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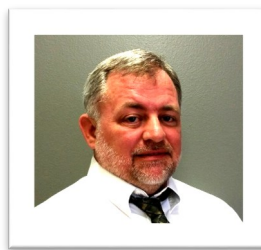

right the first time and setting policy that supports the employees are critical in setting a culture that produces the highest quality outcomes for in all areas of interest.

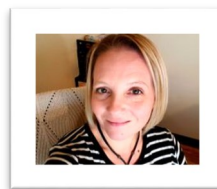

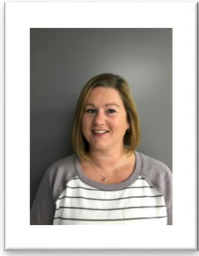

materials that allow users to learn more about their health at their own pace. For example, learn how to identify the signs of stress, dehydration, common dental problems, and much more.

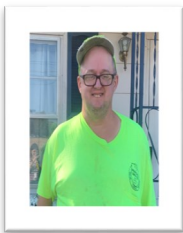
The goal of MyHealth is to equip athletes and other people with intellectual disabilities with the educational resources to not

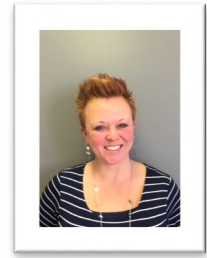
FROM THE DESK OF ERICA RENNISON

If you’ve been working at the Pettis County office for any amount of time at all, you’ve heard of Miss Briseida Pineda. She has become very popular among us, as we have all been working to find support for her for about a year now. You may have heard her name in passing, but I would like to introduce her to you all, as she has become one of my favorite humans this past year.

Briseida is a 16-year-old young lady that lives with her mother in Sedalia. Briseida has beautiful curly hair, and the longest eyelashes I’ve ever seen. She loves being tickled by her mom, and listening to her whistle! She has been diagnosed with Q99.9 Chromosomal abnormality

(unspecified), quad cerebral palsy/GMFCS 5, Spasticity, Dystonia, Hip Subluxation, Scoliosis, Torticollis, Asthma, Tetrasomy 9p, GERD, Dysphagia, Epilepsy, just to name a few. Briseida is eligible for State Plan nursing, but due to the current nursing shortage, she has been left with only one nurse. Briseida’s mom has been doing her absolute best to care for her, while maintaining a full-time job.

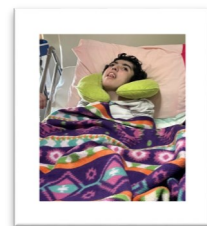
Because Briseida is only 16, she does not qualify for waiver funding for placement. After a years’ worth of research, and work, Children’s Division decided to step-in to help!

Because they have stepped in, Briseida will finally receive the

funding she needs to be placed in a Restoring Hope Host Home! The home is excited to have her, and mom is happy she will still be such a major part of Briseida’s life.

Though this new placement, means Briseida will have a new service coordinator, I am so happy to have met this sweet young lady, and her wonderful family, and was able to see her finally placed where she will receive the services she needs to thrive!
