# PATH EDUCATION



As Pride Month comes to a close, let's take a closer look at the vulnerabilities the LGBTQIA+ population, particularly youth face.

There are resources in this article that you are encouraged to fully read to help educate yourself on the vulnerabilities this population faces every day when it comes to trafficking.

The Polaris Project states "There is a direct link between anti LGBTQ+ discrimination and human trafficking. When someone's opportunities for a decent job or safe housing are constantly shattered because of discrimination based on who they are or how they look, that makes them vulnerable to human trafficking. Traffickers then have an open door to step in and offer "help" that turns out to be anything but. We know that traffickers operate by preying on vulnerable people - stepping in to fill a need they can't get elsewhere then tricking or coercing their victims into labor or commercial sex. The National Network for Youth provides a startling statistic regarding LGBTQIA+ and houselessness. Research has shown that those who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning (LGBTQ+) have a 120% higher risk of experiencing some form of homelessness.[1] With up to 40% of the 4.2 million youth experiencing homelessness identifying as LGBTQ+[2] while only 9.5% of the U.S. population[3], LGBTQ+ youth disproportionately experience homelessness compared to their straight and cisgender peers. They are also more likely to experience assault, trauma, depression, and suicide when compared to non-LGBTQ+ populations while also being homeless. These statistics are even worse for Black and Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC)

LGBTQ+ populations who suffer from racial inequities and discrimination. Read more.

Human Trafficking Search delves further into the vulnerability a houseless LGBTQIA+ youth faces. There is a disproportionate number of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) youth in the commercially sexually exploited population. The majority of US based organizations working with this population attribute this to the high levels of homelessness among LGBT youth. Forty-six percent of homeless LGBT youth report running away from home due to family rejection of their sexual orientation and 17 percent ended up on the streets after they aged out of the foster care system. Spending time on the streets as a vulnerable young person can have dire consequences and within 48 hours of running away, 1 in 3 homeless youth will be recruited by a trafficker into commercial sexual exploitation. And let's remember that this is a global crime affecting LGBTQIA+ throughout the world.

Dr. Theresa Hayden, PATH treasurer, presented Human Trafficking 101 to a group of foster care youth and caregivers. At the end of the sessions, time was allotted for questions and Dr. Hayden was moved by the youth and their questions/concerns/experiences that they shared.
