Five Peace Victories: How President Trump Quietly Ended Some of the World's Most Dangerous conflicts.

In an era where political noise often drowns out true leadership, President Donald J. Trump is quietly doing what many said was impossible: delivering peace in some of the world's longest and most dangerous conflicts. While the media is slow to credit him, history won't forget the four major international conflicts

that were de-escalated or ended under President Trump's current term. From the Caucasus to the Middle East, the Trump Doctrine of strength, negotiation, and unapologetic American leadership is producing tangible results.

1. Ceasefire Between Israel and Iran (Announced June 23, 2025)

- Combatants: State of Israel vs. Islamic Republic of Iran
- Conflict Duration: Cold war since 1979, open proxy conflicts in Syria, Lebanon, and Gaza; direct strikes exchanged 2018–2025
- Hot war for twelve days in June including the USA destroying Iran's nuclear enrichment facilities with B2 bomber strikes.
- Trump's Role: Against the odds, Trump personally oversaw backchannel negotiations via Gulf State intermediaries. His administration used a carrot-and-stick approach: crippling the Islamic Republic's uranium enrichment program and threatening additional strikes while promising peace and prosperity for a ceasefire.

Result: On June 23, 2025, Iran and Israel announced a mutual ceasefire, with Iran also curbing support for Hezbollah, Islamic Jihad and Houthi Rebels. Israel halted strikes on Iranian military infrastructure in Iran and Syria. The U.S. remains the guarantor of the peace terms.

Conservative Takeaway: No other leader since Reagan has held Iran accountable while also bringing it to the negotiating table. This is statesmanship at its finest.

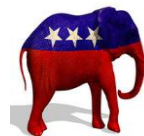

2. Armenia–Azerbaijan Ceasefire over Nagorno-Karabakh

Conflict Duration: Since the late 1980s

Trump's Role: Brokered an enforceable ceasefire with buy-in from Russia and Turkey. Armenia gained security guarantees in exchange for recognizing new borders.

Result: A permanent ceasefire is in place with international peacekeepers. U.S. influence in the region is stronger than it's been in decades.

3. Saudi Arabia–Yemen War De-escalation

- Conflict Duration: Since 2015
- Trump's Role: Unlike the Obama and Biden administrations that fumbled or ignored the issue, Trump pushed both sides into serious negotiations using America's energy leverage and regional alliances.

Result: A power-sharing government formed, with Saudi forces withdrawing and the Houthis agreeing to disarm heavy weapons. Yemenis are seeing peace for the first time in a decade.

4. Kosovo–Serbia Recognition Agreement

- Conflict Duration: Political standoff since 2008, armed hostilities in the 1990s
- Trump's Role: Trump reopened the 2020 economic agreement and turned it into full diplomatic recognition. Serbia gained EU entry guarantees while Kosovo secured legitimacy.

Result: Embassies are now open in both countries, and ethnic tensions are cooling fast under Western watch.

5. Democratic Republic of Congo and the Republic of Rwanda June 2025

- President Donald Trump announced a peace agreement between the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and the Republic of Rwanda.
- The treaty addresses violent conflicts and aims to stabilize the mineral-rich eastern Congo region.

Result: It signifies a potential turning point in regional stability and a diplomatic achievement for the Trump administration.

Why These Matter — And Why Trump Deserves Credit

The Nobel Peace Prize is often handed out for symbolic gestures. But President Trump's peace efforts have brought results. According to the Nobel Committee's own guidelines, the prize honors those who "have done the most or the best work for fraternity between nations, for the abolition or reduction of standing armies, and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses."

President Trump qualifies on all counts — and not through appeasement, but through strength. He achieved what previous administrations only talked about. He backed our allies, stood up to terrorists, and made peace possible while protecting and advancing American interests and values.

While critics focus on tweets and trivialities, President Trump is ending wars. From Tehran to Tel Aviv, Belgrade to Pristina, and Sana'a to Nagorno-Karabakh, American leadership is back — and peace is breaking out in places once written off as hopeless. That's something every American should be proud of — and something the world can thank President Trump for.

Legislative Report

The 89th Texas Legislative session is over. We had some victories and some setbacks. Now the Governor is signing or vetoing the bills that were passed.

We had several bills pass that dealt with the Texas Republican Legislative Priorities. You can read the full list here <https://drive.google.com/file/d/1sss71h0Db6QlhBCi9ksB3mn4CVhoDbE8/view>.

Border Enforcement: One Bill passed on this.

Secure Texas Elections: 7 bills passed on this issue. One was sponsored in the House by Rep Shaheen, SB1470.

Stop Sexualizing Texas' Kids: 7 bills passed on this subject. Two bills, SB13 and SB2420, were by Senator Paxton.

No Democrat Chairs: This session saw only Republican chairs with Democrats as Vice Chairs.

Ban Taxpayer-Funded Lobbying: While bills were filed on this subject, none passed.

