

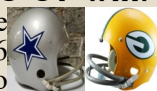


Packers huge 3rd quarter leads to 38-31 win.

Our game of the week this week lived up to all the billing. The Dallas Cowboys offense put up 456 yards with only 1 turnover, but it was not enough to take down the division leading Packers. After an early Dallas FG, Green Bay drove 70 yards to take the lead on a 25 yard pass from Bart Starr (18-30-260 4 TDs) to Carrol Dale (2-62-2). Neither team was able to break through after that until just before half, when Don Meredith (17-37-364 3TD) hit Jim Allison with a 12 yard TD pass with just 31 seconds to play before the break, but the 3rd quarter is when the Packers blew open the game. Green Bay ran back the second half kickoff 54 yards to the Dallas 37. On the next play, Starr hit Carrol Dale again for a score to take the lead 14-10 just 35 seconds in. Dallas got immediately stopped and a bad punt gave Green Bay the ball at the Cowboy 42. It took Starr only 6 plays to cover that distance and hit Jim Taylor with an 8 yard pass upping the lead to 21-10. Dallas ran 3 plays for 9 yards and decided to go for 4th and 1 on their 29 yard line, but the Green Bay defense stoned Dallas and Green Bay had the ball on a very short field. Even though Dallas held them immediately, the short FG went through for a 14 point lead. Meredith immediately took the Cowboys 82 yards in 7 plays to cut the lead to 24-17 hitting Lance Alworth (8-118-2) with a 21 yard pass. The teams traded touchdowns; a Starr 5 yard pass to Taylor and Meredith a 6 yard pass to Alworth; until Dallas fumbled deep in their end with Green Bay recovering at the 5 in a 31-24 game. It took the Pack 4 plays to get 5 yards, but Earl Gros scored from 1 yard out with just 8:37 to play and a 14 point lead at 38-24. Dallas drove down the field again with Dan Reeves (10-21-1) scoring on a 2 yard run, but time was running out. Green Bay stopped a desperation attempt from Dallas and won a real barn burner.

The Colts and 49ers can't settle it in 60.

Baltimore traveled across the country to take on San Francisco in a matchup of two teams that have playoff plans. Both defenses turned up ready to play and dominated this game throughout. The game started with 5 punts off 4 "3 and outs" before a special teams blunder opened up and opportunity. 49er Tommy Davis punted a long 48 yarder which was caught by Alvin Haymond at the 5 yard line. George Donnelly lined him up and jarred the ball loose. Len Rhode jumped on the loose ball and the Niners were in business. John Brodie (17-27-217 1 TD) took advantage hitting Bernie Casey (6-75-1) on a 10 yard TD pass for a 7-0 lead. Then the REAL turnover fest began. On 5 consecutive drives the ball was turned over, 3 interceptions, a fumble, and another time on downs. Finally Baltimore's John Unitas (9-23-148 1 TD 3 INT) righted the ship and drove the Colts 68 yards in six plays to tie the game up with a 41 yard bomb to Jimmy Orr (4-103-1). Again the defenses dominated until the last 9 minutes. San Francisco took 7 minutes off the clock on their best drive of the game, ending with Davis putting his kick dead center for a 10-7 lead with 1:48 to play. Baltimore then faced 4th and 16 from and came up two yards short turning it over at their 28 with 54 seconds to play. On 2nd and 7, Ken Willard ran the ball and got stripped by Bubba Smith. Lenny Lyles picked it up and ran it back 45 yards, finally getting tackled at the 49er 31 yard line. The Colts were given a second life of exactly 34 seconds. Unitas ran Matte on a sweep out of bounds for 5 and a short out pass for 11 to Orr. After John Mackey caught another 11 yarder, the Colts called their last time out with 12 seconds left. Lou Michaels made the 11 yarder. 10-10

Boston beats L.A.!!!

You could hear the "Beat LA" chants all the way on the west coast from the Beantown fans, and the Patriots did not disappoint. Jim Nance, the leagues leading rusher, carried 21 more times for 95 yards and 2 scores, but the big stars today was the combination of Babe Parilli to Gino Cappelletti. Parilli (16-26-311) hit Gino 5 times for 154 yards and an 84 yard score late in the 3rd quarter to break the spirit of the Rams, who never put the ball in the endzone on offense the entire day against that stout Patriot defense.

Deacon Jones was the star for Los Angeles on this day, with 8 tackles including 3 of the 8 Ram sacks, 2 more QB hurries and an interception in the first quarter that he returned 22 yards to give the home team a 7-0 lead in the first quarter. Los Angeles had only 146 yards of offense and missed 3 of 5 FGs, ending all hope.

