March is National Developmental Disability Month. The CDC defines developmental disabilities as "a group of conditions due to an impairment in physical, learning, language, or behavior areas. These conditions begin during the developmental period and can impact day-to-day functioning, this usually lasts throughout a person's lifetime."

Developmental Disabilities, like many disabilities, do not stop an individual from being able to live a fulfilling and joyful life. What can stop these individuals are the barriers that people create. It is important for us as a community to work together to break down barriers that people with disabilities face on a daily basis.

The first step to breaking down these barriers is simply being aware that they exist. Be a part of community awareness in your community by:

- Educating Yourself: Learn about disabilities, and their challenges. Understanding breaks down misconceptions and stereotypes.
- 2. Promoting Accessibility: Advocate to your local business and government for accessible buildings and transportation for all.

- Encouraging Inclusion: Support activities in your community that are inclusive. This can include sports teams, art programs and social events.
- 4. Be an Ally: Stand up, Speak up against discrimination when you see it.
- 5. Volunteer: Be that person. Get Involved.
- 6. Be Mindful of Language: Remember ears are always listening and learning. Use respectful and inclusive language.

Robin and Kenny are living in a way that is comfortable for them. Twin Oaks supports them as they go shopping and out to eat once a week, to go to church on Sundays, to go and see their mom and their brothers when they desire to do so.

At home Kenny and Robin keep up their own home. Robin often cooks and they both do things such as wash dishes, do laundry, and clean the house. Robin mows and trims his own yard throughout the grass growing season. They also like to watch Royals and Chiefs games religiously. After exploring funding options for Cole's Cubby Bed, I was able to secure the full \$14,000 to cover the cost of the bed and installation. Witnessing the palpable relief and happiness within Cole's family stands out as a remarkable success to me in my journey as a Service Coordinator. This experience has also reinforced the importance of advocacy and compassionate assistance, motivating me to continue navigating the complexities of service coordination with dedication and empathy, driven by the profound impact such support from