Secure the Electric Grid: 11 bills were passed on this issue. 2 were by Senator Hall, SB2148 and SB75.

Texas is Not for Sale: Two bills passed.

End Federal Overreach: 9 bills passed with one by Rep. Leach, HB4076.

As usual, not every Republican is happy with what passed. It is important to remember that this is a marathon not a sprint. If your bill did not get passed, this time it might in 2027. For example, Senator Hall has been trying to get bills passed to secure the grid for years. This year he got 11. The legislative process is designed to kill bills, so those that pass are put through the ringer.

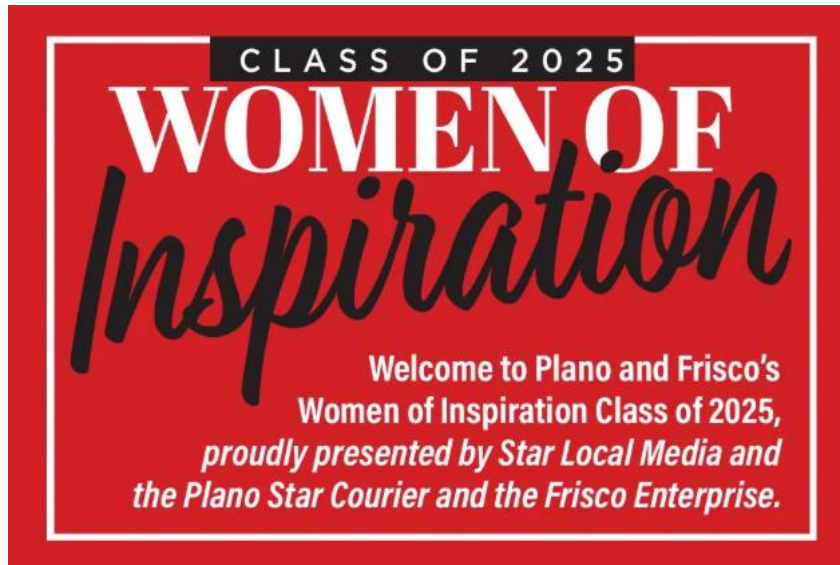
Unfortunately, some bad bills did get passed and were signed by the governor. SB15 and SB840 both are now law. SB15 bans cities like Plano from having required residential lots sizes larger than 3000 square feet. SB840 lets commercial property be converted to multifamily by right in cities like Plano. So, be ready to have more apartments and smaller houses.

The Governor has called a special session to work on a bill he vetoed banning THC. The Governor explains his reasons in a proclamation he put out. You can read it in full here:

HERITAGE OF THE HISTORIC WHITE HOUSE TREASURY ROOM

JULY 1, 2025

In a recent interview, Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent was seated in a richly appointed room at the White House—one with deep historical roots. As he discussed trade and national security, he also touched on the room’s unique legacy, offering a fascinating backdrop to the conversation.

Secretary Bessent pointed back to [Salmon P. Chase](#) as well as [Alexander Hamilton](#), our first Treasury Secretary, who served under George Washington from 1789 to 1795. Hamilton believed in using tariffs not just to raise revenue, but to protect American industry and build national strength. Bessent summed it up perfectly: “The original tariff man was Alexander Hamilton.”

1. A Room with Origins in the Treasury

Contrary to common misconception that the space was always part of the White House, this room originally belonged to the [Treasury Department](#) when its offices were housed in the Executive Office Building across from the White House. Specifically, it is a beautifully restored suite from the Civil War era, once occupied by [Salmon P. Chase](#), Lincoln’s Treasury Secretary. Chase guided the nation’s finances during the Civil War; today the suite retains mid-19th-century antiques, ornate chandeliers, and an allegorical ceiling mural symbolizing “Treasury” and “Justice.”

2. From Treasury to White House

After the Civil War, the Treasury Department remained here into the early 20th century. By the 1930s, as the federal government expanded, the Secretary’s office moved—but the original room has been meticulously preserved. Today it serves occasionally for high-profile press engagements, embodying both architectural elegance and institutional memory.

3. Why the Room Matters

- **Visual symbolism:** The ornate décor and historical furnishings evoke a continuity of fiscal responsibility dating back to the Civil War.
- **Message reinforcement:** By speaking here, Bessent symbolically aligns modern economic strategy—especially on tariffs and supply-chain resiliency—with foundational Treasury principles.
- **Historic context:** The room once belonged to the first Northern Treasury Secretary to serve under a war-time presidency, making it a powerful reminder of government leadership during trial and transition.

That historical frame, set against a Civil War–era backdrop, underscores Bessent’s communication that economic policy is not new—it’s rooted in American tradition. His presence in a room once used by Salmon Chase evokes a lineage of fiscal stewardship, gingerly linking today’s “America First” global stance to enduring American financial ideals.

