Dear Fairfield Farms Neighbor,

At the request of a constituent, I attended a community meeting on Sunday Oct. 19 regarding setting up a Neighborhood Watch Program and to address some other issues in Fairfield Farms. It was very nice to see so many of my neighbors! (I lived on South Shore Drive until 2006). I just want to update you on my activities to date:

- I contacted Captain Hawkins at the Delaware State Police and he will make sure that there will be a Detective at your next meeting (Nov. 15, I believe) to help formalize and set up your Neighborhood Watch Program. I would really encourage you to participate in the Neighborhood Watch program it really works!
- I have asked Deldot to do a Speed Study of Fairfield Drive and Old Mill Road. This will take a few weeks as Deldot is backed up, but you should see the rubber "run over" tubes to gauge speeds sometime in next several weeks on both Fairfield and Old Mill.
- I have contacted Caesar Rodney School District about speeding of school buses in Fairfield Farms.
- I have contacted Kent County (I should receive a return call shortly) about setting up a "Lighting District" in Fairfield Farms. You should be receiving a letter either from my office or the County (or both) in the next few weeks on this process (it is a ballot process the community must vote to create and participate in a Lighting District). I can obtain the funding to install any lights, but the community would be responsible for the electric bills they are pretty nominal only a few dollars a month per house usually.
- I have contacted Deldot about the drainage issue on the two drains at 93 Fairfield Drive and I should hear back from them shortly.

I am confident that with a Neighborhood Watch Program and a Lighting District, we can dramatically reduce the opportunities for crime and improve public safety and traffic safety in Fairfield Farms.

Please don't hesitate to call me if I can help you in anyway.

Fairfield Farms has a New Crime Watch

Fairfield Farms has held two crime watch meetings this Fall. October 19th, the First Crime Watch meeting was called in Gail Buckler's yard to discuss concerns that neighbors about street lights, speeders, crime and insufficient water drainage. Colin Bonini also attended this meeting. He stated that he would assess the options that we had available to us regarding these matters and would update us at a later date. In the interim it was suggested that we keep our Outside lights on throughout the night and possibly purchase motion detector lights and form a Neighborhood Crime Watch. Several of the neighbors rallied together and a Crime Watch was formed in time for the Holloween Weekend, With everyone's help there were no major problems reported that weekend.

The second meeting was held Nov. 15th at Camden Harvest Years Senior Center. Cpl.

Manear from DE State Police informed those attended about the roles and responsibilities of individuals involved with the Crime Watch. He suggested that we get to know our neighbors and ask them to pick up our mail & newspapers when away, lock our car doors in the driveway, not park in the street if possible, and closing our garage doors will deter individuals from criminal opportunities. All homes have their house numbers posted. It was decided to proceed with organizational efforts even though a small percentage people from Fairfield Farms attended this meeting. Elections were the next order of business.

Within the next couple of weeks each Block Captain. will introduce themselves to the home owners in their area and spread the word about the Crime Watch efforts and help build a sense of community.

Block Captains should not be pushy, but let everyone know what steps can be taken to help our community increase safety and security as a whole and what steps individual can take to protect themselves and their property.

Block Captain's area of responsibility is by helping each other monitor unusual behavior and making our presence known to outsiders which will be determined by the homeowners in

determined by the homeowners in that respective area. It is hoped that the variety of approaches and the randomness of our efforts will provide the coverage needed by the neighborhood as a whole.

The secretary will put together a package to be distributed via email as well as hard copy to the block captains. It was felt by those in attendance that this would help ensure the success of our efforts.

The package will include:

- A spread sheet with the history of criminal acts, date and time, address of incident, what was taken, and how entry was gained.
 - A publication listing the responsibilities of the block captains
- List of all homeowner addresses and associated phone numbers to the Block

Captain's area of responsibility (since this information is in the public domain it was not felt to be a violation of privacy)

- A drawing was held on Nov. 15
 to help raise money to defer
 expenses. Chris Moore won the
 drawing but graciously donated
 the winnings to the association.
 The treasurer will account for the
 money collected in the drawing
 along with the expenses in a
 separate document.
- Any other material felt to be of interest in our crime watch activities. Bob Mathers will meet with Gail Buckler and Roger Hollopeter to assemble

Hollopeter to assemble information they previously obtained from the Delaware State Police County- Wide Crime Watch Group (D.S.P.C.W.G.) that meets once a month at the Kent County Emergency Preparedness Center across the street from Winner Ford.

It was felt that two members of the Fairfield Farms Crime Watch should attend the monthly meetings of the D.S.P.C.W.G. to obtain information that will assist us in our efforts. It need not be the same two people each month. Sharing these types of types of responsibilities will keep us from over burdening any one person. Shortly after the D.S.P.C.W.G.

meeting the block captains will meet at one of our homes to share the information from the state police and report on any unusual activities in the neighborhood.

communication – Any unusual activity should be called into the police immediately by anyone observing the activity. Try to get license plate numbers, descriptions of vehicles and individuals that will help the police. Letting the Block Captain also know about the call will help the neighborhood stay on top of developing trends.

