Often in my house, the air conditioner is running. Whether I'm resting in my bed, or working in my office. Whether I'm at the dining room table enjoying a meal, or sitting on the couch in the living room, I hear it run. Most of the time, the breeze feels great, except when it doesn't. Sometimes a chill will set in, even when it's warm inside, and I have to get a blanket to keep myself warm. So why do I have it on all the time, well, it's not for me. It's for others who come into the house, who say they're hot. Lately, I've kept my air conditioner fan on, instead of auto, and while the chill may sometimes surprise me, the warmth of why it's on makes me smile, knowing even if I'm chilled a bit, others are warmed by the love it represents.

And so my friends as the cold months begin, as fall deepens for us, so can we feel a warmth even in the cold? Can we feel the sun, warming our faces, and Jesus warming our hearts? Can we feel the freshness of the air, even if we might shiver just a bit? And as we think of being the church, can we feel the warmth of one another, and the warmth of the spirit, as we continue to wrestle with the cold realities of our budget and potential diminishing membership?

Jesus, I have to think, felt the coldness of a room when he knew people were against him. He felt it when they didn't really believe. And I'm sure he felt it as people were cursing and mocking him. And he clearly must have felt it in Pilates' hall, standing there alone. But Jesus still warmed rooms, hearts, places, times, people. Jesus never allowed the cold of a moment, of people, or of decisions to override the warmth of God's love.

And so friends as we fall into the norms of the cold seasons, may we rise with the warmth of Jesus in our hearts, in our lives, in our families, in the very place in which we rest. As the cold rushes by, as we experience the blowing wind, or even the pelting of rain, may we be warmed knowing God loves us and all people. May we be warmth to those looking for shelter from the storm of whatever cold they may find themselves in. After all, when Jesus said, come to me all you who are weary, and I will give you rest, was there any more words of warmth than that ever spoken? May we embody the world's warmth, even if it may seem colder than ever. After all, in the world and the church we live in, the warmth never stops!

Look at the nations and see!

“Look at the nations and see! Be astonished! Be astounded! For a work is being done in your days that you would not believe if you were told.” – Habakkuk 1:5

What comes to mind when you think about Church of the Brethren missions and missionaries? What sort of work have we done together? Do you know how we have an impact around the world?

Reading documents in the archives, it is easy to see the tension between evangelism and service in Brethren missions of the past, but the two goals were never really at odds. Brethren missionaries went to serve God and to care for people, not to earn their way into heaven or score points with God. They preached the Gospel and lived it. Frank Crumpacker walked from village to village preaching. Howard Sollenberger collected supplies and medicine for people suffering from poverty and war. They built churches, hospitals, schools, and even a major road. Seventy years after the last missionary left, people still remember. Loving God and neighbor matters. Making disciples takes time. We baptize people into a church to join with us as members of the body of Christ. We may fall short, but we are not doing it just for show. We may not always see the results of our work, but we know if we are faithful God will bring a good harvest.

Working in Global Missions, I hear variations on this theme: we know Jesus cares because you care. You gave us a cup of water when we were thirsty. You stayed with us. Our global Church of the Brethren family is strongly evangelical. They love to share the gospel and plant churches. They also reach out to the downtrodden in their own communities.

In Rwanda they worship side-by-side with the often-overlooked Btwa people and partner with them in farming. In Venezuela, they take boats up the river into the jungle to worship with indigenous sisters and brothers. In the Dominican Republic, the neighborhood churches reach out to the sick, elderly, and poor who live nearby. In South Sudan, after our country director Athanasus Ungang was wrongly imprisoned, he started a prison ministry that continues after his release and exoneration.

To be clear, we have not been perfect. We are a small church that offers Jesus, what we have, and our friendship. I have seen what impact our small church has made through our faithfulness, in communities that remember our love decades later. We may sometimes feel pressure to do more, to close a deal of faith today, but ultimately we aim to build churches on strong foundations that will endure and glorify God. May we continue to share the love of Jesus with all people and be willing to accept the gifts they share in return.
