## AUDITION MONOLOGUES

## EVENT RULES

Auditions must consist of TWO contrasting monologues from published plays, both presented as part of the same audition. Each monologue should last 45 to 60 seconds, and must be from plays, not monologue books or internet-only sources. Each selection must contain one character only. The selections must be memorized. Auditionees must present one "slate" to start the audition at which time the timing is started. The "slate" consists ONLY of the students first and last name. Auditionees do NOT state titles or authors. Make-up, costume, hand props and special lighting/sound effects are not permitted. The contestant may use one chair only. No restrictions on movement within the stage area.

TIME LIMIT: 2-3 minutes including slate.
