"I'm an old homeless Jew barely hanging on. This morning, we had group bring breakfast to the Crossroads Mission. They not only brought breakfast out to the homeless shelter, but cooked it, and served it. Served it.

Like take a seat, let me bring you some milk and juice. They looked you in the eyes, as they delivered your food to you. They looked at you. Like a real person, looking at another real person. Would you like some more Sir? Can I take your plate Sir?

The girl who looked after me was named Rose. I have never seen



her selflessness and giving energy humbled me, it made me look at my own hands, wish I had shaved and worn a suit or at least a jacket, and question my own worthiness.


I'm an old man. I'm tired. My health is bad. My heart is jaded. My health won't improve, I can't imagine my heart getting better either. This soul of selflessness, servitude, innocence, beauty, and dare I say Holiness - It broke me.

I am a man who hasn't cared enough to even tend to my most basic needs in several years, a man who hasn't allowed anyone to have contact with me that I couldn't walk away from without looking back, a man who prides himself on his attitude of indifference; I almost wept like a baby, as this angel served me eggs, pancakes, ham, and orange juice.

# Migueli From Darkin

Miguel Burciaga was introduced to an environment influenced by gang culture at a young age. This led to him partake in the use of mehtamphetamine, which became his drug of choice for over two decades. What started as experimentation, quickly spiraled into a debilitating dependence, leading to a lifestyle centered around crime and addiction.

Without ever holding a steady job, Miguel turned to crime to support his addiction. He stole from homes, traded whatever he could find for drugs, and spent his days and nights wandering the streets. His world became smaller as his addiction tightened its grip. Family gatherings became a thing of the past, and relationships with loved ones faded in favor of his current environment.

"We were like vampires, hiding in sheds, laundry rooms, and backrooms—anywhere we could be away from the light."

Despite his destructive lifestyle, Miguel had moments of clarity where he recognized the pain, he was causing himself and those around him. He wanted to change, especially for his son, but addiction had a hold on him that he couldn't break. His

mother's tears, his faith in God, and his love for his family were not enough to stop his dependance on drugs.

His addiction and lifestyle led to multiple run-ins with the law, which had him spending all his twenties in prison.

Probation violations, failed drug tests, and weekend stints in jail became routine. He tried to outsmart the system, faking urine analyses, just to buy himself another day of freedom.

Then came what Miguel refers to as "the gift of desperation." He had finally reached a point where he couldn't continue living the way he was. His attempts to beat drug tests no longer worked, and the realization that he was trapped in an endless cycle pushed him to take a different path.

Instead of running from his problems, he faced them headon. He admitted to his probation officer that he had a problem he couldn't control. In doing so, he took his first step towards real change. That moment of honesty led him to Crossroads Mission, where his life took a dramatic turn.

At Crossroads Mission, Miguel entered the New Life Program, our intensive recovery program designed to help individuals overcome addiction and rebuild their lives. It was there that he was introduced to the 12-Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, a program that would change his entire perspective on addiction.

The staff at Crossroads
Mission helped him realize
that addiction wasn't just about
willpower—it was a disease that
required treatment and long-term
commitment. With the guidance of

counselors and mentors, he began to understand the patterns that had kept him trapped for so long.

A major turning point came when he worked through Step Four and Step Five—conducting a deep, fearless self-inventory and sharing his past with another person. This process forced him to confront painful memories and long-buried guilt. For the first time, he openly acknowledged the things he had done and the pain he had caused.

"As a man, I never wanted to share the things that hurt me, but when I did I felt relieved of them."

The structured environment at Crossroads Mission provided him with the discipline and support he needed to stay on the right path. He committed to meetings, worked closely with a sponsor, and embraced a lifestyle of service and accountability.

Today, he is sober, working,

and actively involved in his community, and even returned to his home church after many years. His relationships with his family have been restored, and he maintains regular contact with his siblings across the country.

Miguel now dedicates his time to helping others who are at the same crossroads he once faced. Through his church, he is part of a movement dedicated to serving others, ensuring they can come back into the light, just like he did.

Whether through mentorship, sharing his story, or simply offering a helping hand, he is committed to being of service to others. For those struggling with addiction, Miguel's message is clear: Change is possible, but you must be willing to do whatever it takes.

"You need to get away from your environment, no matter what it is. You need to have the willingness to change."

Thanks to Crossroads Mission, Miguel is no longer living a life of crime and addiction. Instead, he is a productive, faith-driven member of his community. He is proof that no matter how far someone has fallen, there is always a way back.
