New! The Economics of Public Policy Issues

Economics plays a central role in shaping every aspect of society. This course examines a series of prominent policy issues with economics at their core. We will explore the origins of these issues, the underlying data and evidence, and the policy tools available to address them. 

New! Galileo: Lessons from a Great Scientist

Galileo Galilei, a towering figure in intellectual history, inspired plays, poems, and an opera. Albert Einstein called him "the father of modern physics." Astrophysicist Mario Livio explores Galileo's groundbreaking contributions to astronomy, mechanics, and the scientific method, while also examining his tragic conflict with the Catholic Church, which led to his condemnation by the Inquisition.

Mario Livio, author of Galileo and the Science Deniers, emphasizes Galileo's relevance for our world today. In particular, he clarifies the relationship between science and religion and explains why there is no schism between the humanities and the sciences. For Livio, Galileo's life serves as a potent reminder of the importance of freedom of thought, and though his richly intricate personality was grounded in late- Renaissance Italy, the impact of his enduring contributions to science and thought spans time and cultures.

New! Preserving Place: The History and Greenspace Legacy of Six Mile, SC

Wednesday, July 23; Thursday, July 31; and Wednesday, August 6 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Cheezem Education Center (Last session will be a Meet There excursion) Tuition: \$39

This course explores the rich history of the Town of Six Mile, South Carolina, and examines the critical importance of preserving both cultural heritage and greenspace in small towns. Participants will delve

into the town's actual and legendary past, while also engaging with modern conservation efforts that have shaped its present and future. Through realworld examples—such as the preservation of the historic bank building and the creation of the 63-acre Bryson Children's Nature Walk-students will learn about grassroots efforts that earned Six Mile two statewide achievement awards from the Municipal Association of South Carolina. Key topics include: the historical and legendary narratives of Six Mile; the preservation and adaptive reuse of the town's historic bank (featuring the original 1919 vault); the establishment and stewardship of the Bryson Children's Nature Walk; and conservation easements and sustainable forest management plans. Hands-on learning experiences will include a guided tour of the Town's History Room, the historic bank building, and the Bryson Nature Walk. Participants can also participate in a trail hike and cleanup. Once completed, the Children's Garden Area will offer participants a look at how local youth is educated about where their food comes from through hands-on gardening activities. This course encourages reflection on the lasting impact of preservation, highlighting the principle that once history and greenspace are lost, they are gone forever.

Mayor James Atkinson has served as Mayor of Six Mile since December 2023, following 12 years of service on the Town Council. With a strong background in finance, he also spent two years as a County Finance Director. Much of his professional career has been in banking, with a focus on Internal Audit, Risk, and Regulatory roles in both North and South Carolina. A graduate of Clemson University, Mayor Atkinson is deeply rooted in the Pickens County area. He owns a Century Farm in Six Mile that has been in his family for approximately 170 years, underscoring his longstanding connection to the land and community he now serves.

They also make several different medicinal mushroom extracts and medicinal mushroom honeys under the name Mycomatrix. Mushroom Mountain also runs a Wild Mushroom Food Safety Certification Program, accepted by Health Departments of seven states and counting and endorsed by the Food and Drug Administration.

New! "Fire!": The Real History of the Boston Massacre

By March 1770, Boston had endured nearly a year and a half of British military occupation, with rising tensions between soldiers and civilians. On March 5, the situation escalated when a sentry challenged a young apprentice over an unpaid bill, leading to a confrontation with townspeople. As more soldiers arrived, chaos ensued, and shots were fired, killing five men. The British called it an "unhappy disturbance," but Bostonians dubbed it the "Boston Massacre," sparking a fierce debate over its meaning.

Richard Bell, a professor of history at the University of Maryland, explores the Boston Massacre from its many sides. Drawing on the latest scholarship, he argues that the real history of the "affray on King Street" is far more fascinating than even Paul Revere's famous engraving of it has led us to believe.

New! Uncovering the Cheapside Hoard: Buried Treasures and Stories of the Past

Wednesday, August 6 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. **Cheezem Education Center** Tuition: \$19

Buried for nearly 400 years beneath London, the Cheapside Hoard was discovered by accident in 1912 during an excavation. This collection of nearly 500 jewels and precious objects, likely hidden during the 17th-century Great Fire or Civil Wars, reveals the wealth and influence of Tudor and Stuart England. Probably the stock of a goldsmith in Cheapside, the hoard showcases London's role as a global marketplace, with items from both the Old and New Worlds. It is the largest surviving collection from that era.

Tudor scholar and historian Carol Ann Lloyd-Stanger examines the story of this collection of luxury items and what they reveal about life in Renaissance England. She discusses the links between specific pieces of jewelry and similar items in well-known portraits and considers how the jewels, scent bottles, and salt cellars open a window into how royals and nobility in the 16th and 17th century used such items to communicate power. She also traces the double mystery of the collection's disappearance in the 17th century and the reasons this Aladdin's cave of treasures is still mostly unknown today.

New! Dying a Good Death - Care for the Body and Soul in the Hospice and Palliative Care Setting

New! Herb Preservation Basics

Freezing herbs, often in ice cube trays with water or oil, locks in their fresh taste and nutrients. Infusing herbs in oils, vinegars, or alcohol creates flavorful extracts for culinary and therapeutic uses. Proper storage in airtight containers away from light and moisture is crucial for maintaining quality. This workshop will explore these techniques, providing practical tips and hands-on experience.


