"I have a field trip today!" Anu said, grinning.


"So, where are you going?" asked Aditi, curious.

They continued the bus journey by playing games, talking about their friends, etc.




After their bus reached school, Anu ran to her classroom and waited for her friends. She checked the snacks she brought: chips, wafers and juices.

After the assembly, all the students set their bags and got ready to leave. They were told that they had to leave section wise.


In the bus, Anu and her friends enjoyed a lot. They played games, sang songs and shared their snacks. After about two hours, they reached the forest.

"Let's look around and see if we can find someone who can help us," Anu assured her.




They walked a few miles and saw a cave.

"Yeah, the two best friends must have found good hiding places and must be hiding together," Soumya replied with certainty.


"I think it would be better now if we stop chit-chatting and start finding them," Divya said. "Now let's go!"

Simba roared with satisfaction. Anu and Reena started chatting with Simba as if he understood everything.


While the girls were with Simba, Revati ma'am and their two friends were looking for more clues. They followed the path in which they found Anu's clip and found themselves in the middle of the woods.



"Yeah, for now, I am hungry," Anu said, hugging her stomach.


All of them burst out laughing.
