Over the next few months, we will explore the pinnacle of American heritage: iconic places, people, events and symbols of patriotism that played a key role in the early development of our country.

In celebration of America's 250th Anniversary



ICONS OF AMERICA: THE SEAT OF AMERICAN GOVERNMENT, WASHINGTON, D.C

Perhaps you have traveled to Washington, D.C. once, a million times, or never at all. Maybe now is a good time to take a trip and bring the whole family with you! Everyone who lives in this beautiful country should take at least one opportunity to walk the halls of the Capitol building, schedule a White House tour, stop to take pictures at the National Mall, or choose from a variety of museums and archival buildings to visit. D.C. is a landmark and a gold mine of American history. Its origins can be easily traced back; the founding of our nation's capital city was well documented!

The beginning of a larger vision: It is estimated that Washington, D.C., named for our first President, now hosts over 127,000 historic buildings, but it was once a humble piece of Indian territory with not a single building on it. As the Revolutionary War ended, Washington desired to build a new capital city, so parts of Virginia and Maryland were ceded near the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers, and the call went out for bids on who would develop the future government seat of America. Pierre Charles L-Enfant, a French artist and engineer who served in the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War, won the bid and designed a grid-like concept similar to his hometown streets of Paris. The vision was to create both grand boulevards and ceremonial-like spaces for specific landmarks and monuments to stand apart from other structures. D.C. was officially established by the U.S. Constitution on July 16, 1790, but it took several iterations of both the L-Enfant plan and modifications over the years, including the very recognizable McMillan Plan of 1901, to piece together the city we know and love today. An unexpected turn of events, the War of 1812, also set the city back on progress, as the British burnt down most every main structure, including the White House, The Capitol, and Library of Congress. When all the books were destroyed, Thomas Jefferson sold off his entire personal collection to replenish the library for \$23,950 in 1815.

The oldest surviving building, an old stone house: Built in 1765 in the Georgetown district, this home was fabled to be the meeting place of General Washington and L-Enfant as they planned the design of the city. However, their meetings had actually taken place at Suter's Tavern across the street, but the rumor outlived the truth. This structure has mistakenly been preserved for a piece of erroneous history and now is the oldest surviving building in the D.C. area, complete with three stories and an indoor kitchen, a luxury at the time for anyone living in the mid-1700s.



Impressive and symbolic sites: As the business of the country grew, so did the landmark structures needed to support it. *The U.S. Capitol* was constructed from 1793-1800, moved from Philadelphia to D.C., and endured extensive damage in 1814. The dome was completed in 1866, and modifications were made well into the 20th century. *The Library of Congress*, spearheaded by John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, was originally housed in the Capitol, but the collection outgrew the space upon the passage of the Copyright Act of 1870 by Congress, prompting a need to complete a more elaborate, permanent library in 1897 to house all kinds of special collections for a matter of public record. *The Supreme Court* met in a dozen different locations, sometimes even people's homes, but settled on what is now the Old Senate Chamber of the U.S. Capitol. A rising politician, Chief Justice and future President, William H. Taft, convinced Congress to fund a Supreme Court building, which was completed in 1935. After 146 years of gaveling cases, the court finally had a home. A crown jewel of the city (which received attention most recently for housing King Charles and Queen Camilla during their state visit in April 2026), the historic *Blair House*, across from the White House, was built in 1824 and served as the home of the first Surgeon General of the U.S. Army. It expanded to include 4 houses around it, was extensively renovated in the 1980s, and is the official home away from home for all foreign dignitaries when they come to visit the President of the United States. The guest country's flag flies in the front, and the elaborate 14 guest rooms, 3 formal dining areas, conference rooms, kitchens, hair salon and fitness center are poised to 'put on the dog' and make a high impression on all who stay there. And finally, the most cherished of all, *The White House*, has housed every U.S. president since John Adams in 1800. Designed by Irish American, James Hoban, who won the bid in a highly publicized design contest led by Washington and Thomas Jefferson, this highlight of our nation's history has gone through numerous renovations, a major fire, and currently boasts 155 rooms, 55 bathrooms, 28 fireplaces, tennis courts, a bowling alley and a movie theater. Teddy Roosevelt gave it the name "The White House" in 1901, and it is the official living residence and place of business for the President and First Family. The building is open for select public tours, arranged through your U.S. Representative or Senator, and is currently undergoing its most bold renovation to date; a \$400 million, 90,000 square foot ballroom off the East Wing for hosting events of state, commenced in 2025 by President Donald J. Trump.

The Arts are Alive in D.C. An impressive fact about Washington, D.C. is the size and number of buildings celebrating art, music, culture and history. The main performance hall, The Kennedy Center, opened in 1971 and hosts over 2,200 events annually, including the prestigious Kennedy Center Honors. When it comes to museums, the city does not disappoint. The Smithsonian is not a single building, but a set of 21 separate museums offering immense collections of American and World art, including:

- African American Culture Museum: American history through an African American lens
- American History Museum: World Class collections that help tell America's stories
- Natural History Museum: Explores the natural world and our place in it
- National Portrait Gallery: America's history through portraiture and biography
- American Indian Museum: Honors Native heritage, history, and voices
- Air and Space Museum: Launches into the history of flight and space
- Hirshhorn Museum: Features international modern and contemporary art
- Smithsonian Castle: The first and oldest building of all the Smithsonian collections
- Arts and Industries Building: Hosts special experiences and programs
- The Postal Museum: America's mail history and the art of stamp collecting
