Sheriff's Department Seeks Public's Help On Stamford Graffiti

- Although it has now been erased by the property owner, the appearance of graffiti on an idle property off county Route 18 just south of the village of Stamford, is being viewed by some as a racist death threat, according to comments made on social media.

The case is being actively investigated, according to a release from the Delaware County Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office was contacted by a reporter from the Daily Star, who saw the graffiti in a Facebook Post to Stamford New York Neighbors page. The post calls it "a hate speech and overtly racist".

Preliminary investigation revealed that the

graffiti was spray painted in blue paint on the building between mid-day, Friday, July 3, and Monday morning, July 6, 2020. It was discovered by a woman who walks her dog on the property.

Sheriff's Deputies, in collaboration with Stamford Troopers, are continuing their investigation. Deputies are asking anyone with information that may lead to the identity of the person or persons responsible for committing this crime to contact Corporal Alexander at the Delaware County Sheriff's Office via phone: (607) 832-5555, email: eric.alexander@co.delaw are.ny.us, or by calling and leaving a message on the 24 hour toll-free hotline 1-888-914-9111. Junior Golf Tees Off with 70 Participants



There were 70 students signed up for the week of Junior Golf camp at the Stamford Golf Club. The program is running two weeks this season, providing instruction in the lifetime sport of golf. The participants will learn the game, rules and etiquette over the week. Some are in the camp for the first time, while others are returnees to the program, which gets them out on the course each day as well to practice their newly learned. skills.

This allows students to learn with the proper size clubs. Students who do not have their own clubs will have a set to utilize throughout the camp.

Jon Barber, a volunteer, club member and retired teacher, said Stamford Junior Golf also provides a twoweek course at 10 local school districts each year.

As students were signed in on Monday, Philion, who is teaching at the camp for his first season said he was a little nervous. "I'm a little nervous about filling Jim Schouller's shoes," he said of the man who is the former pro at the club and taught the program for a number of years. However, Rich Beers, longtime club member assured him it was going

to be just fine. Students were anxious to get started, once they learned about the sanitation stations and criteria for their first day at camp. Several of the students are repeat campers and some parents said they were very grateful the camp was still being held, with so many summer recreation and educational programs canceled due to the COVID 19 pandemic this year.
