Haitian Handicaps R Us is raising funds for the financing of its project's goal of \$50,000,000.00 in order to purchase an additional 20 acres or more of land in Haiti, on which to erect 10 homes per 2 acres, a total of 10 new homes minimum to be built as single stories. Each story will be equipped with 4 bathrooms and showers in each corner. Each story will contain 38 beds in a 60x30 feet room. On each of the two acres of land there will be a recreation center (lunch room), a rehabilitation center (exercise Gym) and an emergency center (nursery). On each story there will be a water tank serving that particular story. These new pre-fabricated homes will be sufficient for now to house a maximum of 602 Haitian handicaps, with programs on site to help rehabilitate, feed and train them at least for the next three years, as the country is facing this impasse. We aim to help reconstruct and rehabilitate our country, and to take care of our lonely handicap and orphan brothers and sisters who are temporarily being cared for in the Dominican Republic, as well as those who are not being cared for

in Haiti and are so desperately in need of our help. We are a group of Haitian New Yorkers, professionals in different fields, among them, business, technology, legal, medical, religious, educational, and security. We are a nonprofit charitable corporation organized under the Corporation Laws of New York as a 501-C3 tax exempt corporation. Our TIN is 86-2863661. We are all concerned project leaders, operating under the Project titled: "Haitian Handicaps R Us."

We are determined and have determined that it is up to us as native Haitians living in the United States to devise a socially feasible project to help the less fortunate of us who are living this nightmare in Haiti, so we have decided to devise this Haitian Handicap R Us project to help in the reconstruction and rehabilitation of our country, in so doing we chose to initially take care of our lonely handicap and orphan brothers and sisters who are so desperately in need of our help.

#### **NEED ANALYSIS**

Among all the many pressing problems in Haiti, we have identified a very pressing need thereof, which requires our utmost attention. The January 12, 2010's "Earth Quake" has not only destroyed our Mother Land's Capital and some other major regions in the country, but has also created an un-precedent wave of handicaps and orphans, be it little boys, little girls, teenagers and adults, in the country. Among all of the unfortunate people who miraculously survived that terrible and that devastating earth quake in Haiti, those who lost their limbs in addition to the emotional distress and trauma that they suffer as a result of that catastrophic earthquake are more unfortunate and thus deserve our undivided attention.

Upon information and belief, there are about three hundred (300) or more of those less fortunate Haitian handicaps and orphans who are temporarily housed in a religious convent in the neighboring Dominican Republic awaiting to be sent back to Haiti where there is no place to accommodate and care for them. Furthermore, upon information and belief, there are also ten of hundreds if not thousands of people in the region of "Leôgane, Petit-Goave, Jacmel, Les Cayes and in the other devastated areas of Haiti who are in the same positions and situations as those handicaps and orphans in the Dominican Republic, in need of our help and assistance to improve their living, health and social conditions.

The problem now is to find a place or location or many places or locations to allow these handicap and orphan children to go back to school. Families cannot buy books, uniforms and pay the schools' tuitions. Schools' administrations will not be able to pay the teachers' salaries and keep the schools running. The Project will work to have schools open their doors and remain functional throughout the school year, despite the big setback caused by the devastating earth quake.
