

May is National Military Appreciation Month. The month-long observance is dedicated to active duty service members along with military retirees and veterans. While we should be showing our support and appreciation year-round, it's important that we acknowledge this special event and demonstrate appreciation and support towards members of the military.

Military Appreciation Month was established in the late-20th century by the late-Senator John McCain to acknowledge the tremendous service and sacrifices of our troops and their families. The U.S. Congress designated May as National Military Appreciation Month in 1999 and the first observance occurred in May, 2020. It's crucial to recognize troops – past and present – for their duty to the country.

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. President Lyndon Johnson officially declared Waterloo N.Y. the birthplace of Memorial Day.

Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War (which ended in 1865) and a desire to honor our dead. On the 5th of May in 1868, General John Logan who was the national commander of the Grand Army of the republic, officially proclaimed it in his General Order Number II.

Part of the history of Memorial Day meaning will show that in the Order, the General proclaimed, "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land." Because the day wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle, the General called it the date of Decoration Day.

New York was the first state to officially recognize the holiday in 1873. It was recognized by all northern states by 1890. Differently, the South refused to acknowledge the day and honored their dead on separate days. This went on until after World War I when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war.

With the Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971, it is now observed on the last Monday in May by almost every state.
