from self-preservation to 13 sacrificial love.

There's something about the church that once you understand how it works and your convictions are in the right place; ready helpers place themselves naturally in ways front of you. My ministry was always the choir and seeking God through song. This brings me to an anecdote about a singer, Payal Bedi. I had been singing first soprano in The Free Church, Parliament Street. Delhi, since childhood. Now as an adult, a new member came along, a not so young Punjabi she was 35 she told me later. She had been walking past the church and was attracted to the singing and decided to come and sit in the back pew and listen. After our practise when we were milling around having tea, she introduced herself to the director, Royall Maclaren and declared she would like to join the choir.

He immediately agreed and said it was a Monday evening commitment at 6.30.

Soon we became friends. Payal told me she had just left her job in computers and was looking for something else. I noticed she had a fantastic voice with a wide range and she had the added distinction of years of North Indian classical training behind her. after a while she asked me if I knew any voice trainer who could help her sing arias. I promptly gave her the number of Situ Singh Buehler, the sole opera trainer in Delhi. Payal was seated next to the tenors and made friends with Manu John, a south Indian singer. Knowing she was on the other side of thirty, I suggested she had a good bio-data and could always pick up a job when she needed it. It was now time to look for a life partner. This seems to have been the answer she was looking for. What was my surprise when soon she was riding pillion on Manu's mobile and got lifts home and then lifts to Bible study. Soon there was an engagement and wedding.

Needless to say, Situ took her in immediately as I knew she would and Payal dedicated herself to opera. In no time at all she was singing soprano solos from Handel and Bach. She was even awarded a three-month scholarship to Milan to study vocal techniques.

Manu proved very competent in giving technical support and did her recordings. He worked at computers for The British Council and had no grudges at supporting her training. "It's an investment for the future", he said. True enough, after a couple of years, Payal John became voice trainer at The Bangalore School of Music with Manu beside her as a tech whiz. Perhaps this was one of those cases of serendipity - to be at the right place at the right time. I couldn't help thinking of our Lord's words,' where two or three are gathered in my name, there will I be also'. Payal's father-in-law, an ENT specialist blessed the marriage and encouraged her singing.
