Elderberry is a fruit with antioxidants and vitamins that may boost your immune system and help with cold and flu symptoms. Even better--it's native! Join MCMGA and Erin with Heart and Soul Naturals in an "All About Elderberries" presentation covering the benefits, lifecycle, and uses for elderberries. The presentation itself is free for MCMGA members, a \$10 donation from guests.

During the free presentation, attendees will also learn how to make their own elderberry syrup. For an added price, attendees can put together a kit of ingredients for the elderberry syrup to make themselves at their home. The kit includes: all organic Elderberries, goji berries, rose hips, ginger root, cinnamon sticks & whole cloves. Also includes all organic reusable cheesecloth. Any allergens may be omitted from individual's kits.

Two options are available: the aforementioned items with a 16oz jar of locally sourced raw honey for \$35 OR the aforementioned items without honey for \$20 where one would supply their own honey when making the syrup. Both kits make a final product of 32oz.

As Erin and her team need time to properly source ingredients for us, the sign-up deadline and payment is due October 31st. Cash or checks made payable to MCMGA will be accepted at the October 10th meeting. Members can also mail checks to our P. O. Box. Payment made in the mail must be received by 10/31/2024. Payments also accepted on our website.

Recap of September Meeting Presentation

9/19/24

“The Role Played by Michiganders in the Development of Modern Horticultural Science”

**Dave Putt
Advanced Master Gardener**

William James Beal – 1833 – 1924 - professor at Michigan Agricultural College starting in 1870, predecessor to MSU – He taught botany, horticulture, landscape gardening, forestry and history. He built the first laboratory devoted entirely to the study and teaching of botany in the US. Introduced microscopes to the classroom. He was the father of the study of modern botany bringing the use of microscopes into the classroom with plant specimens. He created a botanical garden on campus in 1871. In the fall of 1879, Professor William James Beal began an experiment to determine seed longevity to study how long seeds of our common plants could remain dormant in the soil and remain viable. This experiment in seed longevity is still active today, and has become the one of the longest continuously monitored scientific experiments in the world. He also conducted the first controlled experiments of crossing open pollinated varieties of corn for the purpose of increasing yield. His project was inspired by the writings of Charles Darwin on plant hybridization.

Liberty Hyde Bailey - 1858 – 1954 - was a student at the Michigan Agricultural College (now Michigan State University) and studied botany. Born on a farm in Michigan in 1858, Liberty Hyde Bailey graduated from the Michigan Agricultural College with a B.S. degree in botany in 1881. After working with the renowned botanist Asa Gray at Harvard, he returned to Michigan to teach horticulture and landscape gardening and earning a M.S. Degree in 1886 from the Michigan Agricultural College. In 1888, he came to Cornell to build a new curriculum in practical and experimental horticulture. With state funding, he also began a program at Cornell to teach nature study in rural schools. Through extension bulletins, lectures, demonstrations, and farm visits, Bailey built support for his programs among New York State farmers and in the State Legislature. He was a prolific writer and many of his books are still for sale today. He is the Father of Modern Horticulture. One of his most famous books was *The Holy Earth*, and is still for sale today.

Dexter Mason Ferry – 1833 – 1907 – Father of Modern Seed Business - Detroit was home to the world’s largest seed company, D.M. Ferry & Co., named after owner. The firm, which dates back to 1856, was renowned for its quality, selling only fresh seeds, and was the first company to sell fruit, vegetable, and flower seeds in packets. The company’s headquarters was located at Brush and Monroe streets in downtown Detroit. He also was president of the First National Bank of Detroit, the Union Trust Company and several other companies. He was also a charter benefactor of the Detroit Institute of arts. Ferry Street was named after him in 1874. He is buried in Detroit’s Woodmere Cemetery.
