Labor Trafficking

All too often people think of trafficking as purely sexual exploitation. Globally, the International Labor Organization and Walk Free Foundation, in partnership with IOM, estimate that there are 24.9 million people trapped in forced labor with 16 million victims of labor trafficking in private industry.*

Read the latest from the New York Times, published 2/25/2023: Arriving in record numbers, they're ending up in dangerous jobs that violate child labor laws — including in factories that make products for well-known brands like Cheetos and Fruit of the Loom.

Check out these documentaries to increase your labor trafficking knowledge:

The Child Slaves of Myanmar reveals the dark reality of an abuse case of two young girls that sparked outrage and the need for change within the justice system and protection for child and domestic workers. The documentary shows how some families living in poverty have to choose between sending their children away or abandoning them. The heartbreaking case shows the monstrous abuse poor children endure at the hands of those they work for. Child Slaves of Myanmar

How the Chocolate Industry Still Profits from Child Laboris a 2001 documentary that focuses on children being exploited on cocoa plantations in Ivory Coast. Children from Burkina Faso are either sold by their families to traffickers or are separated from their families and sold into trafficking. Through the advocacy of NGOs, the documentary puts pressure on companies in Europe to put an end to child labor, be vigilant on who they are buying from, and if they are fulfilling their promise to build schools for communities in Ivory Coast. As the documentary continues, questions are asked on what companies are doing to ensure they are not supporting child labor and to what extent traffickers are going to keep children working for them for years.

How the Chocolate Industry Still Profits from Child Labor

Trafficked in America is a Frontline documentary that sheds light on poor children from Central America being smuggled into the United States for better educational opportunities only to later be trafficked across the country to work on chicken farms. The documentary displays the harsh living conditions forced on victims and the lack of human decency they experienced on the farms from abuse, intimidation, and false promises. The documentary raises questions of border security, egg farm industries, and the need for advocacy and awareness for migrant children who are trafficked.
