Celebrating Children in April

April is Child Abuse Awareness Month, and to honor this important cause, Crossroads Mission partnered with The Healing Journey to host a special community event on April 25th, 2025. The day was filled with delicious food, lively music, fun games, and prizes while sharing valuable information and support. Crossroads Mission staff, along with other community agencies, served meals, led games, handed out prizes, and distributed important health & safety resources for community members on how to keep children safe.

Meet the Chairman - Marce

Marce Achen is the chairman at Crossroads Mission, currently on his second term. However, there is more to him than meets the eye. He grew up in construction, always working with tools and building things with his hands. He continues to construct and build with a higher purpose for the community and others, such as going down to Mexico to build houses for those in need every year with his family. He recounts not always knowing God earlier in his life, but after facing harsh times, Marce was able to find his faith and change his life. Now being sober for over 25 years, he uses his experience to help others as chairman, serving with empathy and understanding.

"I come from the trenches, and I come from where I serve."

Despite his dedication, he didn't initially plan on joining the board of directors. A friend from church asked him to join. Even though he didn't know much about being a member of the board, he decided to try. He recalls doing poorly on his first year but decided to give it another chance and after some time, another member of the board approached him with the offer of being a chairman. In that moment, he believed it was God calling him to serve in a bigger way.

At Crossroads Mission, Marce is moved by seeing people helping others. That's what he loves the most. He says many people who come to the Mission at the end of the day are broken and struggling, just like he once was. He sees the Mission as something unique and out of the norm, not only being a place of healing and second chances physically, but also spiritually.

"I see in the Mission a place that is willing to step out of the norm. So willing to serve the downtrodden... it really speaks to my heart. It always has, because that's where I come from."

Marce tells us more about his personal life and his involvement in the community, working for the Yuma County Water Users and running a hydroelectric power plant. He lives in Winterhaven, California with his wife and kids. Aside from working for the city, he also runs a home inspection business and helps coach softball at his kids' school. Even with a busy life, he stays committed to helping Crossroads Mission grow.

Right now, he has the vision of Crossroads Mission being able to build the Center of Hope, a bigger and better men's shelter. It will not only provide a place to sleep, but also help people take steps towards a better life. He believes that most times homelessness is often caused by addiction or mental health issues, not laziness.

"Homeless, not homeless, doesn't matter. I mean, we all have that crossroads at one point or another"

The most important part of the Mission, to Marce, is sharing God's love. When people feel loved and cared for, they are more open to learning about Jesus and

transformation. For him, that's what makes Crossroads so special.

Marce understands that the topics of addiction and homelessness are uncomfortable, they are ugly and easier to ignore than to confront head on, but he encourages those that are fearful or scared of it to visit Crossroads Mission and see the good work being done.

Veronica: A Journey

Veronica Baumgarner began her struggles with substance abuse at an early age.

She began drinking alcohol at the age of 13, an addiction that would follow her for 15 years into her late 20s. She looked for anything she could get her hands on, both drugs and alcohol, just to feel numb and escape her own body. The environment

surrounding her before her healing journey was one of substance abuse and struggle. She was stuck in a toxic relationship with her firstborn son's father, both encouraging the other into using drugs and drinking together.

Veronica would go to work only for the chance to get drunk or high, barely able to pay her bills and feeling like a failure to her son as more and more of her money was lost to addiction.

She remembers her life hitting rock bottom at the moment her mother took drastic action to protect her grandson. She took him away from her. Devastated, Veronica began to spiral further. She stopped going to work and began squatting in her apartment after being unable to pay rent. She only stayed alive to drink and use the same substances that had taken everything away from her.

Even in such a situation, Veronica's mom hadn't given up on her yet. That same year, she brought her back to Yuma and placed her into the care of Crossroads Mission's First Step detox center. It had been tough, more painful than she ever

imagined. Her diet consisted of Tootsie Rolls and water, as she couldn't keep anything else down. She now looks back on her time in First Step with gratitude for the pain she endured to free herself from the addiction.

"I never want to forget the pain of what it is to be withdrawing from something that I've been so dependent on for so many years."

After finishing detox, Veronica entered the New Life Program to continue her recovery. At first, she didn't want to stay, but her mother was clear: if she didn't recover, she wouldn't get her son back. It gave her the strength to stay and complete the 120-day recovery program.

It was not easy. She faced emotional battles and struggled through the recovery steps, but it paid off. She was able to be vulnerable about her struggles to others, consistently went to AA meetings, and worked hard

to rebuild her life. Little by little, she started to heal. She found friendship, structure, and most importantly, a reconnection to her spirituality.

Veronica had struggled with her faith and religion. She grew up Catholic, but turned away after witnessing things that deeply hurt her. As she got older and her addiction grew, she replaced God with drugs and alcohol. When learning that Crossroads Mission was a Christian-based organization, she resisted. Crossroads Mission reintroduced her to God's love through daily devotions and Celebrate Recovery. Her heart began to soften. By the time she graduated from the program, she had reconnected with God and began building her relationship with faith from there.

"The Mission really set the groundwork for my spirituality."

Veronica's story didn't end with recovery, it began there. After

graduating from the program, she began working at Nazcare and helped others as peer support. She moved in with her mother and regained custody of her son, later having her own apartment and eventually getting married to her husband Beau. She recounts it as a sweet story, as she had met her husband in the New Life Program and started dating after graduating.

