Dual Enrollment

Dual Enrollment began at Hancock County High School more than a decade ago. This year, more students are enrolled than ever before.

Dual **Enrollment** partnership program between HCHS and local colleges or universities provide to students with the opportunity to earn college credit while they are still in high school. Students have the opportunity to complete more than a semester of college classes while still in school; however, some students have an associates completed degree through their dual enrollment credits.

According to Ms. Deb Gibson, school counselor, student enrollment in such programs is up significantly with 50% more students taking dual enrollment as compared to previous years. All together, there are 33 students taking 44 different courses through the program.

Earning college credit is not the only benefit to taking these courses. Students who take a certain number of courses are entitled to graduate with Distinction.

On this topic, Ms. Kasey Fugate added, "The updated grading scale will be beneficial because it gives students more opportunities for academic achievement, and preparing them for college."



"I've spent six years trying to learn how to do it," Lambert stated.


There is no doubt that sort of self discipline is a rarity and a true gem itself.

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Local Elections by Tara Ferguson

In the recent election in Hancock County on August 4, 2022, there were many positions to run for.

For County Commissioner there were 2 positions, District 1 Seat B and District 7 Seat B. For District 1 Cruz Cope and Tommy Ray Jones ran for that. Cruz Cope won with 64% and Tommy Ray Jones lost with 36% and 138 total votes.

For District 7 Jack Johnson and Whitney Fleenor ran for it. Jack Johnson won by 54% and Whitney Fleenor lost by 46% with 304 total votes.

For School Board District 5 there was one position. David Jones won by 62% and William Pat Riley lost by 38% with 228 total votes.

For the Constable District 6 Brent Allen Hickey and Caleb Wolfe ran for that. Brant Allen Hickey won by 60% and Caleb Wolfe lost at 40% with 131 total votes.

After talking to a few people in the school building, some said a lot of the polls were very close. Some said there was a lot of drama and I was told who ran and won.

Madeline Dalton, junior at Hancock County High School, was invested in the elections this year.

"It was a good one this year," Dalton explained.

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World News: Mar-A-Lago by Tatum Ailey

On Monday, August 8, Mar-A-Lago, the private club and residency of former president Donald Trump in Palm Beach, Florida, was raided by the FBI. The FBI collected more than 11 sets of boxes of documents.

While the contents of the documents are unknown, but all were included in each form of document classification: confidential, secret, and then top secret. Some were also labeled TS/CI, which means top secret and/or sensitive compartment information.

Although they sought to get all documents, the main targets were documents that the Justice Department were afraid Trump might weaponize.

This isn't the first time the government collected documents from Trump: over the last 18 months Trump and the National Archives have been going back and forth getting back documents that Trump took with him when he left office.

The FBI was also sent an anonymous tip that Trump was hiding classified documents that he didn't intend to return at the private club. The whistleblower was most likely to be a former employee of the former president. Many Trump administration members believe it was Jared Kushner, Trump's Chief Advisor while in office.

"This just confirms that no one is above the law, even at the highest level," says Ms. Autumn Collins, Government and English teacher.
