211: If you need to connect with resources in your community, but don't know where to look, PA 211 is a great place to start. Car Seat Clinics or Free or Reduced Cost Car Seats: Pennsylvania state law requires that children under age four ride in a federally approved car seat or booster that is appropriate for the child's age, height and weight. Children ages 4 to 8 must use a booster seat if they are no longer in a car seat. These resources can assist you in obtaining a car seat and/or help you to install your car seat properly. Early Intervention Program: Provides supports and services to infant/toddlers and young children with developmental delays and disabilities and their families/caregivers so that they may help the child grow and develop.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

- Eligibility: Pregnant and breastfeeding women, other new mothers up to one year postpartum, infants, children up to their sixth birthday, and elderly persons at least 60 years of age who meet income eligibility requirements.
- Services: Provides food packages that include infant formula and cereal, non-fat dry and evaporated milk, juice, oats, pasta, peanut butter, canned meat, tuna, or poultry, and canned fruits and vegetables.