Secretary Bessent’s appearance in this historic room was no accident—it visually and symbolically reinforced his message that national security, economic resilience, and fiscal policy are interwoven threads in the American story. This setting isn’t just ornate décor—it’s a strategic backdrop connecting today’s policies with those of Lincoln-era stewards like Chase, reminding Americans of a longstanding tradition of governance aimed at preserving national sovereignty, prosperity, and constitutional principles.

Stewardship of our nation’s finances—just like preservation of our historical institutions—isn’t just good governance; it’s a vital expression of Americanism, reflecting our duty to protect both our freedom and our founding values for future generations.

For Texans who value strong national defense and economic independence, the symbolism of the historic Treasury Room resonates deeply—it’s a reminder that conservative principles of limited government and sound fiscal policy have always been central to preserving American strength.

Note: Although often referred to simply as part of the “White House,” the room where Secretary Bessent was interviewed is formally located in the *Eisenhower Executive Office Building* (EEOB), adjacent to the West Wing. Known historically as the Treasury Room, it once housed the office of Treasury Secretary Salmon P. Chase, who served under President Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War. The room is carefully preserved in its 19th-century style and remains a powerful visual symbol of America’s enduring commitment to fiscal stewardship and constitutional governance.

When an Opportunity Presents Itself

"All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

True Warriors do not want armed conflict; they prefer to present a deterrent to the aggression and designs of adversaries. The Spartans were so feared that there were no walls surrounding Sparta. However, when you face evil and your response is acquiescence, compliance, appeasement, and compromise, that conveys weakness. And weakness is enticing to evil.

Consider Sir Neville Chamberlain after his meeting with Adolf Hitler, returning with the Munich Agreement of 1938 and professing that he had a "signed document from Herr Hitler and that there will be peace in our time." The agreement consented to Hitler's demand to annex the Sudetenland from Czechoslovakia, Chamberlain believing that it would usher in peace. Hitler stated that he had no other territorial claims or designs. Less than a year later, World War II would begin as Germany would overrun Czechoslovakia, then Poland. When asked about the Munich agreement of 1938, Hitler referred to it as a piece of paper. Acquiescence to evil never succeeds; it only leads to emboldening it.

That should have been a lesson learned for one US President, Jimmy Carter. When faced with an important decision of supporting the Shah of Iran or allowing his overthrow, Carter chose the latter. Carter chose weakness and appeasement, and the result was the resurgence of Islamic jihadism with the Islamic Revolution in Iran...and the rise of Ayatollah Khomeini. It also resulted in the attack on our US Embassy in Tehran and the taking of Americans as hostages. The Carter Administration even displayed complete ineptitude with the Desert One rescue mission, which was an abject failure.

Let us not forget the October 23, 1983, attack by Hezbollah, a proxy army of Iran, at the Beirut barracks, resulting in the deaths of 234 Marines, Sailors, and a Soldier. It was not until April 1988, during Operation Praying Mantis, that Reagan unleashed the US Navy against the Iranian Navy after the sea mine attack against the USS Samuel B. Roberts. And remember, Iran released the

hostages after Reagan was elected, not after his inauguration. Evil responds to strength, and that is why Reagan coined the term “Peace through Strength.”

During Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom, Iran was providing a deadly improvised explosive device called an explosive force penetrator (EFP). It shot a molten steel projectile at such a velocity that it was able to penetrate armored vehicles. There are many American troops who lost their lives and limbs because of EFPs, provided by Iran by way of the Quds Force Commander, Qasem Soleimani, now deceased.

Iran is the number one sponsor of Islamic terrorism. During the first Trump administration, Iran was virtually bankrupt due to economic sanctions. There was no ability to fund its major proxies such as Hamas, Hezbollah, and the Houthis. Then came Jimmy Carter Part II, Joe “Autopen” Biden and a return to appeasement and actual enabling of Iran by way of easing sanctions and even providing billions of dollars. And what was the result?

October 7, 2023 should have not happened, but it did, and Israel has responded as a targeted Nation should. They see that the opportunity to eliminate a declared enemy, evil, has presented itself. Thanks to Israel, Hamas is being rendered ineffective. Hezbollah has been decimated. Iran no longer has a land bridge to the Mediterranean Sea. Iran has been moving towards having a nuclear weapon and the Cold War principle of MAD (Mutually Assured Destruction) theory does not relate. The mad mullahs in Iran are deranged theocrats who seek to start a major conflagration in order to usher in the return of the so-called Mahdi. If they achieve nuclear weapon capability, it will be used, be it by way of a ballistic missile, or as a dirty bomb in the hands of terrorists.

Regime change is the responsibility of the Iranian people, who had a proud Persian history. The opportunity exists at this moment to eradicate any possibility of Iran having a nuclear weapon capacity. And Obama’s weak appeasing nuclear agreement did nothing to prevent this objective, it only delayed its breakout.
