About The Food & Diaper Bank

Walworth County is located in the Southeast Corner of Wisconsin. It is a popular resort area known for its beautiful lakes. However, it has one of the greatest income disparities in the state. Walworth County is home to one of Wisconsin's poorest populations.

Our mission began in 2009 with a group of local Boy Scouts pulling wagons of food. Throughout the past sixteen years we've expanded our operations to serve Walworth County as a food bank providing bulk food distribution services to partner pantries, and additional programs providing diapers, incontinence products, and period supplies.

We focus on providing healthy, nutritious food in a welcoming environment, treating our guests with compassion and dignity. As we look to the future in our fight to end food insecurity, our goal is to ensure that no one in Walworth County goes hungry. We will continually seek new ways to serve more neighbors in need, easing financial stress, and strengthening our community. Together, we are **neighbors helping neighbors**.


Community Need

Food insecurity risk affects 33% of Walworth County households.

In Walworth County,

- 10% of our neighbors (4,400 households) are living below the Federal Poverty Level.
- 23% of the households in Walworth County (9,800) are considered ALICE households.

ALICE is an acronym for: Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed



ALICE households earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county. Learn more about our ALICE neighbors living paycheck to paycheck at unitedforalice.org.

In 2024 we served 1,300 households representing 4,000 people across 19 municipalities.

16% were older adults over the age of 60 years old

• 38% were children under the age of 18 years old

• 46% were adults ages 18 to 59 years old



Our Services

In 2024, we distributed more than 500,000 pounds of food.



As a Pantry

As a food pantry, we provide assistance to Walworth County residents across 19 municipalities who are food insecure.

In 2024, we served 1,300 unduplicated households representing almost 4,000 unique individuals.

- 362 were new households
- 631 of 2023 households didn't return in 2024
- only 2% of our guests come for help every month

Some households only need a little help to get through a difficult time. It's situational. Event driven. They don't want to rely on us. But they need us in the moment of crisis.

As a Bank

As a food and diaper bank, we provide assistance to multiple pantries and organizations throughout Walworth County. In 2024, we shared 4,000 lbs. of

food every month, a 2024 value of \$182,900.

Diaper Bank

As the only diaper bank in the county, we fight more than food insecurity, we fight period and diaper poverty.



Diaper and Incontinence Products

In Walworth County, 1 in 2 households struggle with diaper and incontinence product needs.

In 2024, we distributed **62,000 diapers and incontinence products** for babies, toddlers, older adults, and disabled residents of Walworth County.

Period Supplies

In Walworth County, 1 in 3 women miss work and **1 in 3 girls** miss school because they don't have period supplies.

In 2024, we distributed **42,000 period products** enabling girls and women to feel confident and attend school and work when they have their period.

We are the only Walworth County member of the National Diaper Bank Network and the Alliance for Period Supplies. In addition to community drives and donations, our memberships provide access to purchase diapers and period supplies at heavily discounted rates.



Older Adults

The need to support our older adult population has never been greater.


We proudly prioritize serving older adults in Walworth County who account for 27% of those living in our communities. Many face financial challenges living on a fixed income to support basic needs like food and personal care products.

Stockboxes are an additional box of nutritional foods we receive through the Hunger Task Force. The boxes are given out monthly to income eligible adults 60+ years old. Stockboxes include items such as rice, cereal, juice, pasta, and vegetables. We are the only facility to receive and distribute these boxes in Walworth County. In 2024, we gave out **1,600 Stockboxes**.

We also provide older adults with a bag of personal care and household items monthly. In 2024, we gave out **1,900 CARE bags**, a **25% increase** due to a generous, designated donation from Bader Philanthropies.



Strategic Partnerships





We work with local, national, and government resources to acquire free food or purchase food at a reduced cost. Relationships with our partner resources are critical because we do not receive financial assistance from the government. We are an organization fully funded by private donations and grants.

Having a **loading dock** means we can **accommodate semi-trucks** and large donations. Some donation opportunities come in unexpectedly, and being able to receive and store them means more food for our shelves, and the shelves of other pantries throughout Walworth County.

The quality of our community and of our county is defined by the opportunities to volunteer, to give back, and to help our neighbors in need.













In 2024, we had 150+ dedicated volunteers donate 10,773 hours of their time. According to *independent sector.org*, the value of a volunteer hour in Wisconsin in 2024 was \$33.49.