Cards shut out Philly

Look out NFC South; the St. Louis Cardinals have a 3 game lead in the division and are looking to clinch early. The Cardinals went into the city of brotherly love and were mean as a snake on defense, limiting the Eagles to just 70 yards and 4 first downs in the entire game. They held the Eagles to 1 of 16 conversions on third and fourth downs, just 40 yards rushing on 26 attempts, 9 of 19 passing for 64 yards and sacked Eagle QBs 4 times for 34 yards. Philadelphia was never able to get past the St. Louis 36 yard line, and to top it off, St. Louis even scored the first TD on defense. Super star safety Larry Wilson latched onto a Norm Snead pass that was deflected by Jim Burson for his 5th interception of the season and ran it back 81 yards for a touchdown and an early 10-0 lead.

K.C. holds off Bears

Kansas City has high hopes on winning the NFC berth into the Super Bowl, and tried to keep the wins going against the visiting Bears.

Len Dawson (12-23-251 2TD, 3INT) got started early in this one as he went deep to Otis Taylor (3-100-1) for a 56 yard score on the first drive.

The Bears were undaunted and immediately took a good kick return into a five minute drive and a 12 yard FG to cut the lead to 4; 7-3. At the end of the quarter, KC turned an interception in 6 more points on a 19 yard pass to RB Dick Bass and 14-3 lead.

A few minutes later, Chicago picked off Dawson and Randy Bukich (9-25-150 2TD 3INT) went deep to Jimmy Jones (2-93-1) for a 45 yard bomb. After a series of turnovers by both teams, Mike Mercer hit a long 51 yard FG to extend the lead back to 17-10 at the half.

Mike Garrett (12-104-2) extended the lead in the 3rd quarter with a 7 yard run and after a series of punts the Bears ended the 3rd quarter with a drive ending with a 41 yard FG by Roger LeClerc.

After another long Mercer FG extended the lead, the Bears used Gale Sayers (19-77-0) on a long drive ending with a 9 yard pass from Bukich to Dick Gordon. Gordon's only catch of the day was a big one creating a one score game at 27-20 with around 5 minutes to play.

Kansas City tried to create one more drive against the tough Bear defense, but Mike Garrett broke loose going off tackle with some great blocking and took it to the house from 64 yards and a 14 point lead. Randy Bukich threw his third pick of the day, and Kansas City was able to run out the rest of the clock. It was an exciting and great game in the windy city. 34-20 Final.



Steelers win battle

The Steelers made the city of bridges proud with a hard fought back and forth battle that they were able to win 30-24. A battle of field goals in the first quarter exploded into an exciting TD battle in the middle two frames. With a 6-3 lead, Willie Asbury (19-60-2) opened up a 10 point lead with a 7 yard run for the home side. But 13-3 didn't last long as Ronald Smith took the ensuing kickoff 94 yards. Pittsburgh's Ron Smith then led the game changing drive, hitting Roy Jefferson with a 14 yard pass as the clock hit zeros in the half for 20-10 lead. The Falcons continued to play catch up as the Steelers continued to extend. Atlanta scored with Ernie Wheelwright and Pittsburgh answered with Asbury's second score. Randy Johnson hit star WR Alex Hawkins with a 16 yard strike to cut it to 27-24 at the end of the 3rd quarter, but could never score again. A field goal on the final play of the game gave us the final score of 30-24.

Karl Sweetan (11-20-158) hit Amos Marsh on a 4 yard TD pass in the 3rd quarter for the winning points and Roy Kramer 5 times for 97 yards throughout the game. Marsh also ran for 43 yards on 16 tries. Denver countered with Max Choboian (17-35-168) including a 17 yard TD strike to Charley Mitchell and 7 hookups with Al Denson for 104 yards. Mitchell also ran 15 times for 49 yards on the afternoon. CB Bobby Thompson had a huge day for the Lions with 10 stops, a 42 yd pick, 2 deflects & a run stuff.

Clev. outlasts Wash.

Another offensive slugfest with Washington, and again they come up just short. This was a great game of two really evenly matched teams separated by only 4 yards in the game; Wash.-376 Clev.-380.

Washington opened up a 10-0 first quarter lead behind the first of 3 Pete Gogolak FGs and a Steve Thurlow 2 yard run. Cleveland started to fight back with the first of FOUR Leroy Kelly TD runs (6, 18, 10, 8) early in the second quarter. After Washington extended their lead to 13-7 behind a Gogolak 34 yard kick, Kelly was at it again with his second TD scamper for a 14-13 lead with just 1:20 to play in the half. 1:20 is too long for this Washington team. Sonny Jurgensen led them down the field and Gogolak hit another at the gun for a 16-14 halftime lead.

