These are just a few of the headlines you'll find when you do a google search on internet safety and the rise of scams.

We've become so fatigued with online scams, data breaches, identity theft, etc. that it's easy to ignore warning signs or rely on our protection software to keep us safe. Especially when the headlines tell us these attempts just continue to gain strength.

Our friends at Enough Is Enough are working hard to make sure we all remember to be safe on the internet. They recently shared an article about the rise of artificial intelligence in scams. We've all heard stories about elder people receiving phone calls from someone claiming to be a grandchild needing bail money. This article details one of those scams but the scammer upped the game by using artificial intelligence to replicate the voice of the grandchild. Advances in technology allow voices to be replicated with an audio sample taken from anywhere, including Instagram, YouTube, Facebook, or TikTok. A few sentences are all that's needed to translate an audio file to "speak" whatever the scammer would like!

We must remember to protect ourselves and our loved ones. Below are just a few tips to keep yourself safe:

- Do not answer phone calls, texts, or email from numbers or people you do not know.
- Do not share personal information like your bank account number, Social Security number, or date of birth.
- Collect your mail every day and <u>place a hold on your mail</u> when you will be on vacation or away from your home.
- Review credit card and bank account statements. Watch for and report

unauthorized or suspicious transactions.

- Store personal information, including your Social Security card, in a safe place. Do not carry it in your wallet.
- Paying with a gift card or wiring money is like sending cash. Do not send money to people you do not know.
- Do not give access to your computer to people you do not know.
- Be careful what you share on social media including videos.

PATH was privileged to partner with Adelante Hispanic Achievers to present Human Trafficking 101 on March 18 to over 20 adults and youth participating in the center's programs.

Adelante Hispanic Achievers was created specifically to support and empower the fastest-growing demographic in Jefferson County, Louisville's Latinx youth and their families, helping them succeed in four critical areas of development: personal, social, cultural, and educational.
