The goal of the survey is to capture how adults with disabilities perceive their self-determination. Self-determination aligns with promoting full inclusion of people with disabilities into the mainstream of society as productive members.

A Service Coordinator must have superb communication skills. When I say this, I mean the ability to communicate across age, gender and economic lines all at the same time. Their audience in any given meeting can be as diverse as a Sunday morning church service and equally as judgmental. They must leave each meeting with collective agreement that will carry through to the following year's planning meeting and must represent this in writing so it can go through the funding process (known as Utilization and Review).

A Service Coordinator must have excellent organizational skills. The amount of information that passes through a Service Coordinator daily is more than the average person handles in a week. There is no single day that was like the day before and always a caveat to the issues they are working on that make it a challenge. The training and acclimation process can be up to four years and even then, the job changes so quickly that it's still challenging.

A Service Coordinator must be able to plan, predict and have a vision for what will be coming beyond what others in the room are thinking about. Without this gift, the hopes, wants, and dreams of those we serve are likely to be lost in the shuffle of annual planning and endless paperwork. This gift is rare and not easily developed but when achieved is beneficial to those we serve in a meaningful way.

It's not good enough to be a people person to be a Service Coordinator at MPower. We require something more. We have a hiring process that seeks out and finds individuals that have a healthy cross section of skills, gifts and abilities not usually found in other vocations. I can honestly say that I admire each and every employee within our little organization. Each of them passed special testing and processes in order to find them.