Kelly opened the third quarter with his third score, but Jurgensen decided to take to the air with a 46 yard bomb to Charley Taylor to take back the lead at 23-21. Frank Ryan immediately hit back for the Browns, finding Milt Morin on a 15 yard TD pass to give the lead back to Cleveland 28-23 heading into the 4th quarter. Washington went on a long 11 play - 75 yard drive to take the lead back again. Joe Don Looney took it the final 11 yards to paydirt for the Redskins with just 9:32 left in the game. With a 29-28 lead, Washington decided to try for a two point conversion, but the attempt to give themselves a 3-point lead failed. Now it was Frank Ryan's turn, and he knew that Leroy Kelly had more left in him. Kelly scored his final TD at the end of an 8 play - 79 yard drive. The Groza kick made it 35-29, and Washington was unable to score one final time in the last 4 minutes. Cleveland to 7-0!

Bills shut out Fins.

A great Buffalo defense and the hot hand of QB George Blanda (15-21-272 2 TDs) led to a big win for the home town Bills. Buffalo outgained Miami by nearly three times the yards and held the ball for over 36 minutes behind a strong running game with 46 carries for 189 yards.

The game was a tough battle early on, as neither team was able to score for the first 24 minutes, but Buffalo exploded for 24 points in 4 minutes before the half.

First Blanda hit RB Bobby Burnett with a 16 yard pass. 2 minutes later, Burnett ran it in from 3 yards out after an interception by Frank Clarke. After forcing a fumble Blanda kicked a short 20 yard FG and a 17-0 lead. Buffalo next forced a punt and Blanda completed 3 quick passes, the last of which was a 23 yard score to Burnett again. Two second half scores gave the Bills an easy 38-0 final score.

Oak. tops NYG 34-13

The Giants traveled across the country and played a great first half in Oakland, but the Raiders proved too much in the second half to win by 21. Tom Flores hit Tom Mitchell under two minutes into the game after a forced fumble to give Oakland a 7-0 lead, but New York responded with two FGs and a Gary Wood to Allen Jacobs pass in the next 20 minutes. During that span, Oakland could only manage a FG as NY held a 13-10 lead. With 2:25 to play in the half, Oakland rode Clem Daniels power running and some timely Flores throws including a TD throw to Hewritt Dixon to lead 17-13 at the half. Second half was all Oakland with a 2 yard Dixon run, a second FG from Eischeid and another Flores TD pass to Billy Cannon. New York wasn't able to sustain offense in half 2, which led to the win for Oakland and a tie for the division lead.

Oilers sink the Vikings!

Houston traveled up north to Minnesota, put up 504 yards of offense including 240 on the ground in 44 tries, and controlled the clock for over 41 minutes to beat the Vikings. Oiler QBs Don Trull and Jack Kemp combined for 269 passing yards on 20-34 passing with 2 scores. Houston played a perfect game with no turnovers, and while Trull was adding 48 yards on 5 scrambles, Hoyle Granger got 106 on 18 tries and Sid Blanks chipped in 63 more in his 10 attempts.

Sir Francis Tarkenton did his very best to help Minnesota come back and win the game; going 15-20 for 270 yards and 2 scores. Tarkenton found five different receivers 3 times each to confuse the Oiler defense in the passing game, but the Viking rushing game never got it going. Minnesota was only able to attempt 11 rushes, and 3 of those were scrambles by Francis for 29 more yards.

Jets blast Bolts 28-14

San Diego fought hard in Balboa Stadium, but the Jets running game proved to be too much for an ailing Charger defense. Joe Namath only had to throw 13 passes in the game; 3 for TDs; and the Jet run game averaged 5.6 yards per carry in 28 attempts throughout the game. Matt Snell had 113 yards in 18 tries and the big 3 receivers, Maynard, Sauer, and Lammons each caught a scoring toss. San Diego took an early 7-0 lead when John Hadl hit Don Norton for his only catch of the day, and after Namath answered with a throw to Lammons, the Bolts lead again on a Curtis McClinton touchdown run, but the offense wasn't able to sustain the attack over four quarters, and the longer the game went, the more the Jets dominated the game. Verlon Biggs had his big number 86 in Hadls face all day long getting the ball for that Jet run game.

Looking at these groups, there is a very strong group of running backs this season with two future stars in Mel Farr and Dickie Post. Both looks to be long time stars for the future. The receiving groups are solid, a bit stronger than average our years of projections. This draft appears to be fairly weak in the box on defense, as we lack a large group of superstar level players in our front seven rankings. I guess we'll have to see how many of these players can be late bloomers in the league. On the back end, there are a few players who look like they will have exceptional careers, led by Lem Barney an Ken Houston. It looks like a trend is developing toward more passing, but I doubt passing will ever overtake the run.