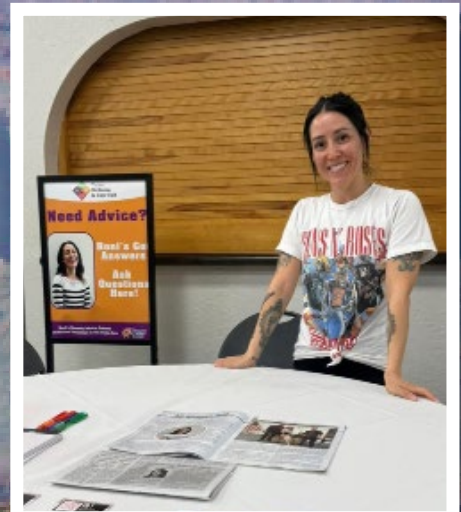
Today Veronica and her husband have been married for 7 years and have two more beautiful children together, children who have never seen their parents drunk or high. Her firstborn also has a loving relationship with his stepfather. Together, they teach their children about God, guiding them with spiritual values. Even though she struggled in faith, Veronica chose to raise her children with grace, patience, and a deeper understanding of love in spirituality.

As of June 2025, Veronica is celebrating 11 years of sobriety. She's been a stay-at-home mom for 7 years, but that hasn't stopped

her from helping others. She's started a newfound career as a relationship coach and writes a column in the local newspaper.

Veronica reminds us that no matter how far we fall, we are never beyond the reach of grace and recovery. With faith, support, and courage, healing is always possible. Even in our darkest hours, God never let's go.

"If you're there and you don't want to be there, just stay. Just stay 'till the end. I mean, what have you got to lose? Literally everything."

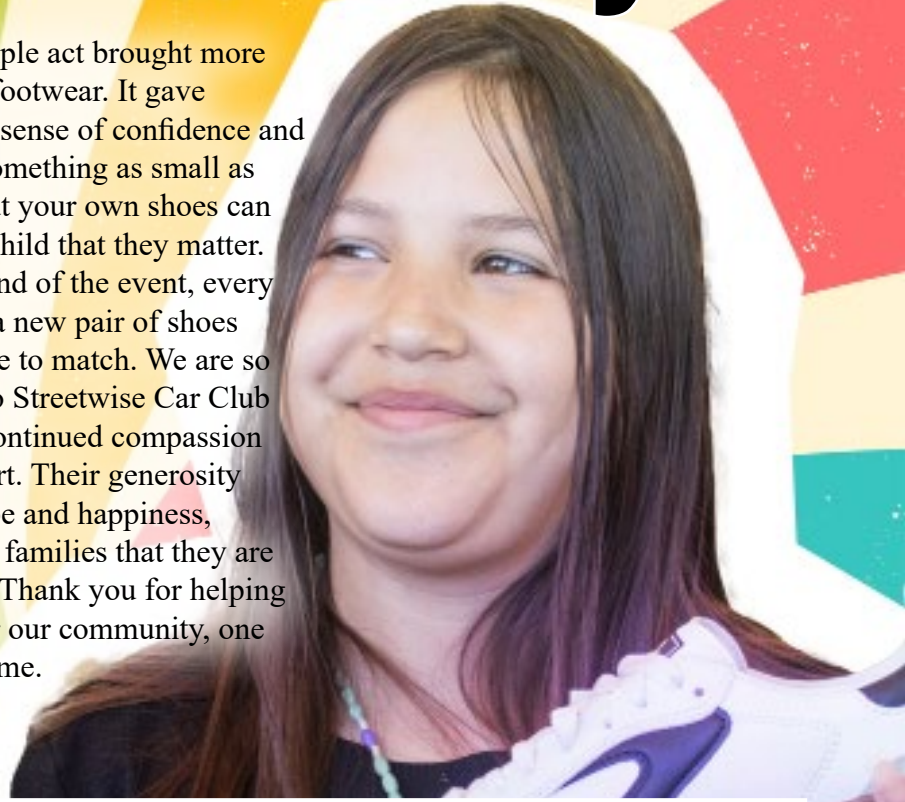
Streetwise Shoe Day!

First Baptisms of 2025

At Crossroads Mission, April is a sacred month. It is filled with both reflection and celebration, a time when we remember the betrayal, crucifixion, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. On April 12th, twelve individuals from our shelters and recovery programs made the life-changing decision to be baptized in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, making them the first baptisms of 2025. These group baptisms take place during the spring and summer months for anyone in our programs who desires to take that next step in faith. On this day, participants were brought to the Colorado River, just below the Ocean-To-Ocean Bridge. A peaceful and beautiful spot where they declared their new life in Christ. They are given a message of hope by Fabian, inspiring them to make their families their

ministry and to help guide them into the light of God.

With their arms crossed over their hearts, each person stepped into the water, 3 women and 9 men ready to leave their old life behind and rise again renewed in the Spirit. We also want to thank all the

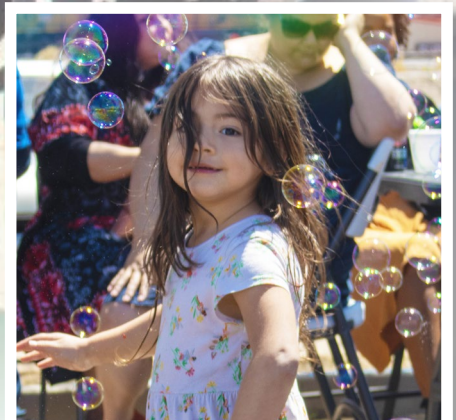

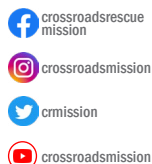
