

New Miami schedules hearing on application for HUD funds

NEW MIAMI—A second public hearing on the village's application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for federal Community Development funds will be Thursday at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers. Village administrator Cliff Brewer said New Miami officials plan to apply for about \$200,000 of the federal money.

"The purpose of this meeting shall be to discuss proposed activities by the village under the legislation of the housing assistance plan and to obtain comment and input from the citizens of New Miami and other interested parties pursuant to the preparation and filing of an application," he said.

"All citizens of New Miami are invited to attend and participate in this hearing. All interested parties shall be given an opportunity to speak to the issues."

Community Development funds, under federal guidelines, can be used for: acquisition of blighted or deteriorated property; acquisition, construction, rehabilitation or installation of certain public works; code enforcement; and interim assistance to relieve harmful conditions which call for immediate public action.

The funds also can be used for: disposition of property acquired under federal laws or for other public purposes; special projects designed to remove architectural barriers to elderly and handicapped persons; provision of certain public services; payment of the nonfederal share of certain federal projects; relocation payments for displaced persons and businesses; activities necessary to

New OSP unit speeds drunken driver testing

The Ohio State Highway Patrol is implementing a new blood alcohol breath-testing instrument, the intoxilyzer, in all state patrol installations in Ohio including the local post, Hamilton-Middletown Road.

The new piece of equipment will replace the present breath-testing instrument, the breathalyzer, according to Col. Adam G. Reiss, patrol superintendent.

Col. Reiss said the new equipment has been selected for use because it is uncomplicated, fast and inexpensive on a per test basis.

Sgt. Don Freshwater, Ohio State Patrol Post 9, Hamilton, said today troopers are being trained in the operation of the intoxilyzer which has been received at the post.

"We will put the new piece of equipment into operation once we are licensed to do so," Freshwater said.

"The intoxilyzer measures the blood alcohol concentration of a suspected drinking driver by a measurement technique called infrared absorption," Col. Reiss said.

"The instrument requires no chemicals to operate and permits officers to process drinking drivers at a great cost and time savings," Col. Reiss said.

"In 1976 the highway patrol made more than 27,000 driving while intoxicated arrests, thus the savings in time and money will be significant with the use of the intoxilyzer," Col. Reiss said.


Reiss said the instrument has been approved by the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Ohio Department of Health.
