

SAVE IMMANUEL

In 1872 twenty-two Norwegian emigrant pioneer farmers living in Lien Township founded the Immanuel Lutheran congregation, and decided to each pay pledges, known as "subscriptions," to raise funds to build a church. The members were all farmers who had come to America with little or nothing. Many lived in dugouts while establishing their farms. They met for services in their homes for many years and first bought a farm and built a home for the pastor. Construction of this rural church began in 1883 on land donated by Ole Lien, before the towns of Barrett and Elbow Lake were founded, and it took until 1898 to complete the interior and to build its furnishings. It was dedicated in 1899. The basement was dug in 1928 to provide a meeting space for use by Luther League youth group, Ladies Aid, Sunday School, and to host dinners as well as wedding and funeral gatherings. Norwegian was spoken for services until 1939. The steeple was rebuilt in 1941 after lightning destroyed the original, the stained-glass windows were added later. The church closed in 1998, and has since then it has been used for gospel sing-alongs, funerals, weddings, family reunions, historical cemetery walks, an annual service each first Sunday in August, and was the movie set for a scene in the *Redeemer's Song* movie "He Leadeth Me" in 2003. In its heyday, the church was filled with numerous families and was a vibrant part of the community.





It had no active congregation; therefore, the cemetery association became the owners of the church, but could not spend any of the funds from that treasury toward the building. An informal committee of concerned former members and others with family ties raised funds by holding 3 or 4 gospel sing-alongs each summer to take up a collection to place into a building treasury to pay for electricity, insurance, and maintenance. They did this for over twenty years.

With the church not being heated during the winter, through the years, Minnesota's harsh climate took its toll on the foundation. It heaved with the frost and each year it cracked a bit more. Last year, we were told that the building would not last another year. It was time to take action, so a building association was formed, and it now rents the building from the cemetery board and is responsible for the care of the church. It was decided they needed to raise awareness of the situation and ask for donations for the restoration.

Five fundraiser events were held this past year, featuring local talent at the Open Mic in June, Christmas in July, and in February 2020 a "Frozen Celebration" based on the Disney movie. Those events featured Nordic food and boutique items, and the Immanuel mugs being offered for sale. A Movie in the Park in August and a September Dance were enjoyed by many. News of the campaign was spread from word of mouth, local newspapers, and on Facebook, and the group raised over \$40,000 in the first two months. The initial campaign included a fund drive, with the "token" thank you being a set of book marks featuring pictures five of Immanuel's stained-glass windows on one side of each marker, and a history of the church on the back. Linda Leraas Ray printed them up on card stock on a home computer to save costs, and Karen Block sent out sets of 5 to former members all over the country! Over \$50,00 has been raised.



By spring we believed that enough money had been raised to hire a contractor to build a new foundation. Anderson Movers were to excavate the old foundation as soon as the ground was warm enough. They started the removal on April 7, but ran into too much frost. They were able to dig an opening into the church on the south side, remove the old back basement entrance and the old chimney. The north side was too frozen, so they resumed their task on May 4 with much success. John C. Bosek Masonry Construction was hired to pour new footings and build the new foundation walls. He began the work on Monday, May 11. He will replace the two north and south long walls first, then Anderson will remove the east wall, and the new wall will go in. The west wall under the bell tower will not be removed due to a large amount of weight, and a new wall will be

constructed in front of the old badly cracked one. We are so pleased with the work done so far, and so thankful that Leon Johnson is volunteering to be our general contractor. His family has been a part of Immanuel for many generations, and he serves as an active member of the cemetery board.

APRIL 7, 2020









The photos above were taken on April 7 by Linda Leraas Ray who headed up the fundraising efforts. A few problems had to be dealt with including a hole in the corner left by the removal of the chimney, and another is a concern about one of the interior columns on the decorative arcade in the front of the church. It loosened from its fastener, and is leaning precariously. It is hoped that once the foundation walls are built, it will return to its upright position. It is not a load-bearing structure, but we worry about the altar painting be destroyed.

MAY 11, 2020

MAY 14, 2020





These photos by Leon Johnson were taken on another beautiful spring day. The new wall is being placed in front of the bellfry tower wall. Once the north and south side walls and the bell tower wall is up, the east wall will be removed through a temporary opening that will be walled up last. Much work remains for this project to be complete. Drain tile will be placed around the building and a plan is underway to a lay a drain tile line to take water from the building to the culvert near the road. Numerous loads of fill will be brought in and the empty gravel truck will take the piles of old foundation concrete off site. Many volunteers will be needed to clean up the debris, and level off the soil, spread out top soil if need be, and plant new grass, all while social distancing and wearing masks.

We had hoped to sponsor more fundraising events this spring, but due to the Covid 19 virus, we will have to plan those into the future. It will take many more funds to maintain the building. We plan to do other repairs and clean and paint the interior of the building. Our hope is to have this structure placed on the National Registry of Historic Places so grant money is available to help with the needs of the structure.

We are grateful for all who have donated both money and time for all of our fundraisers to date. We are also grateful to Kent Marshall for his help with drawing up the lease agreement, and to so many others who have gone above and beyond in their love and concern for this wonderful "Queen on the Prairie." The list is long.

We greatly desire to carry on the legacy of this church, at least for part time use for weddings, funerals, baptisms, family reunions, fundraisers and concerts. The acoustics are outstanding, and we hope they will be enjoyed for many years to come.