I want to Thank You for electing me as the Fairfield Farms Crime Watch President, I know that we will all have to work together with our Block Captains to make this neighborhood is safe once again. I personally want to thank everyone that continues to leave their front lights on, makes sure their garage doors are closed, and keeps their eyes open. I hope each of you will contact your Block Captain with information about any suspicious behavior.

We have lots of news to report:

On May 12, 2009 The Levy Court met to discuss the Street Lights for Fairfield Farms, South Shore Drive, and Candlewick Drive, the light have been passed! So hopefully in the next couple of months we will start seeing them installed. Thank you to those who helped get this passed.

This past week we have seen a lot of new criminal activity around the Moores Lake Area. They seem to be targeting not only inside our homes and garages, but now also our cars that are parked outside. We would like to ask you to please keep your eyes and ears open and make sure that your doors and windows are locked, please put your garage doors down, and turn on your outside lights. May we also suggest that you remove all valuable items out of your cars and take your garage door openers inside the house with you, check your back doors, basement entrance and if you have a sliding door please install a bar or put a dowel in the tack. Unfortunately, only a very few of these crimes were reported. The Police will not accept someone else reporting a crime for you. So if something does happen please contact the Police 911 and then your street captain. It is your community obligation to report all crimes.

We have also had some drag racing around our neighborhood. We are asking if you can safely get a license plate number or vehicle description that would be very helpful for the Police as well as the Crime Watch Team to possibly be able to pinpoint who is doing this. On Sunday Afternoon, May 17th there was also a hit and run car accident on Old Mill Road.

Since we have had another large number of crimes in the area the Street Captains and Officers will be out patrolling the area more frequently in our vest. If you have a vest please wear it when you are out, we have a few extra vest available if you would like to wear one. Your help with this matter is NEEDED and GREATLY APPRICIATIED!

Homeowner Safety for Halloween

List below are tips for homeowners to prevent injury on Halloween:

- Make sure walkways to the front door are safe with no broken or uneven stepping stones
- Clear walkways and steps of any clutter that could cause someone to trip
- Repair loose railings on outdoor steps to prevent an accidental fall
- To make dark walkways safer all year long, illuminate with solar powered lights
- Keep Halloween decorations away from walkways
- Don't leave burning candles unattended indoors or outside in jack-o-lanterns, for example
- A pumpkin that accidentally gets knocked over could ignite a costume or even dry leaves on the ground
 - Try illuminating with small flashlights instead
- Clean the yard of debris, branches, yard tools, toys, or anything that could cause someone to trip
- Move small potted plants, water hoses, and yard decor that might present a safety hazard
- Make sure the porch light is working

- Plan to secure pets indoors or away from kids trick-or-treating
- Some animals may become frightened by the noise and costumes
- Causing them to bite or bolt through an opened door
- Trim hedges where the driveway meets the sidewalk so that anyone passing by can easily be seen
- Don't feel you have to answer the door after the typical trick-or-treater rush is over
- o Many people open their doors freely on Halloween because they expect to see trick or treaters

- Once the rush dies down, you may want to turn off your outside light to indicate you're done answering the door for the night
- Do not allow any child or adult to come into your home!

13 Things a Burglar Won't Tell You

- 1. Of course I look familiar. I was here just last week cleaning your carpets, painting your shutters, or delivering your new refrigerator.
- 2. Hey, thanks for letting me use the bathroom when I was working in your yard last week. While I was in there, I unlatched the back window to make my return a little easier.
- 3. Love those flowers. That tells me you have taste ... and taste means there are nice things inside. Those yard toys your kids leave out always make me wonder what type of gaming system they have.
- 4. Yes, I really do look for newspapers piled up on the driveway. And I might leave a pizza flyer in your front door to see how long it takes you to remove it.



I just wanted to give you an update on the lighting district.

As you probably already know, your neighborhood has approved a lighting district. (The lighting district required a 65% approval from the property owners and it received that and more.)

I am very pleased the districts have been approved and thankful to the volunteers who pushed the districts as I really believe the lights will provide a deterrent to crime and also increase vehicular and pedestrian safety.

I also wanted to let you know that if you are concerned about the proposed placement of a light near your home, we have significant flexibility as to the placement of individual lights. My understanding is that a light may be moved up to several feet in order to accommodate home owners. Before the lights are installed, if you have any concerns about a proposed light – please call Craig Harvey at Kent County. His number is 744-2421. Please note, once a light is installed, the cost of moving it to another location would be covered by the requesting person, not the county.

Again, thank you for the honor of being your State Senator and please don't hesitate to contact me if I can help you in any way.

Neighborhood Alert System- phone, text, e-mail

There is still siphoning of gasoline going on in the county, so please watch for any suspicious activity like this in our neighborhood.

Jury Duty Scam

If anyone calls concerning jury duty and says they are calling from the Federal Jury Judicial Court and saying they have not heard from you and that they need your phone number, Social Security Number, this is a scam! Never give out your SS number in these cases! The police reported to Roger Hollopeter that this is occurring around the county.
