I picture myself sitting in a small bookstore and café on the waterfront in Halifax, Nova Scotia – a place I frequented while on

sabbatical, and return to every year. I like the way the smells of coffee and books merge in the air inside that café. There are voices, too, in the dark heavy wood of the bookshelves and tables, whispering of revolution. Plotting the next uprising against the system. Planning the downfall of the oppressors. Drawing the new blueprints for a just society, free of poverty and racism and violence.

I know. Revolutionaries are idealists and revolutions are the convulsions that lead to the next encrusted dogmatic system that eventually needs reforming.

Humanity still searches for the perfect way to organize itself into societies and communities. From the ancient Middle East and the ancient Greeks and Romans, to the feudal societies of medieval Europe; from the ancient (continued on page 2)

tribal and nomadic societies in Asia and Africa, to agricultural communities and religious orders; from indigenous civilizations to monarchies, dictatorships, and democracies – humanity still seeks a basis for communal relationships that will establish peace, justice, fairness, equity, and dignity for all the world's people. Meanwhile, there is always a need, somewhere, for liberation.

During my sabbatical back in 2003 I frequently sat in that subversive little café in Halifax working on my Gospel of Mark project. The gospel always seemed to feel right at home there, revolutionary ferment escaping from each page and mingling with those rich coffee and book aromas in the air. I could picture Jesus and his followers hanging out in a café like that, planning their next move, talking about the previous day's events over a cup of java. A bunch of revolutionaries plotting to spring the kingdom of God on the world by surprise. You gotta watch out for these people. They look suspicious. They hang with all the wrong crowds. And they have this radical idea about community based upon compassion, grace, nonviolence, forgiveness, and love.

The whole thing seems impractical, I know. Idealistic beyond any sensible application in real life. When the going gets tough, the tough start blasting away. And the first thing that gets blown to smithereens is the Sermon on the Mount, along with a few other hopelessly idealistic teachings of Jesus.

Every summer the cafes and underground bookstores fill up with revolutionaries. They are reading the Gospels. They gather around the big table in the corner where the dark wood shelves whisper rebellion and the coffee is flowing like a sweet river. When Jesus walks in they offer him a fresh cup. No one else recognizes him. He sits. Life is good. The kingdom of God has come near.

This is an approximate timeline, of course. It depends upon a number of variables and circumstances beyond anyone's control; i.e. unforeseen issues arising during the interim time; the number of ministerial profiles received; the availability of candidates; length of notice your final candidate will have to give (usually 60 – 90 days). The average interim time will take *approximately* two years.

I also recommend holding at least two church retreats during the interim time – spiritual retreats devoted to prayer, silence, singing, scripture, being together in a location other than the church as the people of God. These can be planned by the Pastor and the Transition Team.

I will be asking the church committees and teams to devote at least one (or more) of their regular meetings to discuss the five focus areas of the church relevant to the Profile categories: heritage, mission, connections, leadership, and your future. More details about those categories will be made available when we get to that point.

In addition, the Search Committee will be surveying members of the congregation concerning information needed in the Church Profile.

I will be preaching periodically on aspects of the interim time.

Perhaps most importantly, it is absolutely essential that we all pray for our church and for each other during this time. We are seeking to discern God's will and purpose for this congregation going forward. We are seeking to grow into a future that is faithful, true to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and a beacon of light to all with whom we minister, in the community and around the world.

I'm feeling blessed and grateful to be walking with you on this journey. Rev. Bert
