

RECAP OF MARCH PRESENTATION

Trees—Can Mankind Survive Without Them March 20, 2025
Presenter: Dan Lepo

Dan is the caretaker of 25 acres at the Tomlinson Arboretum and directly or indirectly involved in the planting of 1,000 trees. Planted over 1000 trees, 60 are Michigan natives. We would like to become the largest collection of Michigan native trees in the State of Michigan. When shopping for trees, ask them if they were grown from Michigan seeds. These are Michigan genotype trees, not just Michigan native trees which could have been grown in Oregan. Michigan wildlife rely on Michigan genotype trees. Using non-Michigan genotype trees contribute to the reasons why bird and insect populations are decreased.

Our own survival depends on the survival of trees. The reasons why we can't survive with trees are:

- Trees slow down global warming and play a vital role in combating climate change. They absorb massive amounts of carbon dioxide helping reduce its buildup in the atmosphere. It's estimated that trees absorb roughly 20% of greenhouse gases. The destruction of rainforests for human expansion and equatorial regions of the world are having a dramatic impact on climate change. Trees release water vapor in the air, cooling the surrounding environment and this helps mitigate the greenhouse effect. By reforestation and maintaining existing forests. We can positively help stabilize the climate and protect our planet.
- Trees play a critical role in producing the oxygen needed to sustain life by converting carbon dioxide into breathable air through process called photosynthesis, contributing roughly 21% of the planet's oxygen supply.
- Trees help prevent soil erosion.
- Trees help regulate the water cycle.
- Trees help reduce air pollution.
- Trees are a primary food source for wildlife, while also providing a source of fuel and timber for humans.
- Tree improve soil quality. One example is the use of decomposing leaves to create compost. The leaves also provide habitat for micro-organisms and food (caterpillars for wildlife).
- Trees provide shade and helps lower energy costs.
- Trees provide health benefits to humans. There are some environmental studies that show supportable evidence that being in a forest will boost the immune system and improve mental health.

When planting a tree, the hole has to be 2 to 3 times as big as the diamemter of the ball and you have to score the ball and to cut off the roots on the bottom. Grind the dirt that you removed, and place it around the root ball. Make the tree collar is at least one inch above ground level. Do not compress the soil, to get rid of air gaps, you water the soil with 2 to 3 gallons of water. Add two sheets of newspaper and mulch on top (without touching the bark. You can use a rubber gasket as a collar to protect the bark from injury. When you transplant your tree from a nursery to your yard, the first year the tree will sleep, don't expect to see any growth through the first couple years. By the third year, the tree will start growing. After that, trees require pruning to maintain air circulation and prevent crossing of limbs and we follow standard care practices.
